Rabbi's Message: Our People Lives

On October 7, we were stunned by Hamas's horrific invasion of Israel. On October 15, we launched Project Amichai at Temple Emanu-El.

Since that day, we have stood together to connect with and support Israel and each other. Since that day, we have prayed, fasted, meditated, engaged in ritual, counseled, advocated, researched, read, created, encouraged, learned, discussed, comforted, fundraised, written, and donated. Since that day, we have felt fear, rage, and grief; but we have also experienced courage, determination, and hope. We have cried out but also spoken out; we have anguished but also acted.

As I write these words, we have just welcomed the new year of 2024, and there are rumors of further hostage

releases. By the time you read this message, another month will have passed. Although I pray for good news and for peace, I do not know what has happened in Israel during those intervening weeks. But I know what has happened here at Temple Emanu-El:

Support and meditation. Daily prayer for Israel. Weekly challah-making to amplify these prayers. Exploring, recommending, and contributing to charities that aid and uplift our people in Israel. Advocating for Israel with government officials, on university campuses, and in the media. Combating disinformation and spreading truth. Crafting and selling bracelets to feed hungry Israelis. Supporting members of the Israel Defense Forces and consoling the families of those who gave their lives for the Jewish State.


And the continuation of our special monthly Project Amichai events: This

Our people lives. Am Yisrael Chai!

President's Message: **Engagement**

Lately, it seems that a lot of people have been talking to me about engagement – at board meetings, at onegs, and with the Membership Committee. So, I thought it might be nice to talk about it here. To be sure we are all talking about the same thing, I looked up the definition of engagement. While there are many different meanings of the word, the context for us is involvement.

We experience fantastic involvement when there is a major event, either positive or negative. When Hurricane Ian hit around the High Holidays in 2022, our congregation mobilized. Every household was called by a phone squad of over 60 people, houses were opened up to those who needed to evacuate, and assistance was given to those who needed it. When the horrific attack in Israel occurred on October 7, hundreds gathered in solidarity, and even more participated - and continue to participate - in the quickly launched Project Amichai. On the positive side, look at Mitzvah Day. That annual event currently attracts over 400 people leading and participating in meaningful projects.

So, I think when people express concern or question about engagement, they are asking how to keep people involved on a routine or ongoing basis, especially in light of our increased membership. Looking at Temple Emanu-El, there is certainly no lack of opportunity. Religious services, study sessions, classes, social events they are all there, in abundance. And there are several ways to know what's coming up. Check out the articles and flyers in the Temple Times (after you finish reading this article (29). Or go to the temple website and look at the Events list or the calendar.

Getting people involved is a twoway street – we need to draw new members in, and new members need to find their niche. Many long-standing members attend services and events routinely. They know lots of temple members and are comfortable being there. I would encourage those members to look around at an oneg, or a class, or a program, and see if there is someone you don't know, maybe standing alone. Go over and introduce yourself, ask them to join you, introduce them to others. I actually have a similar suggestion for our newer members. Try several different venues - attend events, join a committee, lead a project. See what appeals to you. And when there, introduce yourself to others. Not so comfortable breaking into a small group of friends? Find someone else standing alone and strike up a conversation, learn a little about each other. Your network and your participation will grow.

Why did I focus on engagement? Because being involved will make your temple membership so much more rewarding. Trust me, I speak from experience.



Inspiration and Optimism in 2024

The objectives of this article are to help you with two challenges. The first challenge is to deliver focus and clarity to the endless choices we have for philanthropy. The second challenge is to highlight how generosity may be directed specifically to help current and future beneficiaries.

A remedy for the exhausting feeling of "choice overload" can be delivered by identifying (1) causes that you value (2) causes that appreciate your support (3) causes that you want to flourish. Once you have answered the three questions, exhaustion subsides and is replaced by inspiration and optimism. However, the last question is the most powerful. The last question is (4) what are the other sources of support? Overwhelmingly, Jewish organizations receive most of their support from Jews. Temple Emanu-El is a self-sustaining entity because of the support and generosity of its members.

There is a saying in Judaism, L'dor Va-Dor, which means from generation to generation. Typically, it is understood to mean the transmission of values, rituals, traditions, and history to the next generation.

What if we expanded the definition to include the successful continuity of Temple Emanu-El? Shouldn't future generations in Sarasota, FL, enjoy the congregation which has provided all of us with an innovative and engaging Jewish community?

The second goal of this article is to highlight how generosity can be directed specifically to help the fam-

ilies of Temple Emanu-El in 2024 and beyond 2024. Let us start with a question, "Will your gift be endowed or expendable?"

An endowed gift supports a permanent, self-sustaining source of funding. Endowment assets are invested for potential growth. In this way, an endowment can increase and provide support for its designated purpose. An expendable gift is money given by a donor that is to be deployed immediately for a current priority.

It is logical to ask, "How do I know which type of gift is right for me?" Making a charitable gift is a very per-

sonal decision. Temple needs both endowed and expendable gifts to support its mission now and in the future. Determining the impact you hope to have may lead you toward one gift type versus the other. I would be happy to have a conversation with you to help you explore your options.







