'Torah Is the *Ikar*'

Rabbi Zev Cohen: 25 Years of Torah Leadership in Chicago and Beyond

n Sunday, May 5, Congregation Adas Yeshurun will hold its annual dinner, honoring Rabbi and Mrs. Zev Cohen for their dedication to Adas Yeshurun and the Chicago community.

During the past 25 years, under the leadership of Rabbi Cohen and his devoted Rebbetzin Michal. Adas Yeshurun has become a pillar in the Chicago community. Twenty-five years ago, the found-ing members never dreamed what Yeshurun would accomplish. Today the shul is thriving, with a large membership, numerous daily minyanim, and a variety of shiurim for men and women every day of the week.

The shul has an open-door pol-icy and hosts community initiatives, gatherings, and shiurim that benefit the entire city. Rabbi and Rebbetzin Cohen have made themselves available to help meet the needs of individuals and the community at large. With drive and dedication, they have exerted themselves to infuse everyone they meet with a love of Yiddishkeit, helping to bring them closer to Hashem.

From Crown Heights to

Rabbi Zev Cohen was born in Crown Heights, New York. His father, Rabbi Shraga Feivel Cohen, was a close *talmid* of Harav Yaakov Yitzchok Ruderman, zt"l.

Rabbi Cohen's maternal greatgrandfather, Reb Yuzpah Mael, arrived in the United States in 1904 and settled in Millis, Massachusetts, where he established a chicken farm. He subsequently became one of the first chassidim of the first Bostoner Rebbe, zt"l, Harav Pinchos Dovid Horowitz, when he came to America in 1914. His son, Reb Yaakov Tzvi Mael, established a cattle farm in Millis, and Rabbi Zev Cohen has many fond memories of spending summer vaca-tions on the farm, milking 80 cows a day and caring for his own pony. "Many of my experiences on

the farm were very relevant to Gemara learning later on.' remarks Rabbi Cohen. "When I was in yeshivah, we were learning Bava Kama and discussing the concept of a cow being gored by an ox. Many of the talmidim did not understand how this was relevant until I came in and announced that my uncle had been gored by an ox. Baruch Hashem, my uncle was okay, but this highlighted the relevance of these halachos for my

In 1965, when Rabbi Cohen was 11 years old, the family moved

from Crown Heights to Brookline, Massachusetts. Two years later, with great mesirus nefesh, they sent their young son to learn in the newly established Mesivta of Long Beach, under Harav Yitzchok Feigelstock, shlita. The voung Rabbi Cohen became a close talmid of Harav Feigelstock, who was a talmid muvhak of Harav Aharon Kotler, zt"l.

"I owe him my life," Rabbi Cohen asserts. "Every major deci-sion that I ever made was done with the guidance of the Rosh Yeshivah. There are no words to describe the effect that he has had on my life and my entire family."

After learning in Long Beach for seven years, Rabbi Cohen went to learn in Bais Medrash Govoha, where he developed close rela-tionships with Harav Shneur Kotler, zt"l, and Harav Nosson Wachtfogel, zt"l. "They had an incredible impact on my life," relates Rabbi Cohen. "They were a link to Haray Yeruchom Levovitz. zt"l, a link to Kelm, to Harav Boruch Ber Leibowitz, zt"l, and to Harav Isser Zalman Meltzer, zt'l. They were the only rebbeim I had who had really learned in prewar Europe.

At that time, a rotation of bachurim was set up to drive Harav Shneur and Harav Wachtfogel to New York whenever they had to go. Rabbi Cohen promised the gabbai that whenever the Rosh Yeshivah and the Mashgiach were going to visit Haray Moshe Feinstein, zt'7, he would make sure to be available to drive. In this manner, Rabbi Cohen was zocheh to witness the incredible interactions of these

Gedolim. "I watched the tremendous awe and bitul that Haray Wachtfogel had before Harav Moshe. I also witnessed the magnitude of Harav Wachtfogel's efforts to help other Yidden in their time of need, even when it meant giving up his own kavod?

Once, while driving through the Lower East Side of Manhattan, Rabbi Cohen lost his way and stopped to ask for directions. Finally, he said to the Mashgiach, "We are on the richtege derech (the right way)." Ever the baal mussar, Harav Wachtfogel exclaimed with great passion, "For 40 years, I have been trying to go on the richtege

The Move to Chicago

In 1979, Rabbi Cohen married Michal Stolper, the daughter of Rabbi and Mrs. Pinchas Stolper. Rabbi Stolper served for many years as the executive vice presi dent of the Orthodox Union and

was the founder of NCSY. Two years later, the Cohens moved to Chicago, where they

were among the founding members of the Chicago Community Kollel. Six years later, Rabbi Cohen became a rebbi in the Skokie Yeshiva, where he had a profound influence on many bachurim, many of whom consider him their *rebbi* some 30 years

Shortly thereafter, Rabbi Cohen became the Rav of Congregation Adas Yeshurun Anshe Kanesses Israel, retaining his position as rebbi, and later mashgiach, the at Yeshivah.

