
Faith, Hope and Prayer

Purim is the most fun day on the Jewish Calendar. It is April Fools, Halloween and New Year's Eve all rolled into one. It always surprises me that people will show up for serious holidays, fast days, and memorial days but miss this opportunity to end the Jewish year with a big blowout party. Whatever one might think about Judaism, Purim defies all the stereotypes. It is the one time of the year when you can come to synagogue and make as much noise as you want!

Purim is also the day that you can dress however you want. Costumes are the recommended attire. This is just one of the ways Purim is a "hidden" holiday. We hide ourselves in our costumes. We can be whoever we want to be. We can hide our "real" self and take on an assumed identity.

The holiday of Purim is based on the one book of the Bible that reads like a telenovela. There is the king, who is only known for the parties he throws. His collection of advisors only give him bad advice, including his Prime Minister, Haman, who gives him the worst advice of all. There is Mordechai, the only reasonable person in the book, looking for a way to get the Persian empire under control, who encourages his niece, Esther, to fill the vacancy of

queen and bring some sanity to the court.



I can tell you that there is another character in the story who remains hidden; God. God does not appear in the Book of Esther at all. Not even a small walk-on role. It is the only book in the Bible where God is not a character. The commentators like to think that God is hidden in the story. When things look dark, some interesting events occur that might indicate that Someone is working behind the scenes.

There is a happy ending to the story, and the holiday has a happy component as well. There are hamantaschen to eat and, if one is over the age of twenty-one, it is not inappropriate to have a drink (but drink responsibly). Purim is a lot of fun.

Yes there is a serious side of Purim, and like everything else on Purim, it also remains hidden. There are gifts to be given to the poor, treats to share with neighbors (sort of a reverse "trick or treat"), and memories to share with family and friends. Even the serious parts of Purim are so much fun that we can forget how important they are.

Purim is a holiday nobody would want to miss. We can be whoever we want to be. We can hear a story that has some parts that might not be appropriate for young children (those parts are hidden, too!). We can eat, drink, and make as much noise as we want. Think about your favorite noisemaker. Think pots and a spoon, air horns, trumpets, or even the baby that keeps you up all night. You don't have to remind children that they need to sit quietly. Join us on Monday night, March 6th; it will be wild—in a good way!

Honey Cake & Latkes: Recipes from the Old World by the Auschwitz-Birkenau Survivors by Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial Foundation



A few months ago, I tuned into a panel discussion presented by Temple Emanu-El Cultural Center. The panel consisted of survivors of the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camps. The panelists recalled their prewar recipes and post-liberation memories.

More than a cookbook, this collection of heirloom recipes conveys Auschwitz-Birkenau survivors' stories of cooking and food. Collected and edited during the pandemic, this book—in the words of Ronald S. Lauder, Chairman of the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial Foundation—"is a story of hope and triumph of the human spirit."

Over 110 recipes accompanied by survivors' pre-war recollections and post-liberation memories weave a unique tapestry of sensory experiences of flavors and aromas from the old world, accounts of loss and trauma, as well as heartwarming and poignant tales of new beginnings and healing. All of the recipes have been tested and retested to make sure they can be replicated in your kitchen while keeping the original character and voice of the survivors who contributed to the volume. Delicious recipes include Blintzes, Kugel, Matzo Ball Soup, Cholent, Goulash, Kasha Varnishkes, Rugelach, and more. Plus, there is a special chapter devoted to classic dishes for the Jewish holidays (Latkes, Charoset, Gefilte Fish, Knishes, Tzimmes, Challah, and others) that you can use to prepare, host, or bring food to a gathering. All proceeds from the sale of this book go to the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial Foundation.

When you part company with the life you've been living and have to start a new one, what do you do?

While trying to sort out the answer to this question—along with the question of what being Jewish meant to her—Jenna Zark began writing. This book was born of the journey.

Got any old Singers around?

HIAS, the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society, works on refugee aid and resettlement on a national level and will be part of our Social Action focus in the weeks ahead. The Connecticut Immigrant & Refugee Coalition (CIRC) works hand in hand with HIAS on a more localized level, finding housing, setting up support networks, assisting with acquiring documents, getting children into school, etc.

That's why we're interested in your old Singers—well, not Frank or Tony or Sarah Vaugahn or any of your other old faves. What, then?

Last summer, CIRC initiated a program, Sewing for Success, designed to help women bring in some additional family income, provide much needed social interaction, boost their feelings of fitting into a new cultural environment, improve language skills, etc.

