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And Let us Say Amen

I was 15 years old when I had my first encounter with what I later understood as the Divine. I was at *Eisner*, the *URJ* summer camp in *Great Barrington Massachusetts* and it was my first season there. From the beginning of the session, I already felt like I had known some of the other campers for many years. Through singing, praying, hiking, and interesting conversations, I found my tribe.

I was sitting on a hillside, surrounded by friends, and I saw a bird flying through an amazing sunset. I should mention here that my Hebrew name, *Tziporah*, means bird. Suddenly, I was struck by a flash of intense feeling... a moment, in which I was that bird, soaring through the sky, wings spread, surrounded by the rush of the air and the streaks of orange and yellow light.

It took me many years to understand this experience. And what I know in my heart is that being surrounded by my friends on that hillside was a critical element in my encounter with what I now call *G-d*. The community we created together at camp, the door that opened for me that summer, shaped my life and continues to inform my choices about how I live.

When I first heard about *The Amen Effect* by **Rabbi Sharon Brous**, I knew that I would resonate with the key message of this book. Rabbi Brous is the founding rabbi of *Congregation IKAR* in *Los Angeles*. In this book,

Rabbi Brous shares her vision of kehillah k'doshah, holy community. She brings stories of how members in her congregation have celebrated and mourned together. I was struck by her insight into the sacred choreography of the *Mourners Kaddish*. As she explains it, the essence of this prayer is about how as mourners, we stand in our brokenness, surrounded by

community, revealing our grief out loud, and hearing the voices of love and support saying amen to our words. She came to understand this ritual act as a dialogue between mourner and community.

Just as I sat on the hill at summer camp so many years ago, surrounded by community, I see this same connection between us when we are in our own sanctuary, celebrating the joys of life, and affirming our support for those who are praying for healing, sharing our grief.

I am very interested in having our community read this important book together. Please stay tuned for details.

Note from the Temple **President**

Hello, TBE friends. It has been a cold, dark and stormy winter for us in more ways than one. Aside from the tempestuous local rainstorms, we have been living through the nightmare of Hamas's October 7 massacre and kidnapping of Israeli (and other) civilians, and the ensuing war in *Gaza* with its tragic impact on Palestinian civilians. The war in the Middle East has been associated with rising antisemitism throughout the world, and turbulent political conflicts in our own local communities. You may have heard about the January 9 Santa Cruz City Council hearing, in which many of us participated, and its aftermath, which included a violent riot in the City Council chambers, extreme vilification and threats against City Council members and explosive antisemitic rhetoric on social media and elsewhere.

Stormy, tempestuous, turbulent, violent, explosive. . . did I use enough dramatic adjectives in that paragraph? Unfortunately, they provide an accurate sense of what has been going on in the Middle East and, to a lesser extent, in our local Jewish community. I know that many of us are in great pain about all of this. In times like these, our beloved *Temple Beth El* is more important to us than ever. Since October 7, TBE has sponsored several listening sessions where our community members have had the opportunity to speak and to listen to one another regarding their views and feelings on the war and related matters. We are certainly not all in agreement; there is a range of opinions within our congregation about the situation in the Middle East. Understanding this, Rabbi Paula has been working to provide safe spaces where we can all discuss our views. Most recently, TBE joined with Chadeish Yameinu to hold a wonderful listening session that was skillfully led by Rabbi Amy Eilberg, who is a close colleague of Rabbi Paula and the first woman rabbi ordained by the conservative movement in the U.S. I participated in this session and found it to be very moving, thoughtprovoking, and supportive of my own conflicted feelings about the war. TBE will be sponsoring similar events in the future, and I strongly encourage you to take the opportunity to both listen and be listened to by your fellow congregants in the spirit of the Hebrew word "shamati"—I have heard you.

Speaking of listening, I want to make sure you know that TBE leaders are available and willing to listen to any thoughts, questions, or concerns you have about *TBE* and your experiences as a member. on to arrange to speak with you by phone or in person. We do not want you ever to feel that there is nowhere to take your issues or concerns. Please feel free to talk to us!

