Happy Purim!!

Purim is one of the most fun and joyful times on the entire Jewish calendar, so it's the perfect time for us to announce our back to Shul plans! With the vaccine rollout going smoothly and quickly here in Essex County and throughout the country, we'll all be ready to be back in the building in a couple weeks, so here are some important things to be aware of:

 Since our Rabbis missed everyone so much during Covid, they will be at the main entrance of Shul before every Shabbat and weekday minyan to give out hugs to all male members. A female member of the Executive Committee will be available for all women that come to daven and also want a hug.

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We have experienced quite a journey since last Purim. So much has happened, so many lives have been lost, so much has changed. Where has Hashem been through all of this time? We are told that there are moments of Hester Panim, where Hashem "turns away" from us, often as a result of us turning away from Him in some way. The story of Purim carries a related message that is important for us to internalize. "I felt Hashem with me the whole time".

Chances are we have heard these words from someone speaking about a particularly challenging period that he had to face at some point. One of the foundations of our faith is the belief that Hashem is with us, and that he performs miracles on a regular basis. One need look no further than the Tefilla of Modim which we recite thrice daily.

We thank Hashem for the wonders and miracles he performs on a regular basis. Yet, many of us go through life and do not feel that we have experienced these miracles. Purim

reminds us that there are two types of miracles which Hashem engages in. The first is the clear and obvious miracle, often involving nature, such as the splitting of the Yam Suf, or the miracle of the manna.

The story of Purim contains within it a different type of miracle, one which is hidden and more common to the average person. One can look at the story of the Megillah and analyze it as chance, parts of the story falling into place. One who wishes to see the hand of Hashem has a completely different experience when reading the Megilla story.

We celebrate Purim to remind us that nothing in life happens by chance. When seeking Hashem's presence in the Megilla, His engagement is evident everywhere. The same is true with the story of our people as well as the story of our individual lives. It is our duty to look at our own lives with Purim glasses, so that we can strengthen our faith, with the realization that Hashem is present at our side more often than we think, on a regular basis.

- Davening will return to normal except for anyone who davened outside in under 30 degree weather for the last few months. For all of us, there will be a special minyan every Shabbat starting at Nishmat. We will also be davening Mincha and Maariv right after kiddush. Totally worth the frozen fingers!
- Speaking of kiddush, we are revamping our Shul kiddush to maximize the chance of spreading germs! We will have only 3 food stations for the entire Shul - a 40lb. bowl of cholent, a 25lb. bowl of herring, and in recognition of everyone's desire to get back to the way things used to be, a bobbing for apples station! Any member that gets an apple on one of their first three tries goes to the front of the cholent line.
- For those of you that don't have little kids, you may not know how hard the nursery staff has worked to keep the kids in school and safe. It's been truly remarkable. In honor of their effort, they are getting paid vacation for the rest of the school year! To cover their classroom responsibilities through June, all Shul members that happen to be grandparents will be assigned a two week shift as a nursery school teacher. The schedule will be sent to all grandparents later this week.
- As an important step in bringing us all back together physically after a long year apart, we are working on one minyan for the entire Shul for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur this coming fall. Young & old, Sephardic & Ashkenazi, women & men, and (gasp!) even Main Shul and Bet Midrash! Without the need for social distancing, we will all fit comfortably in the Shul parking lot!! Seating requests (meaning, indicate your preference between the pink chairs, red chairs or bring your own) will go out shortly.
- And last but definitely not least, please mark your calendars for next spring, 2022. We decided that we will be closing the Shul again from Pesach to Shavuot. It was a difficult decision but, for those of you that have been to Shul meetings know, sometimes it's just hard to argue against the oi' "we have to do it because we did it that way before" argument.

If you have any questions or concerns about this plan, I will be at the bobbing for apples station during Kiddush in a few weeks. See you then!

V'nahafochOur Masks!

Purim, Purim, a great holiday for the Jews! Masks, rattles, songs and dances!

