Rabbi's Message: B"H What About God?

This past summer, I was invited to introduce a panel at a national conference for Reform Jewish leaders. I was extremely excited, extremely flattered – and extremely intimidated. My fellow speakers were a professor who had authored a ten-book series on Jewish liturgy; the senior clergy of the oldest synagogue in Toronto, which has over 7,000 members; and a rabbi soon to receive a Ph.D. in *halachah*, Jewish law.

The four of us met with the conference organizers via Zoom. In a lively, wonderful conversation, the panelists discussed the history of the Ethical Culture Society, a non-essentialist definition of synagogue, and the curation of Jewish identity in a digital age. I tried to keep up – until, suddenly, these brilliant rabbis and scholars abruptly fell silent.

This was the question that silenced them: What about God?

What about God?

If this question silences you, you're clearly not alone. Jews have a hard time talking about God. We speak of the beauty of Judaism, its values and teachings, its history and holidays. We speak of persecution and suffering, of triumph and hope, of art and start-ups and cuisine. We speak of Torah and prayer, family and community, continuity, and pride.

These are beautiful things of which to speak. These are beautiful parts of being Jewish. But maybe it would be even more beautiful if we talked about God. If, even, we talked to God.

That's what I told my fellow panelists, and what I told the conference of two hundred Reform Jewish leaders. And if I've ever counseled you, or studied with you, I may well have told you the same thing. And if I haven't already, well, I'm doing it now.

Talking to God is easier than it sounds. We don't need to understand God, or explain God, or even be one hundred percent certain that we believe in God. We just have to be willing to try.

How do we try? Start small. While I definitely encourage you to go to Temple and talk to God there, you can actually talk to God anytime and anywhere. When you're stressed or scared, try whispering those feelings to God. When you're grateful or happy, try whispering those feelings to God. When you're wondering and uncertain, try whispering those feelings to God.

It might feel strange at first. But after a while, it might also feel sort of wonderful. It might even feel like a gift – a gift of believing that there's a Presence in this world greater than ourselves. That there's a Presence that cares about us, that wants to hear from us. That there's a God who loves us.

In the words of Rabbi Nachman of Breslov: ... You will be able to express yourself before God in the same way that a person speaks to a friend. You should get into the habit of talking to God like this. As if you were speaking to your teacher or your friend. For God is close by. God can be found everywhere. The whole earth is full of God's glory.





President's Message: Tzedakah

"Put a penny in the pushke." How many of us heard that as kids, perhaps our first introduction to the concept of tzedakah? Tzedakah refers to the religious obligation to do what is right and just, but is commonly viewed as the act of giving charity. And that is the focus of this month's article.

For the year 5784 this may have started with the Yom Kippur Appeal which I made at the Kol Nidre service. Hopefully we are doing well with that, and there is still opportunity to contribute.

But charity goes well beyond the High Holy Days. Tzedakah – charity – is a mitzvah, a commandment or a good deed. And there are many opportunities to perform that mitzvah. Recognize a life cycle event – yours or a friend's - by making a donation to Temple Emanu-El. The gift can go into the general operating fund, or to a named fund designated for a specific purpose. Donations can be made in memory of someone, either a recent loss or a Yahrtzeit. Or thank someone for an act of kindness. The amount you donate is entirely up to you, and we will be grateful for your generosity.

In 2023 we were very fortunate to have received three large donations. The first of these was an anonymous donation of \$3,250,000 from "Papa Joe" to substantially offset dues payment for families with children in the religious school. Known as "Our Jewish Future", this donation encourages and enables parents and children to experience Jewish learning, Jewish life, Jewish community, and Jewish joy. The second was a gift of \$208,000 to create the Diane and Norman Cohen Endowed Israel Fund. The money will be expended over many years for Israel-related activities, such as speakers, scholars, and Israel celebrations. The

third is a commitment for \$10,000 per year for the next five years from Barbara and Larry Newman to establish the NEFESH initiative. This gift will be used to expand and develop programs to keep kids interested and engaged in Jewish activities through their high school years and beyond. We are grateful to Papa Joe, the Cohens, and the Newmans for their extreme generosity.

Another opportunity to contribute is the fundraising gala currently in the works. This year we will be honoring Barbara Brizdle. Barbara has been a member of Temple Emanu-El for several years and has been instrumental in supporting leadership development. Her donations have supported conference attendance and board retreats. Beyond that, Barbara has been instrumental in supporting many local organizations, including Ringling College of Art and Design, Jewish Family and Children's Services, Nate's Honor Animal Rescue, and Planned Parenthood. The gala will consist of a brunch on Sunday, February 4, 2024. I hope you will be able to join us.



Create Your Jewish Legacy - How Do I Begin?

The answer is different for everyone. Whether you already have a will or are just getting started, it's always good to think of how you want to be remembered. First, reflect on your Jewish passions. What is important to you about your faith and people? What work in the community do you want to support? Your Legacy Gift can be directed to specific programs and can be funded during your lifetime or distributed from your estate.

Do I Need a Will?

If you have a current will, just a few additional sentences in the form of a codicil are enough to create a legacy gift. You should not assume that your family knows your wishes, so preparing a bequest with your attorney is important. While the impact of your legacy gift will be most clearly felt by the community, once you are gone your heirs may experience tax advantages.

