# Rabbi's Message: About My Ritual Garb

People are asking why I do not wear a yarmulke. It is a good question! I addressed this issue in detail when I first came to the temple. Yet that was a long ago, and the majority of our membership has joined since that time. I therefore offer here a reprint of an article that I wrote about my ritual garb. Looking back at it now, I realize that I feel very similar today as I did then. From the Temple Times, 2006:

A number of people have asked me recently why I do not wear a yarmulke at services.

I admit that I am surprised by how many times this has come up, since it was not an issue when I arrived at my last congregation; none of the rabbis there had worn a yarmulke in the past century. Since it seems to be a widespread curiosity, I thought that I would address it here to all and hope that it might lead to further discussion.

During services, I choose to wear a tallis and not a yarmulke. One of the aspects I find most rewarding about Reform Judaism is that it empowers us to think independently – we do not have one way or one tradition. When it comes to ritual matters, we look to our traditional practices and adopt those aspects that we find meaningful. I am delighted to see in the congregation each Shabbat that there are a number of people with their heads covered

and a number with heads bare. We are not Orthodox in asking everyone to cover the head, nor Classical Reform in asking everyone to take off their covering (as was the case in Reform congregations in the early 20th century). We are free and diverse.

I find wearing a tallis to be deeply meaningful. It is a commandment of the Torah to wear a garment with fringes and the tallis has become a symbol of the Torah's obligations as a whole. The number of fringes and knots on a tallis totals 613, the same number of precepts in the Torah. When I wrap myself in a tallis, I feel the weight of thousands of years of tradition. In wearing it, I affirm the centrality of the mitzvot and my willingness to live by them.

I do not, personally, find the kippah to be as meaningful. It is not a mitzvah of the Torah; but, rather a centuries-old custom. In the Torah, there is no commandment to cover the head. The only mention we have of headwear is that a hat was part of the list of priestly vestments. Later in the Bible, covering the head was a ritual of mourning, a practice observed by both King David and Haman, among others. In the Talmud, the great sages would cover their heads; but, it was considered presumptuous if others did so. Archeology has confirmed this, as mosaics from the time of the Talmud represent Jews without head covering. It was not until medieval times that covering the head came



to be seen as a sign of respect for God among Jews in the general population. This was regarded as halacha in many places, but only custom in France and Spain. It was not until the 17th century that the wearing of the yarmulke became a truly universal practice among Ashkenazic Jews. It became important as a symbol of Jewish particularity and a rejection of gentile practices. Today, the yarmulke remains the symbol of Jewish particularity. Many people find it meaningful to wear a kippah as an outward expression of Jewish identity. I appreciate that this may be meaningful for other people; but, I hope that you can see why it is not especially meaningful for me personally. For me, there is little value in expressing outwardly my own Jewishness when everyone already knows that I am a rabbi.

I do not have any objection to wearing a yarmulke per se. I own many, and wear them in Conservative or Orthodox congregations in respect to their customs and as a proper guest. There was a time when I used to wear a yarmulke regularly, even out on the street. I stopped when it no longer felt meaningful to me.

For the past ten years, ironically enough, I actually find it quite meaningful to *not* wear a yarmulke. For one reason, a bare head is an expression of solidarity with our Reform heritage, of which I am very proud. More importantly, though, the bare head is to me a symbol that Judaism is about ethical commandments more than ritual piety. If I, as a rabbi, do not wear a yarmulke, it suggests that there is more to being pious than what one wears. Of course, one can wear a yarmulke and be ethical. However, wearing a yarmulke or not wearing a yarmulke is a lot about making a statement. For me, the bare head is a statement that there is more to being a Jew than ritual garb.

I understand that for some members of the congregation, it just does not feel right for a rabbi not to wear a yarmulke. Ideally, I want everyone to feel comfortable in our synagogue and feel comfortable with me as your rabbi. I hope that those who would prefer I wear a yarmulke know this: I do not take this matter lightly. I hope that my reasoning above gives some illumination as to my thinking on this matter, and I hope that it can lead to further dialogue. This is not the end of the issue, but the beginning.

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

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# Securing the Future While Helping Today

What is the purpose and goal of Temple Emanu-El's Endowment Fund? The answer is to ensure the future continuity of the programs and services TEE and its members have come to expect and enjoy. # School Safety Resources from Parkland Father

The Friends of Religious Action Center (FRAC) Temple Emanu-El committee heard a moving and inspiring presentation by Max Schachter. His son Alex was one of the 17 victims murdered in the Parkland school shooting on Valentine's Day 2018. Max is the founder and executive director of the 501(c)(3) Safe Schools for Alex. During his presentation, Max shared steps to take and the resources now available to help parents, teachers and

administrators increase safety in our schools. It was truly inspiring to hear Max share some information about his son and to realize that he has moved from the anguish of losing Alex to having a real impact to prevent future tragedies.

