



We are delighted to announce that our first candidate, Rabbi Stefanie Gedan, will visit BSBI during the weekend of February 23-25. She will lead services on Friday night and Saturday morning, conduct a lesson on Saturday afternoon, and meet with school parents on Sunday morning. We encourage all members to attend one or more events during Rabbi Gedan's visit.

Rabbi Gedan has extensive training and service that provide a solid foundation for a career as a congregational rabbi. Her resume is impressive, and we welcome the opportunity for our members to get to know her in person.

After the visit, we will, as in past searches, distribute a survey to solicit input from all our members. Please mark this weekend on your calendar, and plan to join us in meeting Rabbi Gedan.



Biography:

Rabbi Stefanie Gedan is a chaplain resident at New York Presbyterian in Brooklyn. She received her rabbinic ordination in May 2023 from the Jewish Theological Seminary (JTS) and graduated with a Master of Arts in Hebrew Letters and a certificate in pastoral care. While at JTS, Rabbi Gedan was the rabbinic intern at the Glen Rock Jewish Center, in Glen Rock, NJ, the student rabbi at the Fitzgerald Hebrew Congregation in Fitzgerald, GA, and the rabbinic intern at Adath Jeshurun Congregation in Minnetonka, MN.

Rabbi Gedan was commissioned as an officer in the United States Navy Chaplain Candidate Program, and trained as a chaplain at White Plains Hospital, in White Plains, NY and the New Jewish Home in Manhattan. She graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 2017 with a Bachelor of Arts in Jewish Studies, with an emphasis in modern Hebrew. Between college and rabbinical school, she spent a year at Yeshivat Hadar studying Jewish texts. In her spare time, Rabbi Gedan enjoys board games with friends and spending time with her three nephews in Westchester County.

Faith, Hope, and Prayer

What is a Conservative/Masorti Jew supposed to do? We volunteer (or are volunteered) to do a D'var Torah. We look up the parashah for the week and then ...?

Clearly the best place to find material for a D'var Torah is online. Unless we have a library of rabbinic sources, most of what we need we can find on the internet. The question is, however, where do we look on the internet?

For all too many of us, the first site we examine is a site designed for Orthodox Jews. For some reason this is the first place our search takes us. These sites certainly have a great deal of material, and besides, where else would we go to find information on the parashah?

Well, it turns out there are many places to go to get a modern and meaningful interpretation of the parashah and to find interesting teachings about Jewish holidays. The first place to look for all things Jewish is Exploring Judaism https://www.exploringjudaism.org/ This is the official place to look up anything Jewish from a non-Orthodox point of view; it is sponsored by the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism (USCJ) and has a wealth of information that is easy to read and full of helpful topics. It even has ideas on how to write a better D'var Torah.



The Jewish Theological Seminary is the flagship of learning for our movement. It too has many resources for creating a D'var Torah. At the JTS Torah Online site, https://www.jtsa.edu/jts-torah-online/ one can find an archive of teachings by many great scholars and from some rabbinical students. It does not take a long time to see which scholars have the best approach to the parashah for you.

Our movement in Israel also has great resources. The Schechter Institute, our seminary in Jerusalem, has its own archive of parashah material https://schechter.edu/articles/ with some of the best scholarship our movement has to offer. The Conservative Yeshiva has an archive of Divrei Torah, the weekly email they send on the parashah Torah Sparks. If you wish, you can subscribe and get a take on the parashah each week.

I also recommend the sermons and postings of several Conservative rabbis who have archives of what they have written about the parashah: Rabbi Sharon Brous of IKAR in Los Angeles https://ikar.org/sermons/; Rabbi Aaron Alexander of Adas Israel in Washington, DC has an archive of source sheets that can help you frame a D'var Torah https://www.adasisrael.org/sourcesheets; Rabbi Eliot Cosgrove of the Park Avenue Synagogue https://pasyn.org/resources/sermons; and Rabbi Jeremy Kalmanofsky of Anshe Chesed of New York https://www.anschechesed.org/blog/

Orthodox Judaism may have much to teach us, but we first must look to our own resources for information and inspiration. There is a lot of material out there on the internet. Let us first turn to our own Movement before we move on to others.



