Toward Renewal and a Community of Belonging: The congregational report on diversity, equity, and inclusion

~ from the TBE Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Data Analysis Committee. We are each created B'Tzelem Elohim (in the image of the Divine)

Two years ago, we put out a call to our congregation and 218 of our Temple Beth El members responded to a community assessment – an online survey and several online and in person listening meetings – focused on the ways in which our congregation supports inclusion and equity and recognizes the diversity of our Jewish community. All the data, much of it complex and in narrative form, was gathered and carefully analyzed over many months.

The Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Data Analysis Committee presented our report on the findings to the TBE Board of Directors, clergy, and Executive Director at the beginning of August. The TBE Board is preparing to publish the report, *Toward a Community of Belonging*, to the congregation very soon. Thanks to everyone at TBE for your interest, support, and patience as we worked through this long and difficult process!

The wide range of responses to the survey and listening meeting dialogues provide crucial insight into our members' perceptions of the social dynamics, concerns, and priorities of our congregation. The data demonstrates our great strengths and the progress over past years to make TBE a more welcoming community.

The data also reveals those areas where our members are asking the congregation to be more aware of biases and exclusion, and to take decisive action toward becoming a more diverse, inclusive, and equitable community in which all are valued. The voices missing from the data prompt us to notice who may not be visible or feel included in our Jewish community, and to work together to create safe and welcoming space for all of us.

In our study, we focused on three aspects of the data:

- a. how and why members participate or don't participate in the life of the congregation
- b. what **suggested actions** the TBE community can take to improve our diversity, inclusion, equity, and a stronger sense of community belonging
- c. how members are willing to **contribute**, and what **vision** we share for the future of our congregational community

Of the 182 members responding to the survey, 8 out of 10 believe TBE is doing a good job of trying to support diversity, equity, and inclusion. Yet 54% of everyone participating in the wider community assessment also spoke of barriers to their feeling of belonging and their ability to participate in temple programs and activities.

What are some of the strengths our members identify and value?

- our very responsive and aware clergy
- women in leadership roles
- efforts to welcome and support new members and interfaith families
- strong recognition of and support for LGBTQ+ members and families
- a sense that TBE is doing what it can to include everyone

What are some of the challenges or barriers members have named?

The challenges or barriers to inclusion and participation identified by TBE members fall broadly into two categories:

- members' need for greater personal connection with the TBE community, and a deeper sense of belonging. This was experienced primarily by seniors, new members, single women, families without children, interfaith families, and young adults.
- members who feel excluded, unheard, unseen, or unacknowledged within the congregation because of race, ethnicity, or culture; disability, age, gender, political views, or as a Jewish person by choice.

All the barriers mentioned in the data are too numerous to include here. We welcome you to explore them in the DEI Report when it is distributed to the congregation in September.

What are some of the suggestions TBE members offer for strengthening our congregation's ability to welcome, include, and uplift everyone involved in TBE?

Our members ask us to keep doing what we already do well, and to build on successful approaches supporting everyone's visibility, sense of belonging, and participation. The data we collected from 218 of our members gives us a roadmap for journeying toward our shared future. It is a call for thoughtful, longrange, sustainable strengthening and renewal rather than quick fixes that only address a few challenges in the culture, structure, and social dynamics of our community.

The most frequent suggestions include:

- building more intentional, inclusive relationships among members and families
- learning about and working with our differences and shared interests
- developing a more participatory community approach to resolving problems and making decisions that impact the whole congregation

The approaches mentioned in the data include educational programs and activities to raise our understanding of, and responses to, diversity, equity, and inclusion issues in our congregation. Members are asking us to

- continue having dialogue about shared concerns,
- revisit and continue to uphold our Jewish values and ethics across our congregation,
- educate ourselves to understand and value our diversity, and to fully practice equity and inclusion in our Jewish community
- find new structures and processes to help connect all our members and families, so that everyone feels they belong equitably in our community.