Although we do not know when the Israel/Gaza war will end, as I write this, I am pretty sure that the end of our cold, stormy Santa Cruz winter is only about a month away, and flowers are already beginning to bud and bloom. This time of year brings the wonderful, festive holidays of Purim and Passover. (Pesach is my personal favorite!) I hope you will join us for the terrific events TBE has planned for these holidays, including our annual children's Purim Spiel and Carnival, an entertaining Megillah reading for adults in conjunction with Chadeish Yameinu, an interfaith seder with Resurrection Catholic Church, and our wonderful TBE congregational seder on the second night of Passover. Yasher Koach to **Elias McKown** who used his expert birding skills to help identify a *Black Headed Gull* right here in *Aptos*! Generally only found in *Europe, Asia* and the *Eastern U.S. Coast*, the primarily white gull with red legs, red bill and a black dot on its head, is



truly an amazing find and likely the first-ever sighting in *Santa Cruz County*.

Elias, a charming and enthusiastic 13-year-old bird-lover, was on his way to *Watsonville* with his dad when

he heard about a possible sighting in *Santa Cruz*. A short time later, he confirmed his hunch with local experts, stating; "I thought, oh, maybe it's possible that's what it is because it had a red beak, so I sent it to **Abram** and other birders, and they confirmed it was a black headed gull, so we all came here to look for it."

Once confirmed, birders came out from all over and from miles and miles away just to add this rare bird to their lists. Elias went on to explain; "That's not a common thing to see. I was also looking for another bird people were reporting in this area called a laughing gull, so I was interested anyway and then this gull came up."

For his efforts, Elias has become a bit of a celebrity. His interviews by local print media and a local TV news station were picked up throughout the U.S.!


Keep up the good work Elias and your love of nature—We are very proud of you!

Kol HaKavod to **Maria Gitin** on the second printing of her book; *This Bright Light of Ours*, now available in paperback and as an ebook after selling out in hardcover.

Maria's book is an insider's view of the dangerous community-based activism that was at the heart of the *Civil Rights Movement*. It's a first-person accounting of the contributions of ordinary

people during the 1965 Freedom Summer who formed the nonviolent army that won the fight for voting rights. Her detailed letters include the first narrative account and the only in-depth field reporting from a teenage participant in the Summer Community Organization and Political Education (SCOPE) project of SCLC. Maria details the dangerous life





of civil rights activists in rural Wilcox County, Alabama,

where she was assigned. She tells of threats and arrests, but also of forming deep friendships and of falling in love – a coming of age story in the midst of a battle for the rights of all in a violently segregated section of the South.

As **Julian Bond**, Chairman Emeritus of the NAACP states; "This is a must-read account of a less publicized aspect of the Southern civil rights movement - white volunteers risking life and limb to challenge white supremacy at its most brutal."

So far, our 2024 has been action-packed! After our winter break, the teachers participated in a wonderful antibias workshop and gained tools they can use in





the classrooms. We are working on scheduling an antibias workshop for our Simcha Families soon as well.







Sunday, May 19 at 10am

Brotherhood welcomes **Leta Miller**, PhD, Professor of Music Emerita at UC Santa Cruz (and a longtime member of TBE), for a presentation based on her new book, Union Divided: Black Musicians' Fight for Labor Equality, an in-depth account of the segregation within the American Federation of Musicians. For most of the twentieth

century the *AFM* maintained separate locals for Blacks and whites, which operated in overlapping territories. The Black locals arose not from any policy of the *AFM*, but rather at the express request of Black musicians themselves, who thought they could reap significant benefits from monoethnic locals of their own. When the *AFM* tried to merge the dual locals in the 1960s and 70s, the Black musicians strongly resisted. The *AFM* was thus placed in a no-win situation: either support its Black members and continue segregation or go against their wishes and force mergers. *Prof.* **Miller** will explore this complex labor situation (which even included a Black v. white lawsuit in *San Francisco* in 1934) in a talk illustrated by numerous informative slides.

Beginning at 10am, we'll host our always delicious lox and bagel brunch, take care of a little **Brotherhood** business, followed by **Dr. Miller's presentation starting at 11am**, with a Q&A session concluding around noon. Ga-Ga Pits!