For so many of us, Purim is only complete with costume attire. From a young age, children anticipate the festive day of Purim excited for mishloach manot and seeing their friends dressed in wacky and original costumes, sometime having to guess the person behind the mask. This year, many adults will also be wearing masks, but sadly for health concerns and not as part of their costume. One of the reasons for wearing maks on Purim is mentioned by the Bnei Yissaschar in the name of R. Moshe Chagiz. Rabbi Chagiz mentions the Gemara in Megillah 12b, that really the Jewish people didn't want to bow to idols but were forced to by their enemies. Their worship of idols was superficial and "fake" and in their hearts were still loyal to Hashem. So too, Hashem's punishment was superficial, it seemed like they were going to be destroyed but He really didn't intend to do so. Rabbi Chagiz suggests that we commemorate this by wearing a mask, that no matter what it seems like on the outside, deep down in the inside we remain committed to Hashem.

Unfortunately, we tend to judge people based on the way they look and the way they act. We are distracted by external appearances and gestures making it difficult to connect to someone. We focuse on their external appearance rather than focusing on who they truly are, missing the opportunity to have a real and true heart to heart connection. It has been a year since we have been masked. The corona virus masks have been a barrier for us to connect to other people. We continue to

minimize physical contact and can't see someone's facial expressions. Friendships have weakened and people feel isolated. Perhaps this Purim, let us reconnect with each other safely in deep and meaningful ways and not allow our masks to be a catalyst for building barriers from our friends and community members. We pray to Hashem "v'nahafoch hu" that soon we can wear our masks as costumes and not for medical concerns.

Laws of Purim



SHABBAT ZACHOR - PARSHAT TERUMA Shabbat, February 20, 2021

It is a biblical obligation for everyone to hear Parshat Zachor read on Shabbat Morning. Parshat Zachor is a part of the Torah in which we remember the nation of Amalek and its attempt to destroy the Jewish people. It is read on this Shabbat, the Shabbat before Purim, since Haman was from the nation of Amalek.

In order to accommodate the community and those who will not be able to attend a morning minyan, we will have an additional reading in the main shul and in the parking lot before Mincha at <u>5:10pm</u>. No registration is required, however, seating will be limited.

If one misses the reading, one should hear the Torah reading on Purim morning. If one cannot do so, one can hear Parshat Zachor read as part of Parshat Ki Teitze in August. Nevertheless, if one is quarantined over the week of Purim, one should read Parshat Zachor from a Chumash at home.

TAANIT ESTHER Thursday February 25, 2021- 13 Adar

Fast begins: 5:15AM

If one wishes to wake before the beginning of the fast and eat, one must have this intent in mind before going to sleep the night before.

Mincha: 1:45 & 5:10 PM

Fast ends: 6:13 PM - It is most appropriate to wait until after hearing the Megillah before

breaking one's fast.

MACHTZIT HASHEKEL

It is customary to donate three half-dollars in commemoration of the half shekels that were donated this time of year in the days of the Beit Hamikdash. This year due to Covid guidelines, we will not be placing the silver dollars out in the shul. Instead, one should donate \$1.50 to Tzedaka



per person, while keeping in mind the custom of Machtzit Hashekel, in lieu of actually lifting the silver dollars. You can easily donate online at www.aabjd.org/payment and select Matanot L'veyonim, or send a check to the shul office. If one has three silver dollars at home, one can lift them and donate the money at their discretion.

KRIAT HAMEGILLAH –READING THE MEGILLAH

There will be a number of Megillah readings taking place both indoors and outdoors throughout the Shul community. Please register for readings at the Shul using the Purim Sign Up Form. Due to limited capacity, please be sure to attend the specific minyan you selected in this sign-up form. your backyard Minyan Gabbai or email minyan@aabjd.org for assistance.

The Megillah must be read from a scroll written in accordance with Halacha. The Baal K'riah (reader) and the listeners must have intent to fulfill the mitzvah of reading and to fulfill the obligation of the blessings before and after.

It is forbidden to speak from the time of the brachot before the reading until the end of the brachot after the reading.

Ideally, the Megillah should be read in the presence of a minyan.