Art Committee News

Committee member Marni Mount, whose daughters attended religious school and who currently holds the position of B'nai Mitzvah Coordinator, is the main liaison with the school for questions and coordination with Snait Ben-Herut, MJED, director. On Saturday evening, December 2, there will be a special opening reception for the participants and their families, and for other temple members who would like to celebrate their creativity. Reservation information will be forthcoming.

"Given the wide age range of potential participants, we are encouraging an equally wide range of art mediums for the kids," says co-chair Linda Joffe. "From finger paints, crayons, clay and Legos to mosaics, jewelry, photography and sophisticated digital art, the possibilities for creativity are endless. The only caveat is that all submitted art must be 'original,' as opposed to from a kit." It is a non-juried show and there is no charge to participate.

Maccabi

I have competed as a lacrosse player since I was 6 years old. Most recently, I was a starting defenseman for the Varsity Lacrosse team at Riverview High School in Sarasota, FL. I have had a few Jewish teammates in prior seasons; however, the Maccabi Games provides a unique environment where both your teammates and all your competitors are Jewish. I explored the possibilities to participate and discovered an opportunity to play on the team sponsored by the Fort Lauderdale delegation.

The Maccabi Games is an annual Olympic style event for young Jewish Athletes. The host cities change annually, and the 2023 Maccabi Games were hosted by the David Posnack JCC in Fort Lauderdale, Florida from August 6th through August 11th. The event attracts delegations from all over the United States and includes international delegations from Israel, Europe, and South America. It was humbling to see a delegation from Ukraine participate in this year's games.

However, the Maccabi Games are not just sporting events and competitions. The games provide an unforgettable environment for athletic, social, and cultural growth. Six official Maccabi midot (values) guide the JCC Maccabi program to help remind us of the greater mission for the games. I will share three of the six that I personally experienced.

The day before the games I attended my first practice and was immediately



welcomed by my teammates and coaches. This exemplified one of the six values of the games which is "Lev Tov" which means to be "Big Hearted."

We competed against teams with athletes from Boston, Baltimore, Philadelphia, and Houston. There were also athletes from other cities that found an outlet to compete with different delegations. We were victorious in our first two games. The evening of the first day is an enormous opening ceremony that is modeled after the Olympics. There were thousands of athletes and the only venue large enough was the hockey arena for the professional NHL Florida Panthers. This was easily the largest gathering of Jewish people that I had ever experienced. After a long day of competing, I was exhausted. However, the opening ceremonies grand scale delivered the message of "Amiut Yehudit" which means "Jewish Peoplehood." Amit

Yehudit is the awareness of the underlying unity that makes an individual Jew part of the Jewish people.

As the week progressed, I got to know my teammates. Two of my teammates are cousins and they had an interesting trip that ended the day before the Maccabi Games started. The sport of lacrosse has grown rapidly in Israel with the help of generous benefactors and some Americans who have moved to Israel. They participated in a Service/Lacrosse trip to Israel in which they spent 3 weeks touring, coaching, playing, and gaining perspective on life in Israel. I was loosely aware of this program but had never met anybody who had completed the trip. At the Maccabi games, it is easier to make connections like these.

My team, Fort Lauderdale, continued to develop throughout the week and continued to win. The winning streak continued as we won the Gold Medal in the U16 Lacrosse championship. My teammates and coaches were overwhelmed with "Rina" which means "Joy." The commissioner presented us with our gold medals immediately after we shook hands with our opponents. It was a gratifying feeling.

I am thankful for all the volunteers who made the event possible. It was an enormous undertaking and I appreciate the effort and generosity.

Lastly, I encourage Jewish athletes to seek out opportunities to compete in the Maccabi games.

Two Jewish leaders, Rabbi Joachim Prinz, and Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel played notable roles during the civil rights movement. Rabbi Prinz spoke before Dr. King's "I Have a Dream"speech, while Rabbi Heschel marched alongside Dr. King in the historic Selma to Montgomery march.

In Shared Dreams: Marin Luther King, Jr. & the Jewish Community, Rabbi Marc Schneier brings to life the impressive and surprising history of Dr. King's efforts in support of the Jewish community. Rabbi Schneier explores the relationship between Jewish



and Black communities and their shared struggle for justice and civil rights in the United States.

To Stand Aside or Stand Alone:
Southern Reform Rabbis and the Civil
Rights Movement by P. Allen Krause,
is a compilation of interviews featuring twelve rabbis who reflect on
their contributions to the civil rights
movement. These rabbis, assured that
their conversations would remain
private for a quarter-century, candidly
expressed their thoughts, perspectives,
and involvement with the movement
which at the time was a dangerous and
volatile subject in the south.

Jack Nelson, author of *Terror in the Night*, recounts the 1960s Klu Klux Klan campaign against the Jews of

Mississippi for their support of the NAACP and the civil rights movement. The bombing of two synagogues and a rabbi's home led to the FBI and local law enforcement becoming involved in the capture of those responsible.

To gain a deeper insight into our Jewish participation in the fight for civil rights within our nation, we encourage you to visit the library to explore these books, as well as numerous others on this topic.