The TBE Congregational Report on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion will be available to the congregation in September. We invite you to read and discuss it with friends and family. Please join us in this new year as we begin congregational conversations on how we can move our community forward together. Stay tuned for more.

May we move into this New Year of learning and caring with joy and compassion.

Enjoy a Rich Heritage in the Library





For every TBE household to help fight the injustice of hunger by contributing to at least one meal at our local Housing Matters Homeless Shelter, at least once per year. Let's all, collectively, put our Jewish values of Mitzvot, Tzedakah, and Tikkun Olam into action.

Did you know, in honor of our fundamental Jewish commitment to care for the poor and hungry, our congregation collectively provides weekly, Sunday dinner for our local, Housing Matters Homeless Shelter, under the auspices of the MAZON Project? This is Temple Beth El's longest running social action program (since 1988). For comprehensive instructions and to sign up, simply use the "MAZON PROJECT" link in the SOCIAL ACTION pull-down menu on the Temple Beth El website.

Judaism teaches that every person is made b'tzelem Elohim—in God's image. In embracing the godliness of those around us, we accept a responsibility to them, and to address their struggles. As we begin this new year together, too many people will struggle with having enough food to survive.

Each week throughout the year, the Temple Beth El MAZON Project needs ten volunteers to sign up to provide Sunday dinner to the Santa Cruz Housing Matters Homeless Shelter. Each volunteer provides a portion of the meal for 72 people—four volunteers each provide an entrée to serve 18 people each; four volunteers each provide vegetables and rolls (or other starch) to serve 18 people each; and two volunteers provide dessert to serve 36 people each. Volunteers deliver their meal contributions to the Homeless Shelter on their chosen Sunday, between 2 and 4 pm. Chavurot and others can sign up to provide the entire Sunday meal as a group.

Participation in the MAZON Project will bring love and spiritual sustenance to both givers and receivers via the mystical power of home-cooked food. Also, our participation bolsters our presence and connection within our community.

Thank you very much to our compassionate congregants that have generously provided dinner to the Housing Matters Homeless Shelter every Sunday of the Year, on behalf of Temple Beth El!



TBE will continue to strongly encourage robust public health measures such as vaccination, hand-washing, masking and staying home when sick.


Employee Policy

Last year **Rabbi Shifra** and **Chelsea Mandel** suggested it would be nice to utilize, as a learning space, the upper redwood grove (above Simcha next to the gardens). I agreed, and added this idea to our team's project list. With support from **Rabbi Shifra Weiss-Penzias**, I added this idea to our team's project list. As always, the goal was to do this for as little money as possible! One way to do this was to schlep chairs up there every time we wanted to do that, a relatively inexpensive option, perhaps something you might see at a community center. That was not a TBE solution.

One of the joys of serving TBE is contributing to the creation of meaning and spirituality in not only what we may say or do but where we do it. In the beginning of July, we completed the transformation of the upper redwood grove into a learning and spiritual space...and not with plastic chairs.

As many of you may know first-hand, this past years storms brought much pain and destruction that included fallen trees. Our Soquel cemetery was no exception. With help from Chainsaw extraordinaire Mark Rosenthal, and Ken Foster and Jillian Steinberger-Foster with TerraNova (all volunteers!!) and facility manager Chris Irvine we successfully carved

up a large 100 ft tree that had fallen and miraculously did not damage any headstones. Those very large, very heavy tree rounds have now been repurposed as chairs for our upper Redwood Grove. Other than Chris' time there was no cost.

From our cemetery to children, we are continuing the cycle of life. Fittingly our children were the first to enjoy. With 65 campers enrolled (over the 4 weeks) and a dozen counselors along with 2 co-directors (**Ben Udo** and **Jess Mitchell**) **Camp Kayetz** led their Shabbat service in this new sacred space.