If a person is having the Megillah read to them and the reader has already fulfilled his obligation, one of those in attendance should recite the brachot on behalf of those listening. If this is not possible, the reader may recite the brachot himself. If one is at high risk or is quarantined one can listen to the Zoom reading live from the Shul and follow along in their own Megillah or Chumash. This option is only acceptable for those individuals in the above situation.

When reciting the Bracha of שהחיינו during the day, one should have in mind the other mitzvot of the day: Mishloach Manot, Matanot L'evyonim, and the Purim meal. (see below)

MATANOT L'EVYONIM

One is obligated to give a gift of money, sufficient for one meal, to at least two poor people. The more the better. Funds must be available on the day of Purim. (No post-dated checks.)

The gift may be given to a third party in order to distribute on the day of Purim. Checks can

be made out to the AABJ&D Mitzvah Fund for this purpose. Or **donate online** at <u>www.aabjd.org/payment</u> and select Matanot L'veyonim. Funds will be distributed on Purim day itself. Please make your donation before Purim so that the funds can be distributed on Purim day.

MISHLOACH MANOT

One is obligated to give at least one gift to one fellow Jew on Purim day. The gift must consist of at least two items of food, ready to eat. It is preferable to send the gift via a third party.

More should be spent on Matanot L'evyonim (gifts to the poor) than on Mishloach Manot (gifts to friends) unless they are also poor.

As a reminder, the vibrant and fun manner in which many of us deliver Mishloach Manot each year has the potential to create situations where several people are gathering or visiting one another at once. If delivering, please respect the comfort level of our fellow community members by being sure to do so within the guidelines for masking and social distancing.

SEUDAT PURIM

It is obligatory to partake of a festive meal on the day of Purim. Since Purim is Friday this year, one should begin the meal prior to chatzot which is at 12:10pm. Since Purim falls out on Erev Shabbat the meal should be completed by 2:56pm, so that we can eat the Shabbos meal with an appetite. While it is considered a mitzvah to eat a meat meal, one may still fulfill the obligation for the meal even if they do not eat meat.

On Purim, the prayer בעל הניסים hanissim is added in the Shmoneh Esrei and in Bircat Hamazon (Grace after Meals).

If one forgot סעל הניסים does not repeat the tefillah (prayer).

We also added pictures of children doing kind things around school to our tree. We hope to continue to add to this tree throughout the year.

When we returned from winter break we enjoyed a few of the shivat haminim from Israel in our classrooms. Thank you to the Moradi family of Westco Fruits and Nuts for donating all of the delicious, dried fruits we tasted. It was so special to be able to try all of these new foods. They enjoyed different dried fruits such as figs, dates, apricots and raisins.

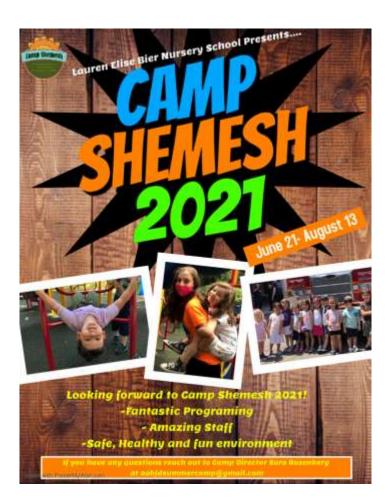

We want to thank our generous donors for helping us run these amazing Purim events!