Opher Library: Yiddish is Making a Comback!


Between 1880 and 1914, around 2 million Yiddish-speaking Jews immigrated to the United States from Eastern Europe, bringing not only their language but also their culture. This influx gave rise to Yiddish newspapers, theaters, and various political and cultural groups. Following World War II and the establishment of the state of Israel, the use of Yiddish declined in the broader community, but it persisted within many Jewish households. Adults, especially, would resort to Yiddish when discussing juicy gossip or telling jokes without the kids catching on.

In recent years, there has been a revival of interest in Yiddish as people seek a connection to their Jewish heritage. Its rich cultural expressions, humor, philosophy, and distinctive idioms set it apart among languages, offering a lively and unique experience. Interested individuals can even take Yiddish lessons online!

Our TEE library is fortunate to have a selection of instructive and fun Yiddish-themed books that are sure to delight, regardless of your ability to speak Yiddish.

The New Joys of Yiddish by Leo Rosten is considered the true classic dictionary of the Yiddish language in America. Containing Yiddish, Hebrew and Yinglish words combined with wit, jokes, and cultural history, it literally exemplifies the vibrancy of Jewish life in America.

Meshuggenary by Payson R. Stevens, et al, is an introduction to the influence of the Yiddish language and culture in America. It offers a wealth of expressions (and insults) and highlights the effect that Yiddish has had on American life.



Michael Wex, in *Born To Kvetch*, explores how Yiddish, with its distinct phrases, idioms and expressions, played a crucial role in helping European Jews endure persecution, as they never ceased to "kvetch". In *Just Say Nu*, Wex instructs the reader how to use Yiddish to spice up daily conversation, because "Sometimes English will just not do!" This book tells us there is nothing in this world that can't be improved by being translated into Yiddish!

Yiddish with Dick and Jane, by Ellis Weiner and Barbara Davilman, is hysterical! With the classic Dick and Jane characters, readers learn to express their feelings and attitudes in ways that only Yiddish can. Dick "schmoozes" and Jane "schleps".

We hope this month you'll visit the library to enjoy the spirit of Yiddish themed books.

Introducing Kaplan Scholar-in-Residence Deborah Dash Moore, Ph.D.

The Kaplan Scholar-in-Residence Committee is proud to invite the community to learn from Deborah Dash Moore, Ph.D. on Friday evening, February 23, and Saturday morning, February 24. The Frederick G.L. Huetwell Professor of History and Professor of Judaic Studies at the University of Michigan, Dr. Dash Moore is an expert on American Jewish history, twentieth century urbanization, and documentary photography. She serves as editor-in-chief of the ten-volume Posen Library of Jewish Culture and Civilization and is the award-winning author of many books and publications, including *GI Jews: How World War II Changed a Generation; To the Golden Cities: Pursuing the American Jewish Dream in Miami and L.A.*; and *Urban Origins of American Judaism*. Dr. Dash Moore received her Ph.D. from Columbia University and has taught at Vassar College, the University of Pennsylvania, and the Hebrew University of Jerusalem.

"The committee decided to build on last year's topic, which focused on the role of Yiddish in the lives of early Jewish immigrants as well as the scholars of Jewish ghettos in Eastern Europe," explained Scholar-in-Residence Committee co-chair Ellen Klein. "This year's scholar will share the development of American Judaism in more recent times."

"This is a very personal story for many of us with families that started in the large urban centers up north," added Scholar-in-Residence Committee co-chair Wendy Wicks. "It explains the migration across this vast country."

Dr. Dash Moore will join our rabbis on the bima during Shabbat services on Friday, February 23, at 7:15 p.m. to speak on "GI Jews: How World War II Changed a Generation."

This fascinating and timely presentation will chart the lives of fifteen young Jewish men as they faced military service and tried to make sense of its demands, simultaneously wrestling with what it meant to be an American and a Jew. She will speak again on Saturday, February 24, at 10:30 a.m., addressing the topic "From Ghetto to Suburbs: Transforming Jewish Life."

"Immigrants from Europe came to cities of U.S.," Dr. Dash Moore stared. "No sooner did they settle, they picked up and moved inland to seek their fortunes." This presentation will demonstrate how the children of East European immigrants both preserved and reshaped their parents' ethnic consciousness in the new world.

Serving on the Scholar-in-Residence Committee are Cindy and Dan Aminoff, Rita Feder, Rabbi Elaine Rose Glickman, Toby Halpern, Dr. Janet Hiller, Arnold Kaplan, Dr. Ike and Judith Koziol, Philip Meltzer, Esther Rose, and Ellen Zipin. 