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Woman of Valor

On March 1st, *Temple Beth El* honored **Fay Levinson** as the 2024 recipient of the *Candy Coonerty Woman of Valor Award*. This award was established in 2000 to honor the legacy of service exemplified by **Candy Coonerty's** life. Each year the *Woman of Valor Committee* selects a Jewish woman who has served both the Jewish community and the community at large. Fay has dedicated a lifetime of service not only in *Santa Cruz* but throughout *California*. It is a pleasure to honor her as a first Woman of Valor since 2020 when COVID put the award on hiatus.

Growing up in *Portland, Oregon*, Fay attended Hebrew school and was one of the first girls to become a Bat Mitzvah in her congregation. As a teenager, she became very involved with B'nai Brith Girls, serving as Regional President, and attending summer camp along the Oregon coast. She credits her involvement with BBG for inspiring her lifelong commitment to Tikun Olam.

Following high school, Fay married **Robert Levinson** and attended the *University of Oregon* where she served as *GGB Advisor* in *Eugene* and was honored as the "Best Advisor" in the region. A move to *Berkeley* followed where Bob became connected with the *Judah L. Magnes Jewish Museum* before moving again to San *Jose* where Fay became involved with *Hadassah*, the *Jewish Federation*, and *Congregation Beth David* as a Board member. While working for *Jewish Family Service*, she immersed herself with the *Russian* resettlement program. The parent participation co-op nursery school movement also became a focus of Fay's life where she

went on to serve as *Regional President* of the *Northern California* organization. After Bob's untimely death in 1980, Fay and her three sons moved to *Aptos*. **Joe Vela** became a vital part of their lives and Fay and Joe married in 1988.

Treasure Cove at Jade Street Park

A Universally Accessible Playground

Temple Beth El is centered on our spiritual growth and sense of community. Judaism has a commitment to social justice and equity. As we approach Passover, these central values of Judaism are manifested as the liberation of the Hebrews from slavery and the freedom of all people. Today, many people are limited in access by different abilities.

Every child deserves a place to play with their friends and families, regardless of the child's physical, cognitive, or sensory abilities. However, for the one in ten children with a disability, many are unable to play at a typical playground depriving them of a birthright of childhood. *Treasure Cove* at *Jade Street Park* is a universally accessible playground, designed for children of all abilities, to foster compassion, acceptance, connectedness, and joy. By joining with this project, we at *Temple Beth El* can extend the values of equity in access and freedom to play to the children of our broader community.

On October 28, 2023, Rabbi Paula Marcus, Bonnie Morr, and Rosemary Lévy Zumwalt attended the design reveal for *Treasure Cove* at *Jade Street Park* as representatives of *Senior Connections* and of the *Social Justice Committee* of *Temple Beth El.* We met Dan Haifley, campaign volunteer, as well as Tricia Wiltshire, campaign manager for *County Park Friends*, which is conducting the fundraising effort for *Treasure Cove* at *Jade Street Park* universally accessible playground. Dan Haifley had contacted Rabbi Paula to assess the interest of *Temple Beth El* to support the fund-raising efforts.

At the event, we learned the plans to design, fundraise, and build *Treasure Cove* are the result of a public-private partnership between the *City of Capitola* and the non-profit *County Park Friends*, which is raising a million dollars of private funding. To date, nearly \$400,000 has been raised including a challenge grant from the *Monterey Peninsula Foundation* which will match 1:1 every dollar raised up to \$250,000. The intent of *County Park Friends* is to raise the remaining \$600,000 in 2024 with the support of the local community including service groups, organizations, and private donors. The city has already allocated \$475,000 for the project. The entire project is estimated to cost \$1.82 million.

Treasure Cove at Jade Street Park was inspired by the success of LEO's Haven universally accessible playground at Chanticleer Park in Live Oak. These two facilities, as well as a planned, inclusive playground at Ramsay Park in Watsonville, will help fill the great demand

for universally accessible playgrounds by our area's large population of children with disabilities and their families. These playgrounds will also provide a space where everyone can play, form new friendships, and develop community ties of belonging. During our Seder, we are told that a central observance of Passover is that each one of us sees ourselves as if we personally left Egypt. Contributing to *Jade Street Park* at *Treasure Cove* helps us fulfill this mitzvah as agents of liberation for all. Nobody will be left behind.

