Torah Thoughts from **Sermonic Wit** by Rabbi Bulka

A TRUE SECRET

The secret things belong unto the Lord our God... (Deuteronomy, 29:28.)

One of the many messages in this statement is that there is Godliness in secretiveness.

In this vein, the Kotzker Rebbe makes a fascinating observation. He remarks that people think that a hidden righteous person is one who hides his or her righteousness and good deeds from the community.

The truth is, says the Kotzker Rebbe, that a true righteous person is one whose righteousness is hidden from himself or herself.

The truly righteous person has no pretence or claim of being righteous.

LIFE IS GOOD

Behold, I have set before you this day life and good, and death and evil...choose life... (Deuteronomy, 30:15, 19)

The Torah is a moral and ethical code, a code of the good. The people are given a choice, and are urged to choose correctly.

The correct choice is obvious, but the language of the choice is surprising. We are asked to choose life. Why?

Perhaps because the ultimate gauge of whether a specific norm is consistent with morals and ethics or whether that specific norm is consistent with life itself.

Torah norms emanate from a concern for life and are predicated on life. The basic choice, therefore, is of life itself, and that choice is, by definition, good.

POINTS TO PONDER

How can a covenant be struck with those who are not there at the time of its actually being agreed upon? (see pp.1138-1139; 29:13-14)

Why are certain words in 30:28 (p.1141) dotted?

What is the meaning of the statement that the mitzvah is not far, is not in the heavens, or beyond the sea (p.1143; 30: 11-13)? And which mitzvah is it to which these verses are referring?

After giving the people the alternative of choosing between life and good health, and death and the bad, (pp. 1143-44; 30: 11-13), the people are urged to choose life (p. 144; 30:19). Why are they not asked to choose the good? Would it not be more logical if they should choose to make a value choice rather than a quantity choice?

HAFTARAH

The Haftarah for Nitzavim is found in your Humashim, starting on page 1145.

This is the final culminating Haftarah of the seven comforting Haftarot following Tish'ah B'Av, and like all of its predecessors, is taken from the book of Yeshayah.

The Haftarah begins with the statement that the people will rejoice in God because of God's having restored Israel's glory.

God asserts that for Zion's and Jerusalem's sake God will not rest, until triumph and salvation shall come.

Quote of the week

God will not fail you or forsake you...