As mashaiach, Rabbi Cohen became well known for his impassioned mussar shmuessen, which left an indelible impression on the bachurim. In one of his most famous shmuessen, he described the s'char one receives for every word of Torah he learns and for every second he spends learning, and he calculated how much s'char one must earn for a few hours of learning Gemara. "Compare that to the millions of dollars that athletes earn for every second they play ball. Even that cannot come close to the boundless s'char one gets for learning Torah!" he thundered

In 1999, Rabbi Cohen came to a crossroads and realized that he could not continue to maintain both positions with complete dedication. After consulting with Harav Feigelstock, he became the full-time Rav of Adas Yeshurun.

Adas Yeshurun: A Thriving Kehillah

Under Rabbi Cohen's leadership Adas Yeshurun has become one of the major kehillos in the Chicago community, one that is always buzzing with activity. The shul is open from 5:30 a.m. until 12:00 midnight, with people learning there all day. There are 11 minyanim a day and close to 100 shiurim throughout the week on a wide variety of topics, making learning accessible to all.

"Our motto is, Torah is the ikar," says Rabbi Cohen. "I constantly stress *limud haTorah* as the catalyst for people to grow in their avodas Hashem."

One of the highlights of the vear in Adas Yeshurun is Simchas Torah. During the sixth hakafah the many children of the kehillah gather in front of the bimah and Rabbi Cohen leads them in the spirited singing of "Amar Rabi Akiva, ashreichim Yisrael." Then, with Rabbi Cohen in the lead, the children break out in a rousing cheer: "Torah is the ikar, Torah is the ikar...

Following this wonderful display of kvod haTorah, which draws participants from the entire neighborhood, small souvenirs imprinted with "Torah is the ikar," created by the Rebbetzin, are distributed.

This is just one example of how Rabbi Cohen creates an exuberant atmosphere of constant striving for higher levels of Torah learning, creating new and innovative pro-grams to promote his goals.

A Wide Range of Programs

In the Daf Hashavua program, more than 50 participants com-plete one daf of Shas each week. This is in addition to the three daily *Daf Yomi shiurim* in the shul. Rabbi Cohen calls the program gevaldig" and is very enthusiastic about the inspiration and energy it creates in the kehillah.

On May 5, the morning of the dinner, the members of both the Daf Yomi shiurim and the Daf Hashavua program will be completing the first 270 blatt - onetenth - of Shas. On that morning. the shul will host a siyum and shiu in honor of the two groups' achievement.

In "Let's Learn to Daven," Rabbi Cohen teaches his kehillah the meaning of the tefillos. After several years, they are finishing Pesukei d'Zimrah. "I always felt shortchanged," Rabbi Cohen says. "I had never really learned the meaning of the tefillos and how to really daven. When I became the Ray, someone asked me to give a shiur on siddur, yet I had never heard a shiur on the siddur. We began the shiur, which focuses on biur tefillah with some halachos, and it has had a serious impact on

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Cohen runs a forum called "She'eilah of the Week." He chooses one she'eilah that he received during the week and analyzes it, presenting answers and explaining how he arrived at a psak.

Rabbi Cohen emphasizes the value of every minute of learning. Eleven years ago. he started a 10-minute *shiur* in *Nach* before the daily $Shacharis\ minyan$. Two years ago, the group completed the entire Nach and has now begun learning it a second time. Rabbi Cohen also delivers a brief shiur between the daily Minchah-Maariv minyan. In 25 years, the members have completed all of Mishnayos, Avos d'Rav Nassan, Kitzur Shulchan Aruch, and maseches

"I love doing these things," comments Rabbi Cohen. "It shows that if you stick to something, you can have major accomplishments in short amounts of time."

The Erika Neter Mayer Women's

Learning Division offers programs for women and girls. There are various shiurim throughout the week, a Rosh Chodesh mother-daughter seudah, a summer lecture series, and yemei iyun. Many of these shiurim are given by leading personalities, including Rebbetzin Cohen. She has initiated a number of programs, including teaching the art of baking challah.