Now, for me, comes the exciting part; we are about to take the next step toward building a truly sacred space for those contemplating what's next.

As we are well along in the process of hiring my successor, in my "retirement" I plan to redirect my energies towards reimagining and reinvigorating the *Chevra* to come together as a team to design innovative programs.



What you may ask is the *Chevra Community....* imagine a team with helping hands and hearts at the ready, engaged and fully integrated into congregational life, who have the skills and resources to meet some of life's most

challenging times? Just like baby namings, b'mitzvah celebrations and marriages, our tradition also offers guidance at the threshold between this life and the next, from olam hazeh to olam habah...

The Chevra Kadisha (Holy Friends) wisdom tradition offers a wealth of tools, developed over centuries, supporting a seamless continuity of care from illness and impending death, to care for our dead, and through the stages of bereavement and mourning. These practices are not archaic vestiges of a bygone age, but a relevant pathway towards our own survival, as individuals and as a people, so that our Jewish past sustains our people into the Jewish future.

In 2018 (six years ago!) I presented a breakout session at the *North American Chevra Kadisha* conference. The title was *Expanding the Congregational Role of the 21st Century Chevra Kadisha*. Much to my delight the room was packed, vibrating with excitement at the idea of moving beyond the *Chevra's* typically narrow role of "last responders" who are called upon only when someone dies.

We talked about an organization dedicated to facing end-of-life preplanning activities such as completing advance healthcare directives and learning about Jewish death practices; with classes devoted to writing spiritual/ethical wills, forming *Chavurah-like* mutual support circles and even craft groups to sew burial shrouds. We imagined turning cemeteries into sacred community gardens, healing broken hearts by creating grave art using native vegetation, and hosting meditation groups or painting classes.

There is still much to be done, to prepare our community for more conscious transitions and I am honored to devote the next chapter in my life towards this important work. Right at the time when I was expecting to slip quietly off into retirement, the work that has become my life's passion appeared!



Temple Beth El Cemeteries Carry More Than Their Own Financial Load

Our TBE Executive Director, David Ginsborg, recently had great news for the *Board of Directors* who are currently working hard to create the budget for our upcoming fiscal year. It seems to be a fact of *Temple* budgeting life that the amount of income projected for the year is less than needed to cover the cost of everything our hardworking rabbis, staff and facilities need to deliver all the high quality, broad-scoped programs we members enjoy. So, the Board, Executive Director, Budget Committee, Rabbis and Temple staff struggle to find cost savings and, reluctantly to pare down what programs and services

can be delivered within the projected income for the year to balance the budget.

David's good news was about our cemetery budget. Our two cemeteries are a bit expensive to operate, but they have consistently brought in more money than they cost. However, in the past, the *Board* has refrained from moving all the extra income into the General Fund to help fund *Temple* operations, maintenance, and staffing costs because, some day in the future, we will have sold all the available plots in these two properties, and

In May of 2014, TBE had a 112-panel 36 kW solar array installed. This project was financed under a 10-year lease. The lease is now set to expire and we have decided to purchase the system outright for the remaining balance. The cost was slated to take until 2026 to fully pay off in the form of monthly payments including interest.

Enter the Kibricks, Michele and Robert, who are long-time Earth-conscious climate activists and experts on our solar array. The Kibricks

have generously offered TBE an interest-free loan to pay off the balance of our solar array immediately!

TBE's existing solar array is grandfathered-in under the NEM 2.0 rate structure for 20 years from installation and will thus retain NEM 2.0 status until May 2034. That status enables *TBE* to receive credit at nearly the retail rate for any surplus energy the solar array pushes into the grid.

Over the 9.7 years that the array has been operating, it has been estimated to have generated 459,930 kWh of energy, or about 47,415 kWh (on average) per year. While the energy production will vary from year to year depending on the weather, a rough estimate of the dollar value of the electrical energy generated by the solar array during JUST the past three years was about \$16,000 per year!