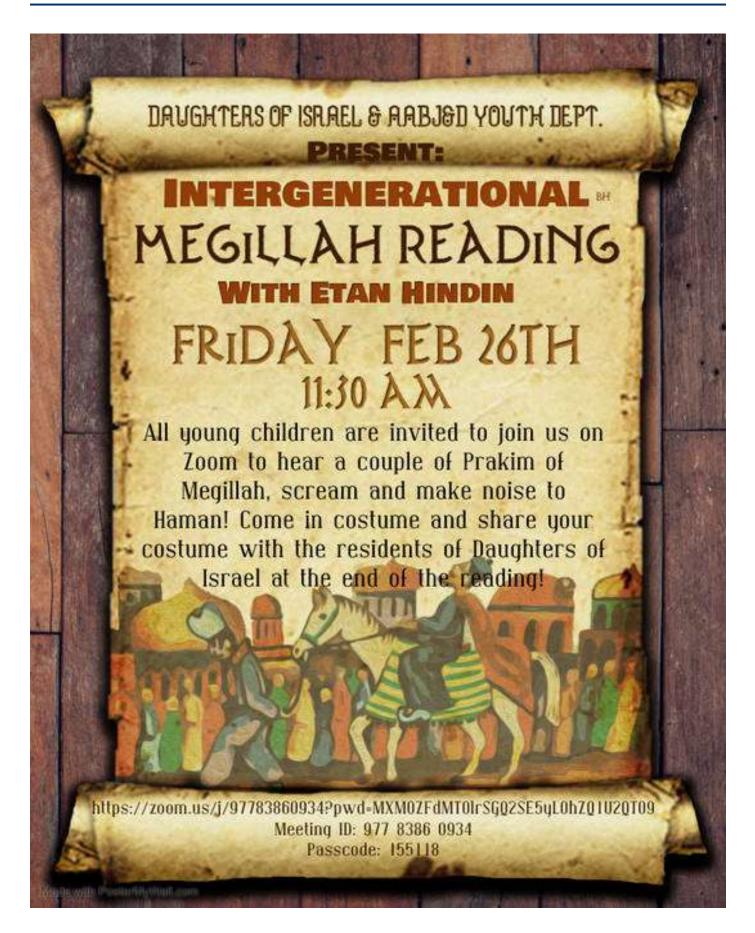

Inclusion

In the last decade, or more, February has been known as **Jewish Disabilities Awareness (Acceptance) and Inclusion month (JDAIM).**

AABJ&D was the first synagogue in West Orange to appoint an official Inclusion chair as part of its committee structure, and from those humble beginnings, it has grown to be the **West Orange Inclusion** Committee, with representatives from AABJD, Ohr Torah, Chabad, and Bnai Shalom.

Each year, the Inclusion committee identifies a theme, and then speakers, and programming, to promote the concepts of Acceptance and Inclusion, in our West Orange community, and in the broader Jewish community.

But before Accept we can and hopefully, Include, we need to be Aware. In this time of COVID, with people stuck behind their closed doors, it behooves us to remember the people for whom this period of time must be exceptionally challenging for them, with many schools and after school programs closed, with respite programs shut down, with senior programs closed down, and parks with limited availability for safe social distancing.

What we learned from our first speaker this month, Rabbi Kalman Samuels, founder and director of Shalva, the pre-eminent program for Individuals and families with special needs in Jerusalem, is that what is most important is to reach out and ask how we can help. Not to assume we know what the answer is, or to make unprompted suggestions, but to ask, "how are you doing?" and "how can I/we help?" Many times, just the Outreach is enough, and so very appreciated, when these months have been so isolating and lonely.

Another program we (co) sponsored this

month with Greater MetroWest ABLE and the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) is the presentation of Talk Saves Lives - a 45-minute introduction to the phenomenon of suicide, the signs and some ideas for prevention. Presented by AFSP Advocate (and AABJD Inclusion chair) committee Eta Levenson, presentation of TSL was followed by a question and answer period with JFS MetroWest NJ staff.

Lastly, the Inclusion Committee chose the book <u>Wonder</u> by author R J Palacio for a book discussion on disabilities and inclusion. Recently made into a hit movie with Owen Wilson and Julia Roberts, <u>Wonder</u> tells the story of a young boy who conquered multiple challenges, both medically and socially, to be able to succeed in a typical school and community environment, and in the process, also changed the way a community thinks.

The Inclusion committee continues to seek out ways to identify and help those in our Shul who feel or actually are excluded, but we rely on neighbors and friends to let us know who needs help and how we can help them. We encourage you all to think about those shul members who you haven't seen or heard from in a while, or who you know are struggling, and let us know.

New Pandemic Unemployment Assistance Program

The State of New Jersey is reaching out to claimants individually regarding their Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) claims. PUA is the program for those who are self-employed, gig economy workers, those who do not have sufficient work history for a normal unemployment claim, clergy and those working for religious organizations, and others who may not normally be entitled to traditional unemployment insurance, subject to certain eligibility criteria.
