Only a few short weeks ago we read at our Seder tables:

"We were slaves to Pharaoh in Egypt, and the L-rd, our G-d, took us out from there with a strong hand and with an outstretched arm."

And we were free. Or were we?

After the ever increasing momentum of the plagues, the release from Egypt, the chase, and the finale at the Red Sea, Hashem stops and slowly brings us to Har Sinai. Fifty days in the Midbar (desert), journeying both physically and spiritually toward the culminating moment when we receive the Torah. Fifty days to become a truly free people.



Becoming physically free is much easier than becoming mentally free. To do that, Hashem brought us into the Midbar. We needed to honestly and clearly work on ourselves and our relationships in that empty place. There, we were able to reset and become a people who were able to choose our freedom and define it with His Torah.

That resetting process was a time of growth as individuals, as families, and as a community. That process continues today, most notably during this time period of Sefiras HaOmer. Each day is a clear opportunity for improvement on many levels.

I'm glad that the first time that I'm writing to you has fallen during this time period.

During my time as president, I want to help shape the community into a place of clear communication that gets things done with ease. To achieve this goal, I need you to talk to me. I need to hear what you like about the shul and what you don't like. I want to hear your ideas and dreams for the future of this community. I want the board, the staff, and the community-at-large to work together to create an even more amazing community, and it all starts with clear and open communication.

This is our shul. During this time, as we count the Omer and grow from slaves to beings capable of freely accepting Hashem's Torah, I hope that you will pause and take a fresh look at Beth Jacob. Let us choose in this period of growth and change to work together in continuing to build this shul and to define our work with His Torah.

FROM SINAI TO THE HIMALAYAS: HOW LOVE BREEDS HATE

"The compassion and zeal demonstrated by Israelis to rescue victims of an earthquake halfway around the world disturbs our enemies because this display of kindness, after millennia of suffering at the hands of the Gentile world, speaks to a highly refined spirituality and love of humanity that no amount of suffering and persecution can snuff out."

I bet you thought it was wonderful that Israel was one of the first nations, and with one of the largest representations, in the relief efforts in Nepal after the recent earthquake disaster. You probably did not realize that Israel undertook all this in order to mask its murderous nature in relation to the Palestinians.

The images of Israeli Air force planes arriving in Nepal to provide significant and badly needed relief resources stir the heart of every Jew. And the fact that Jews are at the source of rescue efforts anywhere in the world where people are in distress is a recent – and arguably miraculous – development; historically, when rescue efforts were an issue and Jews were involved, it was the Jew who needed the rescuing (and, too often, a cold, indifferent, or hateful Gentile world actively ignored the plight of the Jew in need).



Lest you think that such Jewish sponsored rescue efforts will change the opinion of anyone who currently despises the Jews, think again. Not only will such efforts fail to impress anyone who needs impressing, they actually will be the source of hatred aimed at the Jews. One anti-Semite suggested that Israel was "heading to Nepal to learn from the earthquake how to kill better."

How can this be? Oddly, Shavuos, the Festival celebrating the giving of the Torah, teaches us to expect just that.

Many names are given to the physical address used by the Almighty to insert Torah into the world. Sinai is but one of several, albeit the most widely used and known. Pronounced *Seenai* in our holy tongue, the name derives, say the Sages, from the world *seen'ah*, which means hatred. The Sages say that this is because hatred for the Jew entered the world when the Torah was given.

Evidently, when the nations of the world see that the Jews are the nation chosen by G-d to deliver His message to the world, we become the object of hatred.

Their resentment comes not only from our claim that we are chosen by G-d, but from the objective evidence that we are truly marching to a different drummer. I dare say that the compassion and zeal demonstrated by Israelis to rescue victims of an earthquake halfway around the world disturbs our enemies because this display of kindness, after millennia of suffering at the hands of the Gentile world, speaks to a highly refined spirituality and love of humanity that no amount of suffering and persecution can snuff out. It stands as an indictment of larger, wealthier nations whose indifference to the suffering of others, even their own citizens, is the norm. Our spiritual – and, for that matter, our material – success drives our earthly co-inhabitants to hatred. Hence, Jewish compassion breeds hatred.

So when those planes land with technicians, field hospitals, ambulance crews, earthquake-trained dogs, medical supplies, blankets, and loads of compassion, it is real chesed shel emes, the purest form of lovingkindness which comes with no expectation of reciprocity.

The coming Chag of Shavuos reminds us that, as trustees of Torah, we are destined as a people to deliver not only material sustenance to those in need, but also spiritual nurture to an undernourished and uninspired world. Receiving G-d's Torah at Sinai transforms us into His emissaries, ambassadors of G-d's love for, and faith in, humanity. We must not allow humanity's temporary refusal to see us for who we are temper our passion for living lives of holiness and closeness to the Divine.

As the citizens of Nepal already know, the world is counting on us.