#### Steps To Take To Increase School Safety

- Educate self-regarding situation in schools and best practices
- Speak with school boards, superintendents, and school administrators
- Talk to law enforcement officials regarding plans to deal with violence in schools
- Get students involved by starting a Safe Schools for Alex chapter in their school
- Reduce bullying as it has direct correlation to those who become school shooters
- Make sure the School Safety Dashboard and Threat Assessments are being used effectively

SAFE SCHOOLS FOR ALEX has created a school safety dashboard that makes reported Florida school safety incident data easily accessible at SafeSchoolsfor-Alex.org. It lists information like number of drug sales, weapons, fighting, bullying, altercations, in school suspensions, and out of school suspensions for each Florida school. Understanding which incidents are already occurring is critical for prevention. We also learned that Florida has an app to enable easy reporting of suspicious activity available at fldoe.org/safe-schools. Middle and High School students should be made aware of this tool as school shooters do give advance indications of their plans to their peers. Other critical resources on safe-schoolsforalex.org are tools for school threat assessments and low-cost practices for immediate implementation.

FRAC is the Temple Emanu-El committee providing the opportunity for interested participants to join together in the pursuit of social justice in all forms consistent with Jewish values. We take our guidance and inspiration from The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (RAC.org). With Russia's invasion of Ukraine, and the brutal news of war, the March 2nd "Lunch with the Rabbis" included a special, up-to-the-minute report. Joining Senior Rabbi Brenner Glickman and Associate Rabbi Michael Shefrin was distinguished guest Diana Fiedotin, Senior Director of the Joint Distribution Committee, who explained the history of Ukraine and Ukrainian Jewry as well as shared updates on Jewish-led

relief efforts and ways to support Ukrainian refugees.

"So many of us saw the horrific images from Ukraine and heard about the plight of her people and refugees," Rabbi Elaine commented. "As Jews who have known too well what it is to flee our homes and communities in times of war, we feel a special obligation and calling to help.

"It's easy to feel far away and helpless," she added. "But Diana helped us understand what was happening on the ground, the organizations that are making a difference for Ukrainians, and how we can provide support even from halfway across the globe."

In addition to this important event, Temple Emanu-El continues to seek ways to raise awareness of and support for Ukrainian Jewry – and Ukrainian refugees of all faiths and backgrounds. #### Susan Schwaid Early Learning Center


Did you know that there are standards in Florida for education in preschool? When children come through our program, they are given opportunities to learn and grow every single day. Our teachers work diligently to ensure the standards are met through purposeful play and planned activities. There are multiple categories of standards, including physical development, approaches to learning, social and emotional development, language and literacy, mathematical thinking, scientific inquiry, social studies, and creative expression through the arts.

Each category has standards for ages birth-kindergarten. Here are some examples of specific standards and what we do to meet them:

For our VPK students, they are expected to "demonstrate use of large muscles for movement, position, strength and coordination". We are so fortunate to have the bikes that were donated to us for students to practice these large muscle movements. We also have a gorgeous playground that the students get to run, climb, and jump on daily. Another standard for this age is to "demonstrates ability to self-regulate." This deals with handling emotions but also making choices. Students are given choices as to what center they want to go to. As they get older, they begin to be more open to non-preferred activities. Allowing them a choice provides them with the opportunity to develop this skill.

For our younger children, ages 2-3, the choices we provide during open centers allows them to "explore the environment with purpose and flexibility." What resides at each center is there for a purpose. The students choose which center to attend. Our teachers are working their way around to each center, engaging in conversation and play with the children. This allows us to develop their listening and speaking skills. One of the standards is, "Demonstrates understanding when listening," followed by the specific benchmark of, "engages in multiple backand-forth communicative interactions with adults and peers during creative play and in purposeful and novel situations." This back-and-forth communication is heard from peers playing together as well as between staff and children in every classroom!







One of our newest books on the topic is: The Light of Days, The Untold Story: Women Resistance Fighters in Hitler's Ghettos by Judy Batalion. These were young idealistic ladies who ran towards the fight, not away from it. It made me proud to read about them. Women were used as couriers because they were easier to pass off as gentiles. For one thing they could not be checked for circumcision! The book focuses on a great many heroines. I didn't want to put the book down before seeing if they got out of their latest tight spot. Some did not. They listed the people who appeared in the book. I wish they had included their date of death.

On a happier note, we had a book sale. The library is now \$12.00 richer. As you can guess, there are still plenty of books for sale. Thank you, Cindy Aminoff, for your help.

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




