ENHANCING OUR SAFETY AND SECURITY

Security continues to be a hot topic. Terrorism continues unabated around the world. The events in Israel over the summer were accompanied by a rise in anti-Semitism. Attacks periodically take place all too frequently on Jewish institutions. A massacre took place in Har Nof the morning this article was written.

At Beth Jacob we are better prepared than we were two years ago. We have been participating in quarterly security meetings held by Dick Raisler, Director of Community-Wide Security for the Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta, to get training and security-related updates. An initial set of incident response protocols was developed by the office staff. An off-duty police officer is once again on duty on our campus on Shabbos and Yom Tov, with a second officer present for Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and major events. Our security camera



system went through a major upgrade to state-of-the-art digital cameras this summer using Homeland Security Grant funds. We will continue to focus on changes we can make and steps we can take to increase our preparedness in the areas of security and incident management.

That said, there is a limit to what the office staff can accomplish on its own. Our tightest security comes when you participate in maintaining our readiness through your choices and actions on a day to day basis. Following are steps you can take to help protect us all.

When entering our building through a locked door by entering a security code into a keypad, do not allow strangers to follow you through, even if they appear to be "members of the tribe." Explain that we have security protocols in place which are for their benefit and ours. Ask them to ring the bell to request admission by the office staff. (Note: Our member security code will be changed effective January 1, 2015. Members will be notified about the new code.)

Refrain from propping open any locked door in the building, whether an outside door or an internal door, at any time, for any reason, including on Shabbos and Yom Tov when some external doors are kept unlocked. Trust in the office staff that if a door is kept locked it is for a reason. Saving one or even many people a short walk to reach an open door is not a justification for compromising the safety and security of all of our members and guests. If you see that a door is propped open, take a moment to protect all of us by removing the prop and closing the door.

If you see someone you do not recognize on our premises, approach and speak to him. Do not be confrontational; rather, offer to help. Say, for example, "Hi! You look like you are lost. Can I help you find something?" If the person has impure intentions, he will now be aware that he has been noticed and recognized. If the person gives a valid reason for being in the building, you may want to walk him to his destination. If he responds, "I am new here and just want to look through your building," have him check in with the office staff. If it is outside of office hours, apologize and explain that for security reasons he will need to come back when office staff is present.

When you hear a fire alarm, exit the building immediately. This should be done instinctively. There have been alarms and emergencies in the past two years in which people did not exit the building promptly. Some tried to justify this behavior after the fact on the premise that there have been "too many" false alarms. The question of whether the number of false alarms we experience is too high given the complexity of our fire alarm system and a number of other factors is debatable; it is also irrelevant. When you hear a fire alarm you should exit the building immediately even if you know there was a false alarm yesterday or that the alarm system has been experiencing problems recently. It is far better to give up a few minutes of Torah learning or another activity than to take a small risk of getting injured or, G-d forbid, losing your life.

Make proper use of Beth Jacob's parking lot. Park your car only in spaces specifically designated and marked for parking. Parking elsewhere may increase danger in an emergency by impeding access of first responders. It may also signal to outsiders that our members do not respect, value and honor our facility as a house of G-d. If you cannot locate an appropriate spot or are running late, park farther away and plan to come a few minutes earlier the next time.

No set of precautions can absolutely guarantee our safety and security, but if each of us does his part, we will minimize our risk on the factors we can impact. 3

Whether it's scheduling a meeting to get to know Rabbi Feldman or Rabbi Freundlich, meeting members with similarly aged children, or speaking to Beth Jacob members who share the same professional field and might have a job contact, we want to use all of our means to maximize their (often) short visit and help them make their trip as fruitful and productive as it can be. The more we can do for them, the more likely they are to select Atlanta and Beth Jacob as their next community.

In order for us to succeed in these endeavors, the Membership Committee needs YOUR help! You can join the committee to be directly involved in planning, offer to be a professional contact or home hospitality host for out-of-town prospective members, volunteer to be a "buddy" family for a newly joined family

and help them learn everything there is to know about Beth Jacob.

When you find out about a potential new member (or family) visiting Atlanta,

Join Rabbi Pransky for a two part program beginning at 9:00 pm with a shiur in the Beis Midrash, followed by a Chai Peking sponsored seudah and a second shiur in the Sukkah. The Beis Midrash will remain open for all night learning.

Five levels are offered to accommodate everyone, from those who can read Hebrew without translating to those who are on the cusp of deciphering the Talmud independently. FEEDING OUR TROOPS, FILLING OUR HEARTS

President, Cemetery Guardians Doreen and I just returned from Israel after volunteering with the Staying Strong program. This organization arranges to feed the Israeli troops in smaller army bases with army approval.

Doreen and I have been blessed to have traveled to Israel many times in the past, B"H, but this trip will go down as one of the top people and spiritual visits that we have ever made. Andy and Sydney Lewis and three of their boys went with us. Our volunteering included meeting the food truck in Jerusalem. We then drove 40 minutes to Area A near Bet Jayla (Bethlehem) and entered a very secure army post, set up the truck and started cooking hot dogs. The troops came out in small groups to eat. These boys, I call them that as they are young enough to be our children and grandchildren, are decanted to the protection and safely of the people of Israel. While they ate hot dogs and pickles (and ice pops for dessert) we spent about 2 hours talking and thanking them. What was interesting to us is that there was no hate or dread of the Arabs. Their only desire to protect our people and they will go to any length to do that. Some of the soldiers we met served in Gaza during the last war and some were getting discharged soon. The soldiers kept thanking and thanking us. The soldiers were concerned about how they were viewed by Americans Jews and gentiles. They were worried people would believe only what the cable news network showed. We assured that that most fully supported the right of self-defense and were not taken in by the false propaganda of the networks. 
SAVE-THE-DATE: Wednesday, April 29th BJ Preschool Blooming Artists Art Auction! 7:30pm, Heritage Hall

Did you know these facts about Beth Jacob Preschool?

- © Beth Jacob Preschool has 9 classes- an infant room, a one year old class, a toddler class, 2 two year old classes, 2 three year old classes, and 2 Pre-K classes.
- © We offer extended care hours in addition to our half day, and full day programs. We begin as early as 7:30am and end as late as 5:30pm to meet the needs of working parents.
- ② All of our lead teachers and many of our assistants have a bachelors or associates degree in Early Childhood Education or Child Development. Every teacher takes 10 hours or more of continuing education classes each year.
- © We approach learning through multi-sensory activities to reach all the different ways young children learn. We expand on real-life experiences guided by a Project Approach philosophy; all integrated with a Judaic curriculum. Our Pre-k classes use the Handwriting Without Tears program



- © We operate on a rolling enrollment throughout the year and have just a few spaces remaining in our one year old, toddler, and threes classes.
- © Included in our curriculum is Music enrichment and Playball, a gross motor enrichment program.
- © Each week we host 2 lively Shabbos Parties, our youngest classes join together for a ruach-filled Shabbos sing-a-long, while our threes and Pre-K classes have story time

from one of the rabbis, enjoy our Ima and Aba program where we invite parents, grandparents, or special guests to join us as they participate in a spirited Shabbos sing-a-long, too.