A Word From Our President

As I write this column, it is now the 100th day since the terrorist attack in Israel, and the 100th day that 132 hostages still remain in captivity. 100 days too long. I'm sure that this is something that you all already know, so you must be wondering why I'm writing to tell you about this when by the time you read it, that milestone will be a few weeks in the past.

On October 7th and for the few weeks afterwards, the war was ever-present for all of us. Whether we were experiencing the war through the news, social media, or conversations with friends & colleagues, it was right there in front of us and hard to avoid. Which was fine since we're all Jews, and as it has happened many times throughout history, someone was rising up to try and destroy us and we were fighting back. We wanted it to be at the forefront of our daily lives, because whether or not we lost friends or family on that Shabbat morning... we all felt as if it were happening to us.

BRING OUR HOSTAGES HOME

But as time has a way of doing, it continued to move forward. The demands of our work and family lives

slowly crept back in, and day by day it reclaimed some of our focus. The war in Israel, half a world away, for most of us was no longer at the center of our daily lives. I'm not saying that we forgot what was happening, it just wasn't occupying most of our waking hours.

Not all of us were that fortunate. Some of us have family in Israel, and whether they're serving in the military or displaced & living in temporary shelters, it keeps the war closer. Some of us lost family and haven't yet coped fully, so our grief keeps us connected to the war. And some of us have jobs that are directly tied to the war and the relief efforts, so whether or not we want it to be, it's there every day.

But for most of us, the war isn't front and center anymore, it's just one of the things that make up our lives. And this scares me.

As Jews we MUST keep this front and center, we MUST counter the misinformation that our children are reading online...and as the world points at Israel and demands a cease-fire, we MUST remind them that there WAS a cease-fire on October 6th, and Hamas broke it by slaughtering more than 1200 innocent civilians, our brothers and sisters.

We can't let people forget why and how this war started. We can't let people forget the atrocities committed that morning, most too brutal and disturbing to mention. We can't let people forget that this is not the first time that Israel's neighbors in that part of the world have tried to annihilate us.

We can't let people forget that Never Again, is Now.

I apologize if my column this month is a bit unsettling to any of you, but I'm one of the people that is still living this war every day because it's my job. And I'm troubled that while this war continues, every day I encounter people who "haven't thought about the war" for a day or two.

When we don't have enough attendees, those who are saying Kaddish and those who are observing a Yahrzeit are unable to recite the Kaddish at all. There are many prayers that we cannot say without a minyan, and we need your help to get us over the line.

While it is an emotional hardship for those observing a Yahrzeit to come to minyan and find that there are not enough people there, I am going to turn the tables here and note that if we each expect to have a minyan when we need one, we must also do what we can to help others when they are in need by being there for them. For now, Mondays and Thursdays are our most difficult days; we need your help.

Be there for others so they will be there for you. Support our Minyan on the days you don't need it, so that it will be there for you for your memorial observances.

A Teaching Moment with Rabbi Alan

This month of February would have been my father's 98th birthday. Here is a story to memorialize his many blessings and as well the blessings of all fathers.

A Story: Dad's Blessings

A young man was getting ready to graduate from college. For many months he had admired a beautiful sports car in a dealer's showroom. Knowing that his father could easily afford it, he told him that was all he wanted.

As Graduation Day approached, the young man awaited signs that his father had purchased the car. Finally, on the morning of his graduation, his father called him into his private study. His father told him how proud he was to have such a fine son and told him how much he loved him. He handed his son a beautifully wrapped gift box. Curious, but somewhat disappointed, the young man opened the box and found a lovely, leather-bound Bible, with the young man's name embossed in gold. Angry, he raised his voice to his father and said, "With all your money, you only gave me a Bible?" and stormed out of the house, leaving the Bible.

Many years passed, and the young man was very successful in business. He had a beautiful home and wonderful family, but realizing that his father was very old, he thought perhaps he should go to visit him. He had not seen him since that graduation day. Before he could make arrangements, however, he received a telegram telling him his father had died and had willed all his possessions to his son. He needed to come home immediately and take care of things.