TEE STARFISH INITIATIVE



TEE Starfish Volunteers Team with All Faiths Food Pantry for Food Insecure Families

When we first began the Temple Emanu-El (TEE) Starfish Initiative seven years ago, we designed the initiative for Kindergarten students and teachers at Wilkinson Elementary School, a Title I (high poverty) school in the Sarasota County School District, to close the vocabulary gap, which often compounds the achievement gap between these at-risk students and their peers from other socioeconomic groups; inspire a love of reading and increase reading readiness skills; support integration of hands-on science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics (STEAM) learning programs/activities; and increase the students' life skills, self-esteem, and confidence through intergenerational mentoring. But when on the school campus that first Starfish year, Larry Barnet, one of the Starfish founders, could not ignore the fact that school personnel could no longer staff the on-campus All Faiths Food Pantry (AFFP) and sprang into action to create a Starfish Food Pantry volunteer team to continue the collaboration with All Faiths Food Bank. This was a natural addition to Starfish, given the synagogue's longtime support for All Faiths. Larry knew that food insecurity and hunger can negatively affect children's school performance.

In a research survey, more than 60% of children interviewed from low-income homes reported coming

to school hungry. Hunger can negatively affect children's cognitive development, concentration, memory, mood, motor skills, ability to build social-emotional skills, form friendships, maintain self-control, and listen to instructions (Share Our Strength. [2023, December 28]. How does hunger affect learning? No Kid Hungry. https://www.nokidhungry. org/blog/how-does-hunger-affectlearning#:~:text=Beyond%20academic%20achievement%2C%20 hunger%20can,child's%20social%20 interactions%20and%20behavior.) Importantly, AFFP estimates that without pantries 45,000 children in Sarasota County will go hungry over the summer when they do not get fed at school. Therefore, adding the food pantry program to the Starfish Initiative was a natural move.

When Larry and his wife Wendy moved from Sarasota to be closer to family, Susan Meisel aptly took over for Larry, and when Susan and her team expanded their efforts to another community location, Marc Halman stepped in, and continues to



look for ways to expand the services provided. Marc and the team serve an average of thirty-six families every other week. Before Thanksgiving AFFP supplied turkeys with all the fixings. After a lot of internal marketing by Marc, the Starfish Pantry served ninety families.

Unity Dinner Raises Nearly \$100,000 for Leket Israel

On December 6, Temple Emanu-El was honored to host a Unity Dinner that raised nearly \$100,000 for Leket Israel's emergency relief campaign for displaced Israelis. The dinner was the most recent event in a long partnership between Leket - Israel's national food bank, whose name means "gleaning" in Hebrew - and Temple Emanu-El. Senior Rabbi Brenner Glickman serves on the national board of American Friends of Leket. The organization's executive, Lauren Yoked, was the speaker at Temple Emanu-El's inaugural Israel Shabbat. The Unity Dinner's generous lead sponsor was the Iewish Federation of Sarasota-Manatee, one of the first Jewish Federations in the country to support Leket.

Originally conceived as a celebratory party to honor the twentieth anniversary of Leket, the event became a solemn fundraising opportunity after October 7th.

"From that moment on, we have been wholly consumed with providing emergency humanitarian aid to tens of thousands of Israelis under fire – families living in bomb shelters, evacuees, the elderly, farmers whose land has been destroyed and many more," Yoked stated. "This is in addition to the normal work that we do, providing 234,000 Israelis in need with fresh, rescued produce and cooked meals each week."

The centerpiece of the Unity Dinner was a high-level briefing from Leket founder and chairman Joseph Gitler, who had planned to travel to Sarasota for the event but decided to remain in Israel to continue coordinating Leket's on-the-ground efforts. A question-and-answer opportunity followed moderated by Rabbi Glickman.

"The war has significantly impacted all the citizens of Israel, regardless of religion or ethnicity," Gitler related, "both on an emotional level and in

their day-to-day lives. Farmers are unable to harvest their crops, causing a produce shortage and rising prices in the supermarkets. It has become increasingly difficult for families to purchase fresh food, and unfortunately, the need will only continue to grow. "It is Leket's obligation to leverage our years of experience in the field, our logistical knowledge, and our resources to aid as many people as we can," he added. "Countless people across the nation have suffered the loss of their loved ones, homes, and their sense of safety, and Leket Israel is committed to guaranteeing that no one will experience hunger during this critical time" he remarked.

Funds raised at the Unity Dinner have enabled tens of thousands of pounds of fresh produce, cooked meals, essentials for babies and toddlers, direct aid, and much more to reach families, the elderly, evacuees, and farmers across the country. Additional funds are sought to expand Leket's operations; each \$180, Yoked noted, provides cooked meals for 30 families in need.

We are proud of Temple Emanu-El's deep support of the Unity Dinner and of Leket Israel. Speaking on behalf of the Federation was Temple member Tommy Bernstein, and among the Host Committee were Rabbis Elaine and Brenner Glickman, Trustee Megan

and Dr. Adam Heller, and NEFESH benefactors Barbara and Laurance Newman. Many other Temple members were in attendance and the Junior Sisterhood also purchased a table.

Leket Israel was one of the first charities highlighted by Project Amichai's Tzedakah Initiative; and following the Unity Dinner, Amichai's Bracelet-Making Initiative designated Leket Israel as its next beneficiary.






