## THE JOY OF YOM KIPPUR

Since moving to New York to attend the Fashion Institute of Technology, I was always excited when September and October came around. In my home state of North Carolina, school breaks were almost nonexistent from the start of school in August until Thanksgiving in November. But, that's not the case in NYC. At my college, I got Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur off, as well as holidays that I didn't know how to pronounce when I first moved to New York in 2015, let alone know the meaning of. Little did I know that a few years later, I would be in the process of

converting to Orthodox Judaism and that these holidays would soon become my own.

Now my excitement for September and October has shifted from the secular fun of having a Fall break, to the joy of celebrating Yom Kippur, one of the happiest days on the Hebrew calendar. At first glance, a day of fasting and repentance might not seem joyous. But, Rabbi Shimon ben Gammliel says in the *Mishna* (*Lazar Bavli*, *Ta'anit* 30b), that, in fact, Yom Kippur is one of the happiest days of the year. On this day, Moses descended Mount Sinai after forty days of pleading with G-d to spare the Jewish people after their sin of the Golden Calf. Thankfully, G-d chose to forgive His people and gave Moses the second set of tablets containing the Ten Commandments. The 10th of Tishrei forever has a special quality of forgiveness, and since that very first Yom Kippur, Jews recite penitential prayers to tap into this powerful stream of G-d's mercy and by the end of Yom Kippur day, our slates are wiped clean. Those are certainly legitimate reasons to be happy!

But, the happiness of Yom Kippur isn't always obvious on the day itself. Most observant people are hungry and tired with sore feet from standing during the long services. It can be hard to see how this day is supposed to be happy while you're experiencing it. So, we have to look at the bigger picture of this day.

By the conclusion of a month of introspection during the Hebrew month of Elul and the Ten Days of Repentance starting on Rosh Hashana, Jews have ascended a staircase of personal growth and Yom Kippur becomes its climax. We first recite the Kol Nidre service at night to free ourselves of any vows we might have made in the past year and make in the year to come. Then we continue the next day with an extensive prayer service to beseech G-d's mercy. By the final part of the service, called *Neilah*, at the end of Yom Kippur, Jews have hopefully been forgiven for their transgressions from the past year and are hopefully sealed in the Book of Life for a good year to come. We return, in some sense, to an angelic state on this day, free of vows or sins.



CAN YOM KIPPUR REALLY BE A DAY OF JOY?

To transcend the physical world, we also refrain from five earthly pleasures: eating and drinking, bathing, wearing leather shoes, applying lotions, and marital relations. By doing so, all of our thoughts and actions become focused on prayer. There are no festive meals to prepare or guests to invite. Yom Kippur is a day set aside just for connecting with G-d to recreate, on our own level, the closeness that Moses achieved when he was with G-d.

When the Temple stood in Jerusalem, the High Priest would enter the Holy of Holies on Yom Kippur

and pray in front of the ark containing the sacred tablets that Moses received on this day. The High Priest would pronounce the holy four letter name of G-d that was not to be said at any other time. This ceremony was the climax of the whole year, as the High Priest stood on the most sacred place on Earth and said the most sacred word in the human language. The Jewish people witnessing this, undoubtedly felt the power of this moment, when the heavens descended and the high priest could speak directly into G-d's ear, as it were. All present prostrated themselves on the ground to show G-d's kingship, which is something that is still replicated today. Even though we have been without a holy Temple for nearly 2000 years and are anxiously waiting for it to be rebuilt, G-d is still close to us on Yom Kippur, waiting for His people to connect.

The joy of Yom Kippur is not the giggly fun of Purim or the boisterous enjoyment of Simchat Torah. It's the joy that comes after a month of introspection and resolution to do better. It's the joy of transcending the physical and reaching toward the spiritual. It's the joy of achieving closeness with G-d that is within our reach if we work at it.

So, instead of looking forward to September or October because it means a day off from school, I now look forward to it because this time period contains one of the happiest days of the year. A truly special holiday, unlike any other. A holiday which will soon become my own.