When he arrived at his father's house, sadness and regret filled his heart. He began to search through his father's important papers and saw the still-new Bible, just as he had left it years ago. With tears, he opened the Bible and began to turn the pages. As he did so, a car key dropped from the back of the Bible. It had a tag with the dealer's name—the same dealer who had shown the sports car he had desired. On the tag was the date of his graduation, and the words "PAID IN FULL." In his youthful haste and anger, he had failed to see that his father had given him exactly what he had hoped for.

How many times do we miss blessings and answers to our prayers because they do not arrive exactly as we expect them? There are many people who miss these signs and wonders, even though they call themselves spiritual.

I remember preparing to become a Bar Mitzvah. My Dad had me practicing the service and my Torah reading while we traveled from Albany to Brooklyn, a good three hours each way. The day of my celebration was a glorious simcha, one I will never forget, especially my Dad helping me with the preparation. It was the beginning of a lifelong gift.

Today's thought: "Today I look beyond the obvious and allow miracles to be created in my life, remembering that miracles happen through me, not for me!"



We look forward to seeing you all weekend for Brotherhood Shabbat and World Wide Wrap.



IRA Assets and Qualified Charitable Distributions

BSBI would like to encourage charitable donations, to help our congregants optimize their charitable giving and to reach their charitable goals. On behalf of the Endowment Board of Trustees I would like to review some of the benefits of gifting Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs) to the Endowment. The QCDs may also be used to pay Synagogue dues as well as contribute to the Hineni Society.

Donation of "Qualified Charitable Distributions" (QCD)

In legislation at year end 2016, Congress made permanent qualified charitable distributions (QCDs) from individual retirement accounts.

What are QCDs?

A QCD permits direct transfers to a qualified charity (or charities) totaling up to \$100,000 annually of tax-deferred IRA savings. QCDs offer advantages over taking a taxable IRA distribution and then contributing the proceeds of that distribution to a charity. That's because taxable IRA distributions must be included in adjusted gross income. Importantly, QCDs automatically satisfy required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year when the QCD is made. That's a real advantage for a charitably minded IRA owner who doesn't depend on some or all of the RMD for living expenses.

What are important things to know about QCDs?

Only individuals who've attained age 70 ½ or older on the date of distribution may make QCDs. The charitable organization must be an organization that qualifies for a charitable income tax deduction of an individual. The Beth Sholom B'nai Israel Synagogue and the BSBI Endowment qualify as such organizations. The BSBI Endowment and Synagogue will be required to provide the same contribution acknowledgement to the owner of the IRA required claiming a charitable tax deduction. Failure to obtain the acknowledgement will quash the QCD. QCDs may be made from any IRA or individual retirement annuity, but not from a simplified employee pension, a simple retirement account, or an inherited IRA. Among other benefits, the use of QCDs for charity may reduce taxable income, reduce state and federal tax, reduce taxation of social security, reduce supplemental IRMMA payments to Medicare parts B and D. Individuals and couples with low as well as high incomes may benefit by contributing QCDs to charity.

Examples of using QCDs for charitable giving

There are several attractive options for the use of QCDs for charitable giving. For example one can use the QCD to pay Synagogue dues and contribute to Hineni. Another example of optimizing the use of QCD is to establish a perpetual endowment fund. By making a QCD donation to the Endowment of BSBI, the donor may create a \$25,000 endowment for BSBI. This endowment may be given over the course of a number of years to reach the level necessary to provide perpetual support of a \$1000 to Hineni. By adding to the donation annually the donor could reach a \$45,000 over a number of years. This amount would support a perpetual Hineni donation at the \$1800 per year level. Details of further possibilities and arrangements for payment can be obtained from the Endowment members or via email noted below. Since the use of QCDs for charitable giving can have specific tax advantages the donor should consult their tax advisor prior to making a QCD contribution. Some plans require

significant lead time to process the paper work, so advanced planning may be necessary.


