Selichot at BSBI

Saturday, September 9, beginning at 8:15 pm

Tashlich – Casting Away our Sins

Tashlich, Sunday, September 17, is at 2:00 pm on the second day of Rosh Hashanah. This year we are meeting again at The Old Woodbridge Farm at Manchester Green (behind the pizza restaurant). Our members and their guests are invited to observe this custom of symbolically throwing away our sins. Due to modern environmental issues we are not throwing breadcrumbs. We will provide birdseed to cast into the water. We will meet at the stream on the farm at 2:00 pm. There is street parking in front of the farm and plenty of parking behind the Manchester Senior Center right next door.

If you have never participated in this ritual, this is a great year to start. Tashlich (meaning "casting off") is a practice on Rosh Hashanah to go to a natural body of flowing water such as a river or brook and throw a symbolic food item into the water representing casting off our sins of the previous year. We invite you and your family to join us and participate in this special service. We will provide birdseed to cast on the water for everyone.



Kever Avot

It is a long-standing tradition to visit the graves of family members during the days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. This visit is called Kever Avot, literally "Parents' Graves."

At this holiday time it is appropriate to remember those who are now gone from our family with this visit. We will hold this service at our cemetery in Manchester on Sunday, September 24, at 10:00 am. Everyone, no matter where their loved ones may be buried, will have the opportunity to have their loved ones remembered at this service.



Lulay and Etrog Sets



To fully observe the holiday of Sukkot, you will want to own a set of arbah minim, the four species (Lulav and Etrog), which will be blessed each morning of the holiday to remind us of God's bounties. We will place a group order and have them available at BSBI to pick up before the Sukkot holiday.

Sukkot

Sukkot is the joyous culmination of the holiday season. With Pesach and Shavuot, it is the third of the three Pilgrimage Festivals. While Pesach is overwhelmingly a home festival, and Shavuot is mainly a synagogue holiday, Sukkot has observances that make it both home and synagogue centered.

If you would like to build a Sukkah at your home, which is a great way to fully observe the holiday with your family, please contact the Rabbi for instructions. You can check out the website www.sukkot. com for excellent kits.



The arbah minim (lulav and etrog) will be used at the morning service on Sunday October 1, and the blessing is said every other morning at home.

Hoshana Rabbah

Join us on Friday, October 6 at 10:00 am for the unique conclusion of the season of repentance with our Hoshana Rabbah service, the "Great Hoshana." We circle the synagogue seven times with our lulav and etrog, and then as we finish, we put these items aside and take up willow branches (also known as Hoshanot) and we beat them five times as a final prayer for Rain. It is a ritual that is steeped in meaning and expresses our hope for a good harvest and a new year of plenty. We hope you will join us this year and join us in our prayers for an abundant harvest next year so we can rejoice together again.

You will need to order a bundle of "hoshanot" for \$6 by Yom Kippur. Contact the BSBI office if you would like to order. You will use your lulav and etrog as well.

Faith, Hope, and Prayer



Just why do we come to shul on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur?

I know that is not a question that is up there with "What is the meaning of life?" but I think it is an important question. I already know why the "Shabbat Regulars" come every week and I am grateful and happy to know why the regulars at Daily Minyan attend. I could expound on their motives for hours, but I don't need to; they already know why attending a service at the synagogue is important.

I spend a lot of time on sermons/teachings for the Yomim Noraim, the Days of Awe, because I know that this might be the only time I get to directly address those who come once or twice a year. I have to consider what is on their minds and what Judaism has to say about the things that deeply concern them.

But my September article for the bulletin is for MY question. Just why do we attend these fall holidays? What makes us feel that they are so important? I already know that fewer Jews attend these days than the number who used to attend ten, twenty, or thirty years ago. Fewer people say they care about religion. On surveys they list their religion as "none," and have a host of reasons why they reject religion and what Judaism has to offer them in their lives. They have no interest in synagogue, and I have no venue to reach out to them. And yet, we will send out hundreds of tickets for the holidays so we can know how many seats to set out so that everyone has a place (and in our times we have security and safety considerations that we also must address).

I am not fully sure why we have so many more people in synagogue on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, but I think I can venture a guess. I believe that just as we have physical hunger, we also have spiritual hunger. As we can put our physical hunger aside for a day or two (as on Yom Kippur) we can put aside our spiritual hunger for a while as well. Eventually, however, it needs to be addressed. Sometimes we just need to pray. Sometimes we just need to connect to something bigger than ourselves. Sometimes our physical world, with all its "toys," is not enough. We want to know what is the meaning of life, or more importantly, what is the meaning of my life? We need to know if God has put us here for a purpose. We want to know that our time here has made a difference. Why is it that buying new stuff is not as pleasurable as being kind, as being compassionate, as being generous? Why do we feel better putting a sandwich into the hand of a hungry person than we do when we have a great tennis game or when we beat our highest score on our X-box? What exactly is missing from our lives?