CREATING CONNECTIONS

"We belong to Beth Jacob because we have a deeply-felt desire to connect to other Jews without reservation or qualification." Beth Jacob's membership has hovered around 500 families for as long as many of us can recall. This is a point of curiosity, especially as there are many individuals who come to Beth Jacob often for minyan, classes, lectures, social events, Kiddush and Shalosh Seudos, but have not yet chosen to become members. Is our goal to offer the Atlanta Jewish community a place for religious and spiritual growth without being overly concerned with our membership numbers, or should we be paying more attention to growing our ranks?

Who are the regular guests of Beth Jacob? Some are relatively new to Atlanta. They may come from a background where it is not typical to pay synagogue



dues. Or they may be used to paying a dues rate significantly lower than ours to a shul with fewer programs, the leadership of just one Rabbi, a smaller facility and an extra charge for High Holiday seats. Some people may come from a shul which is a place to daven and learn, but does not serve as a community center.

Other guests come from the local area. They may attend another shul or not be affiliated with any shul. They may be curious about what we have to offer, and then their experiences with our members and programs keep them coming back.

We believe that membership growth is not – and should not be – an end in itself. Our purpose at Beth Jacob is to grow our relationship to G-d and, in the process, to each other. We belong to the shul because we have a deeply felt desire to connect to other Jews without reservation or qualification.

One way we can act on this desire is to introduce ourselves to guests, get to know them beyond small talk, commit new names to memory and use them. The next time you see a guest, think about the situation from his or her perspective; the Kiddush in Heritage Hall is an overwhelming crowd of strangers when you're new, a room full of friends when you've been here for a while.

Take time to introduce someone you just met to others. Connect them with individuals or families who have shared interests, family circumstances or hobbies. Ask people you've just met if they would like to join you in attending an upcoming class or program so they don't feel alone. And of course, guests who are newer to our shul always appreciate an invitation for a Shabbos or Yom Tov meal.

We should do these things because they are an expression of who we are: Jews who connect to G-d and to fellow Jews. As we make an impact with our sincerity and openness, guests will hopefully be inspired to join us in sustaining our beautiful shul and all that it represents.





Broccoli, Rice & Cheese Casserole

An all-in-one dish with vitamins, whole grain carbs & protein! Adapted from Spice & Spirit

INGREDIENTS

16 ounces frozen chopped broccoli

2 onions

4 cloves garlic

2 tablespoons oil

1 jar marinara, any flavor

1 1/2 cup brown rice

1 cup shredded cheese

salt, pepper

DIRECTIONS

In large pot, heat oil. Sautee onions until golden. Add broccoli, garlic and rice. Cook over medium heat for 5 minutes.

Add 3 cups water, a teaspoon salt and dash pepper and bring to a boil covered. Lower heat, cover and simmer 20 minutes until water is absorbed. Add half of cheese.

Transfer rice mixture to 9x13 pan or casserole dish. Pour marinara over the top (you may not need the entire jar). Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake at 425 for 10 minutes or until top is golden and bubbly.

Salmon Croquettes with Lemon Dill Sauce

A new fish dish L'kavod Shabbos & Yom Tov!

INGREDIENTS

4 cans boneless salmon, drained well

6 eggs, beaten

4 stalks scallions, processed or chopped fine

1 cup bread crumbs

1 1/2 tablespoons Old Bay Seasoning

1 cup mayonnaise

1/2 a lemon, juiced

1 tablespoon dried dill

salt, pepper, onion and garlic powder, to taste

DIRECTIONS

Mix scallions, eggs, bread crumbs, scallion and seasoning. Heat oil in frying pan, and use small ice cream scoop or large spoon to drop spoonfuls into pan. Fry 3 - 4 minutes on each side.

Mango Lemon Syllabub

Fabulous, light & fruity dessert - a nice change from heavy desserts, and it's gluten-free!

INGREDIENTS

18 ounces whip cream
zest of two small lemons, divided
3 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
4 mangoes, diced into large pieces
1 mango, diced into small piecees
6 teaspoons honey

DIRECTIONS

Puree the larger mango chunks until smooth. Transfer to serving bowl or large container. Add honey and half of the lemon juice and mix well. Mix in most of the smaller mango chunks, reserving a few to garnish the top.

Whip cream until shiny peaks form. Add zest and remaining lemon juice. Whip until incorporated.

To serve, place pureed mango in individual stemmed bowls or glasses. Top with cream and diced mango. For an elegant presentation, garnish with mint sprigs or a lemon curl. (Use zester peeler to make a lemon curl be sure to scrub and wash lemon well first!)

Olive and Roasted Red Pepper Spread

Delicious on Challah or with multi-grain chips.

INGREDIENTS

13 ounces pitted green olives, stuffed with pimentos 6 ounces pitted black olives 1 cup roasted red peppers, drained well 6-8 cloves garlic, peeled

DIRECTIONS

Drain olives and red peppers. Process all ingredients in food processor until thoroughly combined. This spread will stay fresh in the fridge for several weeks.