The Yeshivah Program is designed for boys who have returned from Eretz Yisrael and are seeking a framework to continue their learning while attending college. More than 100 boys have attended the program, and it has had an incredible impact on them as they move into the next phase of their

Growing in Avodas Hashem

Rabbi Cohen's philosophy is that every Yid, no matter where he is in life, must keep growing in his avodas Hashem. "It does not say anywhere in Shulchan Aruch that a person should stop growing when he or she leaves yeshivah or seminary. A person must constantly be searching for ways to shteig." To help his kehillah members meet this

goal, Rabbi Cohen has created MAP – "Make a Plan," with GPS, "Growth and Personal *Shteiging*," as their guide. "I encourage people to do what they can to continue *shteiging* despite the responsibilities of parenting and parnassah," he says. How is this accomplished? Kehillah

members are strongly encouraged to make time in their day or week to attend one or more of the many learning programs offered by the shul. In addition, Rabbi Cohen directs a popular mussar vaad for baalei batim on Thursday evenings. Vaad members work on various kabbalos, and Rabbi Cohen delivers divrei chizuk with the same passionate enthusiasm that inspired the bachurim in Skokie Yeshiva.

Yakov Weil, a member of Adas Yeshurun, commented, "Rabbi Cohen is an incredible person and has unbelievable energy. Our shul consists of all types, and we all get along because of Rabbi Cohen; he is the glue that keeps us all together."
Rabbi Mordechai Millunchick, director

of development for Adas Yeshurun, testified, "Rabbi Cohen cares about other people. Not a day goes by that he does not call a sick person in the hospital, someone who is homebound, or just someone who needs

Rabbi and Rebbetzin Cohen also serve as role models for how a Yid should live, exemplifying the best principles of shalom bayis and chinuch habanim. They were zocheh to raise four wonderful children, who are now married and raising their own families, while involved in limud and harbotzas haTorah in Lakewood and Chicago.

Choshen Mishpat Kollel

Fourteen years ago, after entering full-time *rabbanus* at Adas Yeshurun, Rabbi

Cohen set out to establish the Choshen Mishpat Kollel to increase awareness of business halachah in the Chicago commu-

nity. The kollel, which is closely affiliated with Harav Chaim Kohn and the Business Halacha Institute in New York, has 18 yungeleit who spend their mornings engrossed in intense learning of Choshen Mishpat with Rabbi Cohen. In the afternoons, the yungeleit are involved in other aspects of the community; some are Rabbanim, some work in *chessed* organizations, and others serve as rebbeim in local veshivos. The kollel also runs a hotline that takes she'eilos from all over Chicago and beyond, and is involved in producing a weekly newsletter in conjunction with the Business Halacha

During a recent Choshen Mishpat Awareness Week, yungeleit spoke on Choshen Mishpat in venues around the community, including the day schools. "The entire community was buzzing about Choshen Mishpat," recalls Rabbi Henoch Plotnik.

A Ray for the Entire Community
Rabbi Cohen has been very involved in
the Chicago community on a wide scale and is active in many projects for the betterment of Yiddishkeit in Chicagoland and beyond. Rebbetzin Cohen is also a very beloved fig-ure among the women of Chicago. A social worker by profession, she delivers a popular parenting class and many other *shiurim* for the women and girls of Chicago. She has also taught kallos for 20 years and is now in charge of the educational activities of Daughters of Israel, which coordinates these classes.

Under the guidance and encouragement of Harav Yitzchok Feigelstock, Rabbi Cohen was instrumental in building the West Rogers Park eruv about 20 years ago. His weekly vaadim for mechanchim are extremely popular. He has also established a special beis din to handle sensitive commu-nity issues necessary to protect our children. This is one of the very few batei din in the country that deals exclusively with these

A few years ago, at the behest of Harav Avrohom Chaim Levin, shlita, Rosh Yeshivah of Telshe Chicago, Rabbi Cohen was active in establishing the Midwest Council of Agudah Rabbanim, which enables 20 Rabbanim from about 20 Midwest cities to work together for the betterment of their kehillos.

Rabbi Yehiel Kalish, Agudath Israel's national director of government affairs and a former Chicago resident, described Rabbi Cohen's impact on the Jewish community.

"Rabbi Cohen is a real mevakesh - and he has not stopped learning a full morning seder since he was in ninth grade! It is not possible to describe the impact that Rabbi Cohen has had on the Chicago community and beyond. He has a tremendous influence on people. People call him with she'eilos from all over, and he answers in a very per-sonal way. He is a baal eitzah with whom one can share everything that is going on in his life. Personally, I feel very close to him, and he is always concerned about how things are in my family — but he is like that with so many people. " Rabbi Henoch Plotnik, Rav of

Congregation Bais Tefila, has known Rabbi Cohen since they were young boys growing up in Boston. "Rabbi Cohen has the pulse of the American baal habayis and knows how to give over mesikus haTorah and geshmak in tefillah. He has taken a lead role in the community and addresses problems that others don't want to address. He accomplishes so much because he loves people and can relate to them all, and in return, they respond with love and follow his example in avodas Hashem."
