

Faith, Hope, and Prayer

After the horrific attack on Israel in Shemini Atzeret, we all began to wonder who, exactly, are our friends? Those on the far right love Israel but they hate Jews. Those on the far left love Jews and hate Israel. We find ourselves questioning everyone we see on the street; are they with us or against us? Those who hate us seem to come out of nowhere to attack and thus we are once again addressing what security is needed for our synagogue and our programs.

But in the middle of all this insecurity, it is time to look ahead to our annual Thanksgiving Interfaith Service. For over ten years, we have been gathering on the Sunday before Thanksgiving as a community to affirm that our friendships are something that we are deeply grateful for. For many of the past years, the Islamic community has joined us, reading passages of thanksgiving from the Koran. It is one of the highlights of our year when we can gather together and affirm our common humanity and our love of peace.

One of the things we learn each year as we host this service, is that while our paths to God take us on different journeys, there is much that we share in our service to God. No matter our politics, religion, or nationality, we are all human beings, and we are all responsible for each other. There may be people out there in the wider world who wish to build themselves up by putting other people down—who think that those who are different have no right to life, no right to freedom, no right to even live in the same country. But no matter what others may say, we know that the way forward is always the way toward love, friendship, and peace. Even in these hard times, we must not lose sight of our goal: to make friends, not enemies; to be kind, not full of hate.

Judaism teaches us that one of the great creations of God is that no two human beings are ever exactly alike, yet we are all created in God's image. In the end, whatever differences there may be between us, there is far more to bring us together.

Let us gather together this Thanksgiving, even if we feel anxious and afraid, and be together with our friends to celebrate what we share and to look to the day when we can all dwell together, with no one to make us afraid.

Words from the President



Hello BSBI Family. As I write this article, the war in Israel is on its 17th day and there is no clear end in sight. Over the last 2 weeks I have had conversations with dozens upon dozens of people ... and every single one of them has a story of how this horrible tragedy has touched them personally. Stories of family, of friends and acquaintances ... stories of loss, of strength and survival ... stories. And these same people don't just want to tell me their story, they've been eager to hear mine. This simple act of sharing between two people has an almost therapeutic effect for most. It gives them a sense of community and closeness at a time when many of us can almost feel the distance between our homes and Israel, our other home.

Because of my position at the Jewish Federation, every waking moment for the last 2 and a half weeks have been about organizing fundraisers, coordinating resources, or just getting information out to the wider community. So as you can imagine, I've got a lot of stories to tell. But my story is from the first couple of days.

On Monday October 9th, there was a big rally in West Hartford, in solidarity with Israel. More than 1000 people were in attendance, and we had the Governor, senators, religious and community leaders, students of every age with some coming by the busload ... it was an amazing moment, and those of you that were there know what I'm talking about. There was a feeling in the air that's hard to explain. The speeches, while scripted, didn't feel that way. There was so much emotion coming from every person that stepped up to the microphone, and because of my vantage point, I was even able to see that one high profile politician ignored the notes he had brought and was truly speaking from the heart.

At the end of the rally every voice joined to sing Hatikvah. The only word I can think of to describe this moment is "beautiful." And I thought that after 2 days of preparing for this gathering, this chorus of hope had brought me to the limits of my emotions. But then I looked at my phone. It was a short text from my mother — Our cousin in Israel was killed. For some reason the emotions that I had been tucking away for the prior 2 days so I could help bring this moment together, suddenly came rushing out. I walked away from the group I was talking to, just to have a moment alone. But after a couple of minutes, I had to get myself together ... I had a job to do, I had to make sure that everything got wrapped up. It didn't matter that I wasn't even sure which cousin on which kibbutz she was talking about, I had to do my part. I would grieve later. I'm still waiting for "later."

Over the last 2 weeks, I've heard a lot of stories, and I've shared mine. But one thing I've noticed is that many of these people were sharing their stories for the first time. And I realized that not everyone has someone to tell ... someone close who would understand. But just the fact that they could talk to another Jew, another person who would "get it", was all they needed. It has been a reminder that while we all may be 5,600 miles from Jerusalem, we all have that second home in common, and have felt the impact of this horrific tragedy on a personal level.

I implore you, reach out to someone in our community that you haven't spoken to since the war began, someone that may not have told their story yet ... someone that needs just to.