We can get a taste, but only a taste, of the answer when we are in shul on the High Holy Days. If we come late and leave early, we will probably miss the answer entirely. Spiritual hunger is not satiated with a few moments in real prayer. To find the answers we seek, we need to open our palate to the many flavors of spirituality. There are mitzvot, hesed, rachamim, tefilot, avoda, and simcha. If you don't know the meaning of these words, the English will not take you where you want or need to go.

Someone asked me last week why, on Rosh Hashanah, he finds that he always needs to do teshuva, to repent for the same things every year. What is the use? I reminded him of what those with addictions know from their 12-step programs. They have to admit they are powerless to change and ask God (a higher power) to help them change. It is not easy to turn away from our distractions. Sometimes we need help. Sometimes we need family. Sometimes we need friends. Sometimes we need the Rabbi. Sometimes we need God.

A day or two in synagogue can help us know where to look for God in our lives. We already know that God cannot be found in the synagogue. God is found inside our own souls. Synagogue, prayer, Machzor, Shofar and yes, maybe fasting for a day — these are the roadmaps that can help us in our journey to find our own divine image. We may, from time to time, feel like a fraud in the physical world. A steady diet of spirituality, putting some space between our physical wants and needs and our spiritual wants and needs, is not a one-off event in life. It will eventually need to be a lifestyle change. Take the time to stand in front of the open ark at Neilah. Bare your soul, open your heart, talk to God. What will you say in that holy moment?

Finding God in our souls will ultimately need to be a daily practice. That will not happen in just some time spent in shul on the holidays. It is just a start. It can be a good start, but it is only a start. What will it mean in our lives to turn our life over to God? Something to think about between now and the holidays. How is it possible to turn our lives around?

With God, anything is possible.

From the Rabbi Search Committee

Rabbi Search Update

On the evening of July 24, BSBI held the Community Conversation evening, at which members of the Search Committee shared questions with congregants and recorded their answers. This was an open discussion, in which a range of viewpoints and ideas were expressed. The input was compiled into a document which was shared with all committee members. It will be used, along with the results of the Congregational Survey, to shape our "Rabbinic Search Questionnaire" (see below) and the interview process.

The next step, however, is not interviewing candidates; it will be seeking them out! First, we need to complete the "Pulpit Rabbinic Search Questionnaire," a lengthy document that we are required to respond to in detail. The questionnaire covers both the spiritual and the mundane, asking everything from "What prayer book do you use?" to "What does local housing cost?"

Unfortunately, just as we were completing the Questionnaire (about 30 pages of information), we got word from United Synagogue that all searches are put on hold until they send out their new, revised version of the Questionnaire—which will not be available until September 5 (their estimate). We had planned to post our job listing by Rosh Hashanah, but we anticipate that this change will delay our original timeline by about a month. We won't know for sure until we see the revised form.

We were initially told that we could expect to receive applications after the holiday season—late October to early November. At this point, we don't know if that information still holds, or if the overall schedule will change. We will keep you posted as we learn more.

In addition to registering with the Rabbinical Assembly (the source for rabbis affiliated with the Conservative movement), we will also investigate other sources of rabbis, in the hope that we will have a wider selection of applicants from which to choose.

Rabbi Leon Wind Religious School Update

A Teaching Moment from Rabbi Alan

By the time you read this, our students will be returning to the halls of learning. Since early July, stores have been holding back-to-school sales for school supplies. Families have been gearing up for the return to a school schedule. Getting clothes is always on the list because the children have outgrown or worn out last year's clothes.

In Deuteronomy (D'varim), Moses states that, during the forty years spent in the wilderness, "The clothes upon you did not wear out" [8:4]. Clothes that do not wear out! In Chapter 29, we learn that their sandals did not wear out either.

Clothes and shoes that do not wear out in forty years are miraculous, but they are miracles that could be easily overlooked—just as it could be easy to ignore other miracles that the Children of Israel received from God in the wilderness: water to drink and manna to eat. In the excitement of arriving at the Promised Land, and amidst all the work that had to be done, the people might forget God's many gifts.

God has been with the Children of Israel for forty years, supplying them with all the necessities of life, and is about to give them a "good land," but they still need a reminder that these gifts are provided by God. Moses reminds the people: "When you have eaten your fill, give thanks to the Eternal, your God for the good land. ... Take care, lest you forget the Eternal, your God" [Deuteronomy 8:10-11].


We can easily overlook the miracles and blessings in our own lives. It's easy to take for granted what we have, without remembering who granted it to us. We get wrapped up in getting things done, without noticing God's many gifts.

It's important to pause, take a breath, and think about God's role in our lives. As we approach the new year, 5784, our tradition reminds us to be thankful, and to express our thanks by saying the brachot (blessings). By being grateful for God's many blessings, we begin the new year, and each new school day, in a healthy frame of mind. When we focus on gratitude, we don't have room for negative thoughts.

When we say blessings, we take a moment to think about these acts—eating food, wearing new clothes—and remember that it takes more than people to grow the food and make the clothes; it takes some of God's miracles. The table at which we eat represents the holy altar of the Temple in Jerusalem. Even the routine can be made sacred if we remember to give thanks.

Let us all be grateful as we begin our new year.

IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)

In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations. The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a perpetual endowment fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to Hineni. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800 per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require

significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.

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
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
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