From Robert: "TBE should take pride in the nearly 460,000 kWh of clean energy that its solar array has generated over the last 9.7 years. Although I can't vouch for the accuracy of its carbon footprint model, SunPower's online monitoring site calculates that this amount of energy resulted in the following impacts:

- 358 tons of CO2 emissions avoided, or
- 806,800 miles not driven, or
- 36,589 gallons of gasoline not used, or
- 5,419 trees fully grown"

Talk about putting Jewish values into action! A great amount of appreciation is due our climate champion heroes; Michele and Robert Kibrick for their creative and generous gift!

The Temple family greatly appreciates you and so does the planet!

when that time comes, cemetery income will virtually end. However, the *Temple's* ongoing need for money to maintain the resting place of our loved ones will continue. The *Board*, several years ago, decided to put the bulk of cemetery proceeds (75%) into a special fund that could, over time, become large enough to fund the long-term care of the cemetery grounds without needing to take any money from the *Temple's General Fund*.

Over the last few years, the *Cemeteries* long-term care fund has grown to \$425,000. *Executive Director* **David**

Ginsborg's report to the Board last month was that the fund is now large enough to reach the \$900,000 balance projected to be needed by the time available cemetery plots are all sold. The annual projected interest from the cemetery long-term maintenance fund is expected to generate sufficient funds to sustain the cemeteries into

What this means to the congregation is that the 75% of *Cemetery* earnings we have been putting into the long-term care fund each year can now go to directly support our programs, rabbis, staff, and other general fund needs. And this, indeed, is great news for all of us.

TBE Dismantling Racism: Transforming racism and antisemitism into community action

Among all the exciting new programs and activity at *Temple Beth El* since the pandemic, one small group, first convened in late 2019, has been quietly meeting every few weeks to wrestle with racism and what it means to be Jewish in a society where racism and antisemitism persist.

Originally brought together by **Rabbi Paula Marcus** to discuss the book, *White Fragility*, the group realized our need to learn more. We began by examining ourselves and the historic foundations of the systemic racism that has shaped the way we all live, feel, and think in the *United States*. Naming our group *Dismantling Racism*, we have evolved over the past four years into a community of learners and activists committed to understanding and undoing our personal racism and the pervasive, systemic racism in society.

Our explorations are based not in one single text, but in our own personal and family stories, and in a multiplicity of books, online and journal articles, anti-racist and inclusion frameworks, diverse news reports, videos, and webinars. A months-long deep dive into antisemitism moved the group from an intellectual discussion of racism to a gut-punch understanding of how historic, systemic bias and bigotry undermine and do violence to entire communities. BIPOC voices, both Jewish and non-Jewish, have guided and informed us, giving us greater insight into racism and antisemitism, and what it means to be Jewish in our divisive world.

Currently, *TBE Dismantling Racism* is thirteen white and biracial *TBE* members who work or have retired from work as educators, social workers, psychologists and

therapists, a doctor, a union organizer and bus driver, and a rabbi. We learn from each other and from the lives of people who have experienced racism and antisemitism in up close and personal ways. We've come to see the great complexity and intersection of issues like racism, antisemitism, and white supremacy from multiple perspectives. We practice respectful, inclusive listening and equitable conversation in which each person can safely share their stories and voice their concerns and feelings.

TBE Dismantling Racism has facilitated Yom Kippur community dialogues at Temple Beth El since 2021, sharing our storytelling and resonance process with over 60 members of our congregation so far. We hope to continue this healing and inspiring process through this year to help each other find strength and courage as we confront antisemitism, racism, and the painfully difficult conflict in the Middle East.

Four years on, *TBE Dismantling Racism* has become a beloved community working on undoing our own racism and reaching out as allies in the context of the most challenging issues confronting us as a society. We are eager to create space for new folks who would like to join us. We invite you to contact *Dismantling Racism* for more information or to participate in our next meeting. 

Onward, a report from your *Executive Director*

My door is open! Yes, I love to see the Simcha kids parade by, but keeping an open door is as much for me as it is for members and staff. It is more of a philosophy.

The staff and *Temple* members who know me recognize that I want to know when there is a problem, real or perceived. For me it is really about transparency. I'd rather shine a light on a situation before it becomes a bigger and potentially more consequential problem. I have encouraged all our staff to adopt this approach, even if it means bringing forward an embarrassing mistake.

