#### THE BAR MITZVAH PROJECT AND CHANUKAH

# Dedicated in memory of my father Aharon Simcha ben Yitzhak, z"l, and my mother Mazala Aviva bat Menachem, a"h

My father never officially had a Bar Mitzvah. I just had my second. Chanukah, celebrating the dedication or, should we say, rededication of the Temple, is a minor holiday in Judaism. In fact, the question I have is why even celebrate or commemorate this event at all?

Antiochus IV, who was in control of the Middle East more than a century after the death of Alexander the Great, upended the autonomy that Alexander had given the people when he allowed them to continue to observe their own religions. Under Alexander's relatively benevolent rule, many Jews assimilated into the Hellenistic culture. They adopted the language, the customs and the dress of the Greeks. This blending into the secular society, as Jews did in Europe in the last century, and as American Jews are doing today, can be both beneficial and disastrous for Jewry.

Under Antiochus IV, the Second Temple was looted and services stopped. Judaism was outlawed. In 167 B.C.E., Antiochus prohibited *Brit Milah* (circumcision) and ordered pigs to be slaughtered on the Temple altar. These actions provoked a large-scale revolt headed by Mattityahu HaKohen and his five sons. It started with Mattityahu killing a Jew who was anxious to offer a pig as a sacrifice.

By 165 B.C.E., the Jewish revolt against the Seleucid monarchy was successful. The Temple was liberated and rededicated, and then came the miracle of the oil. The festival of Chanukah was instituted to celebrate this event.

So my question is: Why continue to celebrate Chanukah when the Temple was destroyed and never rebuilt and the Jews of the time eventually assimilated as well? In the end, everything the Maccabees fought for and won was upended.

I believe that in maintaining the joyful celebration of Chanukah, the rabbis are reminding us that not everything in life is Tisha b'Av. We need to celebrate every victory we have in order to keep our Jewishness going.

My father was eight years old when he and his family fled Poland to Russia as the Germans invaded. He never had a Bar Mitzvah. When my time came to have a Bar Mitzvah, I asked my father if he wanted to be called up for an *aliya* as a Bar Mitzvah. He didn't want to. For my Bar Mitzvah I *leined* (read) only the haftarah because, not having attended a day school, learning to *lein* the Torah would have been beyond my abilities.

With the institution of the Bat/Bar Mitzvah Project at Lincoln Square Synagogue by Dassa Gerber Greenbaum and the Chaz, I decided to (as Rabbi Shaul Robinson said) re-energize my connection to Torah. I was pushing the boundaries of my limited beliefs. I was re-dedicating my relationship with G-d in a very real concrete way.

Learning to *lein* my *aliyah* portion was difficult. I would mispronounce the same word over and over again. Then I would pronounce that word correctly in one reading, but pronounce another word incorrectly in another. Still I pressed on. Bill Caplow, my mentor, had incredible patience. Finally, just a few days before Simchat Torah, the day of the Bar Mitzvah Project, it all came together.

The lighting of the menorah is often related to education. The fifteen of us in the Bar Mitzvah Project all had an education and our own reasons for doing it. Some never had a Bar Mitzvah. Some who even went to day school never *leined* because it wasn't the custom at that time. For some, the program was easy, for others it was a challenge. Still we came together with our families and friends and re-dedicated ourselves to Torah. We were a success.

My father felt a sense of loss at not being Bar Mitzvahed, but in the end he went up for a simple *aliyah* at my Bar Mitzvah.

The Maccabees had to risk their lives. They had to go beyond their own beliefs to conquer a superior army, to re-dedicate the Temple and, in essence, themselves to G-d.

Ten years after my father's death could I have done any less for him and me?