Socially Responsible Investing

Do your financial investments reflect your values? Are your stock or mutual funds invested in companies that work for the common good? Are you concerned that if you moved your money to socially responsible funds that your investments would not achieve the kind of growth you want and need for your family's future?

Temple Beth El's board grappled with these very issues a few years ago and made the decision to divest from fossil fuel companies, tobacco companies, and gun manufacturers. Its investments have performed just as well as, and in many respects, even better than they had before. TBE's experience is not unique and TBE is not alone in making this switch in investment strategy. Many universities, for example, the *UC* system, *Harvard*, *Princeton*, and *Brandeis*, as well as cities and states (including *Watsonville*), have moved their endowments out of fossil fuels and, in some cases, are investing in renewable energy.

TBE's **Dayenu Circle**, a collaboration of local Jewish synagogues, churches, and the Santa Cruz Zen Center, is addressing the climate crisis. One area of focus is divestment from fossil fuel companies and the banks and investment houses that finance the industry. Our Dayenu Circle has hosted two workshops to provide information on why this divestment is so important. In addition, the workshops presented resources that help identify companies that provide solid financial returns and are socially responsible. This work has been inspired and informed by the national Dayenu's (dayenu.org) With All Our Might campaign. (A report about the campaign can be found at the Dayenu website.) With an estimated \$100 billion in total assets, Jewish synagogues, federations, and community centers, have a collective power as clients, customers, and shareholders to help turn the tide on the money that is funding some of the worst aspects of climate change.

One thing we can each do as individual investors is to contact our financial institutions and let them know we want to remove fossil fuels from our investments. Hearing from customers has a powerful impact. And, talking with our neighbors, family and friends about divestment is another easy and important action we can take.

Temple School is a warm, welcoming, and caring environment, offering positive Jewish educational experiences on which our students can build their Jewish identity. Temple Beth El strives to serve as a center for the perpetuation of Judaism and diverse Jewish communal life in Santa Cruz County. We are the largest Jewish program in the region, allowing us to provide a wide variety of educational options tailored to the needs of each learner. Our wonderful and dedicated staff are passionate about Judaism, kids and building community. Join us!

Our Opening Day Picnic at 10am on September 10th at DeLaveaga Park is open to everyone, and potential students are welcome to attend any day of Temple School to see for themselves how great it is.

To register your child for temple school, please renew your TBE membership first. Financial aid is available. Registration forms, the Temple School calendar and information about all programs are on our website tbeaptos.org under LEARN.

Kindergarten through 6th graders attend Temple School on Sundays from 9:45-11:45. Our wonderful teachers cover everything from holidays, cooking, and lifecycle rituals to in-depth studies of Torah and the prophets! In addition, Temple School students also begin to study Hebrew and have weekly music and T'fillah services.

We call our innovative 4th through 6th grade midweek offerings KEF: קים (KEF) means fun in Hebrew, and also stands for Kid's Education Fun. 

Looking back, looking forward



Below are some of the many accomplishments achieved by your small but mighty team of finance, facility, administration and communications staff that includes Melissa Sunberg, Marilyn Valencia, Ana Flores, Chris Irvine, Rachel Polhamus, Eloy Vasquez and Nita Lamendola.

Security Upgrades

We have made great strides to improve security this past year. We raised \$15,000 from members, which played a pivotal role in securing a \$150,000 federal





security grant. We also completed several big projects such as a \$30,000 upgrade to security cameras and installation of boulders along Soquel which prevents vehicles access to the area used for Temple School and outdoor services. We have also added bollards in the parking lot that can be raised to provide a safe space on Simcha bike days.

TBE once again provided our facilities as a training location for *Santa Cruz Sheriff's* office. Efforts like this have deepened our relationship with law enforcement. More importantly we have enabled our likely first responders an opportunity to better understand the layout of TBE.

Summary of our projects completed as part of the 2020 grant.

Finally, our *Security Committee* remains active and plays a leadership role with the development of proposals to secure vendors for several much-anticipated major projects such as replacement of doors, a new building access system and a much-needed overhaul of security and emergency policies followed by employee training.