The women made bags and totes, for example, and sold them in a few pop-up markets. The program started with twelve women, has grown to forty, and will continue to grow as more immigrants are resettled into CT, many of the new wave being Ukrainian.

The pressing need now for this program is the need for sewing machines. CIRC has lined up someone who has volunteered to check out, repair, and refurbish old and no longer used sewing machines, make them shine and bring new life to them. (His only requirement is that the machines need to be in working order: he will clean it up and make sure all working parts are, in fact, working, but he cannot rebuild a broken machine.) Those dusty old cast-offs will make the possibility of a new and better life a reality to many families.

Thus, CIRC is asking for people to donate the old sewing machine sitting in the basement, the attic, the garage, the shed that used to be the kids' playhouse—wherever you stashed it the last time you used it back in 1987.

And while you're going through your too-good-to-throw-away stuff, you might find that stash of fabric you were planning on using, because you who sew, like your knitting counterparts, always have a stash on hand. After all, you never know when you might need 1 1/2 yards of calico polyester cotton, right?

So get your old Singer (or any other brand) to us and we'll help a family enter a new and hopeful life.

HIAS wants you to remember: We used to help refugees because *they* were Jewish. Now we help them because *we* are Jewish.

As a part of JCC's 27th Annual Phyllis Hoffman Harford Jewish Film Festival, there will be a special showing of *Jews of the Wild West* at the **Parkade Cinemas in Manchester on Tuesday, March 28th at 5:00pm!**

Film Description: Over two million Jews fled continuous cycles of anti-Jewish oppression, deadly violence, and forced poverty in Europe to seek out a better life in America. But big-city tenements didn't offer the respite many were seeking. The wagon trains that moved westward with Jewish families traveled for the same reason as many settlers: opportunity. By 1912, it is estimated that over 100,000 Jews had migrated to the Wild West. These pioneers put down roots, and today they epitomize the important legacy of immigration in America.



Sure, you've heard of Levi Strauss and the Guggenheim family, but do you know about Jesse Shwayder, Simon Bibo, and Josephine Marcus Earp? This documentary tells their stories and others using archival footage, historical photos, diaries and letters, and first-person testimony of descendants.

A TEACHING MOMENT FROM RABBI ALAN

As we turn the calendar to March, we enter the Hebrew month of Adar with joy, as we prepare for the festive holiday of Purim and later for the freedom-giving holiday of Passover.

People have used several key words to describe the essence of Judaism; one is "action." We humans are judged by our actions. When the Children of Israel received the Torah, they said, "We will hear, do, and we will understand." The doing—action—comes before the understanding. We gain understanding by taking action, doing the mitzvot.

Action also comes before faith. The Danish existential philosopher Kierkegaard spoke about his Christian belief as a "leap of faith." In response, the Jewish philosopher Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel spoke of a "leap of action."

In the Purim story, Queen Esther was at first afraid to confront the king about the decree against the Jews. In the kingdom of Persia, no one could approach the king unless he or she was summoned; those who disobeyed were put to death. But Esther took the necessary action; she confronted the king, and ultimately saved her people. Only through her "leap of action" was she able to save the Jewish people.

Like Esther, we may find ourselves in a scary situation. The problems we face seem bigger than we are. We may be afraid, but we know we need to do the right thing. This is one of the profound insights that Judaism gave the world. The world still needs to hear the call to action today, and often, it comes from the Jewish people.



Of course, not all actions are scary. Taking a leap can also be fun, like eating hamantaschen and dressing up in costumes for Purim. Our holiday traditions allow us to join the many generations who have proudly identified as Jews. Wearing Purim costumes may make us look different from our normal appearance, but these disguises reveal a deeper level of who we are. We are an ancient people, but we are also alive today to celebrate. L'dor v'dor—from generation to generation, we take the leap of action.

This year our religious school will celebrate Purim on Sunday, March 5th at 9:00 a.m. We will begin with the Megillah reading—the story of Esther and Purim—followed by songs, skits, and a costume parade. There will be a special visitor at our carnival as well (see page 4)! As for our adults, let them play as well as the children, and be role models for the great joyousness of Purim!

And don't forget the congregational Megillah reading, Monday evening, March 6, at 6:00 p.m.



IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)

In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations. The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a perpetual endowment fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to Hineni. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800 per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require

significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.