I want our members to know the same applies to them. Our doors are open. If you see something, say something. You can start directly with the person you believe is most likely responsible and able to do something about it; whether it is a light bulb that is out, or a broken link on our website, email or call us. Even better, stop by; even to just say hi...that is after all, why I have jar of assorted chocolates on my desk.

This open-door approach has, I believe, helped to avoid bigger problems. This time last year, it became clear the *Temple* had several areas that would flood whenever it rained. *TBE* had come to



expect this along with some small drips and leaks. Since then, we have addressed the problem by installing over 200 feet of new gutters, added multiple concrete drain boxes and taken smaller steps such as creating French drains.

Other water problems require bigger solutions including installation of a new sanctuary roof in March or April and replacement of the 200+ foot retaining wall in the *Simcha* yard once we are past the rainy season. The new roof, which will replace the original roof circa 1989, was the direct result of staff (**Marilyn** and **Chris!**) noticing a tiny bit of moisture in a corner of the sanctuary. Upon investigation it became clear that our roof was on borrowed time. Under the leadership of **Miles Dolinger**, who chairs the *Building and Grounds Committee*, the Board approved a plan to use funds from the *Building and Grounds* restricted fund to install a new roof. Due to

a backlog in workloads by the lowest bidder, the roof will be installed after most of the rainy season.

By the end of this fiscal year, we will have transferred nearly \$300,000 from the operating fund in member dues for these big projects during the past 3 years. As we have spent funds,

we anticipate the balance will be below \$200,000 by the end of the fiscal year.

Finances

At the half year mark, our projected Net Operating Income (NOI) is better than projected by \$23,311 which means that, if for the remainder of the year the budget was "spot on"; our deficit would shrink from -\$60,365 to -\$37,054. Unfortunately, with membership renewal drive and the Annual Appeal both coming in below what was budgeted, the outlook remains much murkier. I anticipate the spring fundraising celebration of Gus Gold will generate much needed income. As always, finance details are available upon request and members are welcome to attend our monthly finance committee where there is a much greater review and analysis of TBE's financial health.

Budgeting

Collaborating with our *Treasurer* and several past *Treasurers*, we have initiated the budget process for 24-25. Building the budget is a partnership with key stakeholders, staff and the *Budget Committee* selected by the *Treasurer* consistent with the by-law requirements. The budget is a very intense and time-consuming process designed to be inclusive of members and aligned with the Board's priorities and *TBE* values. Before the Board votes, as in prior years, I will be hosting a town hall open to all members to provide an opportunity for those who are interested to learn more about the minutia of the recommended budget. Every effort is being made to continue to reduce the operating deficit to meet the Board's objective of a balanced budget.

Soquel Pioneers: Creating new Partnerships at the Soquel Cemetery

At this year's Mitzvah Day TBE welcomed Soquel Pioneer and Historical Association members, one of whom drove

down from *Sacramento* for the event. There is a mutual interest in developing the *Soquel Cemetery* as a valued community resource and their help on Mitzvah Day was appreciated. In addition to volunteering on Mitzvah Day, a *Pioneers* member has volunteered to create a database of our paper records of the historic section in order to compile a searchable resource dating back to the *Gold Rush*. When completed this will provide a tremendous asset for *TBE* and a valuable resource for historians and descendants of early settlers. Little to no staff time is being expended on this project but we anticipate it will generate much needed interest in our cemetery. Kudos to **Holly Blue** for her efforts to cultivate this emerging relationship.

Membership

Our budgeted income was \$832,000. While 551 families renewed for a total of \$797,000, we remain below the projected income of \$832,000 and when the last few members—along with any new members—renew their membership, we anticipate receiving a similar amount, as we have for the past 3 years, approximately \$810,000. Unfortunately, this is at least \$22,000 below the projected amount.

There were some real bright spots including a more than 30% increase in the number of families who increased their membership contributions by 10% or more. In addition, during the last month the Board and staff have personally called the remaining approximately 70 families who have not submitted their membership renewal which resulted in a surge of renewals.