Camp Kayetz



Under the leadership of *Co-Directors* **Jess Mitchell** and **Ben Udo**, the camp experienced a jump in attendees with 65 campers, which is 12 more than the prior year. Plus, as a testament to the special nature of our camp, most of the counselors who are college aged (with plenty of other options) once again returned.

Simcha Preschool

August marked the beginning of Simcha's school year. Thanks to **Caitlin Clancy**, TBE's *Pre-School Director*, and a great group of teachers, we are off to a strong start. As of this writing we have only 3 half-day spots available, which is a tremendous accomplishment. In addition, we have a waitlist. Simcha's reputation has been hard earned and is a direct result of our preschool's unique Jewish-oriented programming and our exceptional

teachers. We have a high teacher retention rate and are taking steps to ensure that our staff remain part of our team.

Following graduation, this year also marked the closing of our K-1 classroom. This class was important for families during the Covid period when public schools were closed, and our program remained open.

While we have come to almost expect it, *Good Times* magazine awarded Simcha first place for *Child Daycare* in *Santa Cruz* in their *Best of Santa Cruz* issue for the 9th year in a row!!

Employee Relations

In addition to recruiting **Rachel Polhamus** to join us as our new *Manager of Operations and Development*, we were able to retain all of our employees, no easy feat in this competitive market. Rachel will be filling a critical role leading or assisting with human resources, special projects and fundraising.

Streamlining Processes

We eliminated the paper intensive processing of payroll in favor of an app that allows employees to manage hours worked and request PTO. This step eliminates data inputting and unnecessary paper allowing employees to focus on more important tasks.

Recognizing the hassle factor for parents enrolling children at Simcha, Camp Kayetz and Temple School, we rolled out a new system eliminating the need for most paper forms. In many cases the information now flows directly into our database, once again eliminating time-consuming key punching.

We have all but completed the roll out of a completely new employee handbook. Shortly following my arrival, I learned that TBE has a main employee handbook for all employees. In addition, Simcha employees have an additional layer of policies contained in a supplementary handbook. Each of TBE's contract employees has different policies that also overlay and, in some instances, supersede the employee handbook. With over 50 employees on payroll annually, including seasonal and part time staff, many with different PTO and other policies and no one staff member dedicated to human resources other than the Executive Director, the likelihood of errors and mistakes was all but inevitable.

Currently, Temple Beth El office staff adhere to the Temple Beth El Handbook from 2015, while Simcha staff refer to a combination of the 2015 handbook as well as the Simcha Personnel Policies addendum to the Handbook. The new handbook is comprehensive for employees. It is designed to bring all parts of TBE closer together (Simcha, Temple School, Camp Kayetz, 3 cemeteries and of course the Temple). Additionally, many changes and additions were made to simplify

the language where possible and updated to reflect both current law and more common work practices. Consistent with our values I have also included new benefits such as a small pension match and steep tuition support based upon a sliding scale.

High Finance

Thanks to the efforts of **John Lubell**, **Sharon Hoffman-Manning** and **Rachel Weeden**--and her team at *Morgan Stanley*—TBE repositioned funds in excess of the FDIC limit to multiple federally insured institutions thereby safeguarding TBE from losing any funds in the unlikely event of a bank failure. In addition, funds were reinvested in CD's, and we anticipate earnings to exceed \$20,000 in excess of what they were earning at *Santa Cruz County Bank*. TBE continues to confidently bank with *Santa Cruz County Bank*.

New Logo

Thanks to the assistance of my favorite artist, **Eleanora Ginsborg**, we recently rainbowed our logo to add more color to our publications



and website. This is the first of many changes to come. Later this year we plan to launch an ad-hoc committee to completely overhaul the look and feel of our website.

