
Lech Lecha : לֵך-לָך

## Did You Know?


ּוִקַרַאתַ לַשַּבַּת עֹנֵג וִלִקְדוֹשׁ ה' מִכְבַּד" Call the Sabbath a delight, and Hashem's sacred day an honor" (Isaiah 58:13).

From here Chazal derive two aspects of celebrating Shabbat: ענג and כַבוֹד.

Rambam (Hilchot Shabbat Perek 30) explains that:

כבוד (Honor) means bathing before Shabbat, wearing special clothes for Shabbat, cleaning the house, setting the table, saving your appetite for the Shabbat meal, and getting ready early enough to greet it with excitement.

ענג (Delight) means preparing special Shabbat food, enjoying three meals, eating meat and drinking wine, and resting.

He took him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." And He added, "So shall your offspring be."

ּוְהֶאֱמָן בַּה' וַיַּחְשְׁבֶּהָ לָּוֹ צְדָקָה:

And because he put his trust in Hashem, He reckoned it to his merit.

R' Meir Shapiro of Lublin, founder of the Daf Yomi movement, asks why does it say "וְהֶאֶמֶן בַּה" (and he believed in Hashem) after Hashem tells Avraham that his descendants will be as numerous as the stars (Breishit 15:5-6). Earlier (Breishit 13:16), when Hashem told him that his descendants would be as numerous as the sand on the beach, that didn't seem to be enough. How is the mashal of stars different than the mashal of the sand?

The answer, he says, is that with the sand Hashem tells Avraham not to even bother counting b/c it would be impossible, but with the stars He tells him to try and count. And sure enough, Avraham tries. When Hashem sees that He says "Ko Yihiyeh Zaracha." This doesn't only mean that your offspring will be as numerous as the stars. It means that just as you tried counting the stars, which is impossible, so too your descendants will also have this koach of believing in the impossible. And you and Saray will have kids b/c you have continued to believe despite the odds. This was the beginning of the Jewish People always believing and overcoming all odds.