My cousin's name was David. He lived on Kfar Aza, a kibbutz very close to the Gaza boarder and was killed in the terrorist attack that started this on the morning of October 7th. He was a father, a grandfather, a farmer ... family.

Am Yisroel Chai!


The Library has two new additions to our collection, a biography, and a novel. The books are:



A Teaching Moment with Rabbi Alan

We recently concluded Sukkot, a holiday that serves to demonstrate that we rely on God to watch over us every day.

The sukkah is required by Jewish law to be a flimsy, weak shelter, to remind us that we are fragile creatures in need of God's protection. In the Amidah, we thank God "for our lives that are in Your hands, for our souls that are under Your care, for Your miracles that accompany us each day." True, we only dwell in the sukkah for one week—but we know that we are in God's hands the whole year round.

Another lesson of the sukkah is that we don't necessarily need all the possessions with which we normally surround ourselves. When life changes, we often find that we need to clean out the extra stuff that we've accumulated.

A passage in Pirkei Avot (Teachings of the Fathers—it's in the back of your siddur) says, "The more possessions, the more worries!" In other words, the more stuff we have, the more burdened we are. We all know about the great Indian leader Mahatma Gandhi. Gandhi was one of the greatest religious leaders who ever lived—and he owned very little. He owned a cloak, sandals, eyeglasses, a pocket watch, and a rice bowl. Most of us could not live that simply, yet we could easily get by with a little less stuff in our lives.

There is a Hassidic story about a man who travels to visit a great rabbi at his home. The man is surprised to see how modest the great rabbi's house is, and how few possessions he owns. The rabbi replies to the traveler, "Well, all you have is that small suitcase!" The traveler says, "But I'm just passing through!" The rabbi replies, "I, too, am just passing through!"

We all are just passing through. In every moment of our lives, we should be aware that in every moment, there is something we can do to make life better. We have the mitzvot.

We know that our lives are temporary—although hopefully not as temporary as a sukkah. In the span of a human life, we gradually learn that the things we own—homes, cars, computers, furniture, jewelry, clothing, and other goodies—are not so important. A great storm can blow our belongings away in a moment. Indeed, we saw what the rain and wind did to our own Sukkah. They may be sturdier, but any man-made structure, even a skyscraper, can be destroyed.

So, what is left? What do we celebrate? What can we thank God for?

Whether or not we hang on to material possessions, we have great treasures: our loving relationships, our values, our memories, our talents, our knowledge, our dreams, and hopefully our health. All these are gifts from God that will outlive wind and rain. Perhaps the true lesson of Sukkot is to live with greater simplicity. After we have cleansed our spiritual selves during the High Holy Days, Sukkot reminds us that it is time to clean our physical surroundings.

Sukkot reminds us to live simply—and, simply, to live, with thankfulness for God's protection.

Torah Study Shabbat, November 10th - 11th

Our guest, Rabbi David Golinkin (bio below) will be our Scholar-in-Residence for Torah Study Shabbat on November 10th and 11th.

On Friday evening, the Kabbalat Shabbat service begins at 6:00pm followed by dinner at 7:00 pm (advance registration only). At 8:15pm the Saul M. and Rebecca B. Silverstein Lecture, "Israel at 75: A Fifty-Year Retrospective" This is a broad overview of both the tremendous achievements and challenges of the Jewish state, based on the Rabbi's 50 years of living in Israel. All are welcome to attend the lecture.

At the 10:00 am Saturday morning service, Rabbi Golinkin will speak on the topic "What about the State of Judaism in the Jewish State?" This 75-year-old challenge has become even more important since the last election. The service will be followed by a Kiddush luncheon (advance registration only). The 1:15 pm Rabbi Jeshaia and Hilde Schnitzer Memorial Lecture will be "Concerning Conservative Halachah." How are these halachic rulings different from all other halachic rulings? Just how does Conservative halachah work? In this lecture, Rabbi Golinkin will consider some of the halachic rulings made by Conservative/Masorti rabbis in Israel during the past 40 years, and see how they differ from Orthodox rulings on the same topics. There will be time for questions and answers.

He is also the Director of the Center for Women in Jewish Law at The Schechter Institute, whose goal is to publish responsa and books by and about women in Jewish Law.

For December we will read *Lessons in Chemistry* by Bonnie Garmus. Check with the Mary Cheney Research librarian for copies of the book.



IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)

In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations. The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a perpetual endowment fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to Hineni. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800 per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require

significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.