Cemetery

With assistance from **Terry Spodick**, **Ken Wagman** and our wonderful *Cemetery Committee* we made substantial improvements at the cemeteries. We gave a face lift to the entrance of Home of Peace and are actively working to improve landscaping at Home of Peace and Beit Olam. We also hosted two large scale volunteer days during which multiple dumpsters were filled. This year the weather challenged us but with assistance of volunteers and our facility manager we successfully chopped up a 75 foot tree, the remnants of which were used to create a new outdoor sanctuary in the redwood grove above Simcha.

Prior to Veteran's Day and working with the *Cemetery Committee*, our team helped with a major cleaning of Home of Peace which culminated with the raising of the Flags at both cemeteries. For several year the flag poles were not usable and required servicing. In addition, several **BSA Troops and Packs** completed a major service project to identify graves with Veterans, place holders and then insert flags.

Significant strides were made by **Holly Blue Hawkins** in the management of the processes used to ensure a smooth burial and also enhance our ability to sell 33 plots and a backlog of monuments. With extensive help from volunteer **Risa Lower**, Holly was able to turn her attention to restoring the Chevra Kadish and other pressing matters. This year several families requested this sacred service, and it was a real source of pride that we were able to provide this sacred tradition. As a sign of just how important our cemetery is we carved out a small office space for Holly and her team. I am pleased to report that the success of our Cemetery team allowed us to deliver a check for \$52,000 to the *Cemetery Long Term Care Fund*.

During this past year we successfully managed the transition of our gravedigger. Our new grave digging team has substantial depth in staffing and is easy to work with.

We kicked off a new committee at Beit Olam to focus on making major enhancements. This committee is comprised of temple members and others in the community who have family members buried there or who own plots. With the completion of a survey and engineering study, plans are moving forward with efforts to replace a major retaining wall adjacent to Beit Olam.

Most exciting, a new effort led by Terry Spodick is underway to expand Home of Peace by as many as two dozen plots. This is exciting news as the number of vacancies had declined to just 13 plots.

Facility Upgrades

In the back room of the Temple, we removed a spaghetti of wires and replaced it with a true server rack that will substantially improve long term maintenance of multiple servers critical for security, phones, finances and general operations.





In addition, TBE has now replaced our legacy server and in the upcoming year we plan to replace the 40-year-old wiring with modern wiring which is now essential in the transition to a cloud environment.

Office Upgrade

To make room for our two new employees, **Chris Irvine** (with help from Melissa) has converted **Sarah Clarkson's** old office into an office for two. It was a big project that required moving the Temple School Teacher library along with lots of bookcases and furniture. Finished off with fresh paint, the new office creates much-needed office space.

Other projects completed this year include: the expansion of the outdoor patio; painting of the sanctuary and social hall; cleaning the carpets; repolishing the social hall floors; creation of a learning space in the upper redwood grove; replacement of gutters along the length of the Soquel side of our building all the way to the main entry. Finally, as a result of a merger of two Temples in San Francisco I was able to acquire, at no cost, from Congregation Am Tikvah, a freezer to serve as our back up to our aging freezer.

Looking forward

As we can't rest on our laurels, in this fiscal year we have plans which include completion of the expansion of Home of Peace; major overhaul of TBE Website; installation of a ticketing system to enable any congregant or staff to notify us if the bathrooms need servicing or a bulb is out; replacement of the sanctuary roof, progress on retaining wall issues at Soquel Cemetery and Simcha, expansion of the Simcha toddler room; installation of security upgrade; overhaul of security and emergency procedures along with ancillary training.

Gratitude

The above is just a snapshot of the work performed by the very dedicated and hardworking team at Temple Beth El. Daily they are making suggestions for better

improving our "family" at TBE and many of the great accomplishments are a direct result of their follow through, creativity and positive attitude. Please be sure and thank them the next time you are here.

Finally, I want to thank our Rabbis, Board and Congregation for providing me an opportunity to help lead an organization that is truly trying to role model our Jewish values. It is a privilege that I do not take for granted!
