## THE 30 YEAR BEGINNER

I grew up, as they say, in the Reform tradition. I had a Bar Mitzvah, I even studied for it, but in truth, I had no idea what I was doing: read here, say this, sit down. You're a Bar Mitzvah. Afterwards, we had a nice lunch where I met a bunch of distant relatives who I had never seen before, or since. (I come from a small family--with many distant cousins.)

Cut ahead 25 years: One morning, a friend of my sister's brings her to the Beginners Service at Lincoln Square Synagogue. My sister was even more of a "beginner" than I: she had no Jewish education and no real affiliation...but there was this young rabbi. He was funny, she said, charismatic and very engaging. He welcomed everyone. She was immediately enraptured. The following week she dragged my mother—then, a few weeks later, she brought me. Grudgingly.

I didn't particularly relish the idea of sitting in a windowless classroom listening to a rabbi, on a perfectly good Saturday morning when I could be sleeping. Still, I went...and this rabbi, he was *good*. He liked to mix it up, "Someone ask me a question!" He joked, he needled, he spread his infectious joy and he wouldn't allow you to hide in back, as I so desperately tried to do. He was, as my mother would say, a real *tummler*. When it was over, I tried to sneak out—but this rabbi wouldn't hear of it. I was to join him--and ten other lucky "Chosen Ones"--for lunch at his endlessly accommodating Shabbat table, that his beautiful wife managed to "effortlessly" and miraculously create every week. How could I say no? Full of trepidation, I followed the rabbi home...

We ate, we debated, we laughed, we sang--and presiding over the tumult, was this merry rabbi--slightly red in the face, banging on the table, with what can only be called an elvish gleam in his eye. When lunch was over, I walked home, a bit dazed and confused. What the heck just happened? I was so disoriented, I was sure it was *Sunday*, that the whole weekend had passed. I recall walking up Broadway wondering why no newsstand had the Sunday New York Times. Around 86th Street, I realized it was still Saturday and I had just experienced my first real Shabbat. I needed a nap.

Then a strange thing happened. I went back the following week. And the week after that...and I kept going back. Having <u>no</u> idea why. But that rabbi, he sure was entertaining and no question was off-limits. Although I didn't have the temerity to ask my seriously stupid question: Is the bound Bible-thing a word-for-word translation of the scroll-thing? (This was well before the internet--and, yes, it is, *dummy!*) Little by little, I was learning why we say the prayers we do, and practice the sometimes alien and unfamiliar (for a Beginner) rituals we do. The rabbi seemed to enjoy even more the fact

that I was a little resistant. He loved a challenge.

Cut ahead a few more years: I was involved in a long-distance relationship with a great woman on the opposite coast--on again, off again. At the time, we were off. Neither of us could commit to a city or to each other. I am, again, sitting in the Beginners Service and the rabbi "Who Shall Go Nameless" (Spoiler Alert ahead) is doing his usual thing: needling the then-Baby Boomers, "Why aren't you getting *married*?!?" he thundered. "You're all waiting for thunderbolts and

lightning! Signs from Heaven! Is this the Right One?" He paused for effect. "You build love over time. It grows and flourishes. It's the great leap of faith..."

Sitting in the back row I listened. This darn rabbi was making sense. Again.

The next day, I called my on-again-off-again girlfriend and suggested perhaps I should move to Los Angeles. It wasn't a moment too soon, as she was starting to see someone. A few weeks later, I was on a plane bound for LA.

Cut ahead a few more years (I move slowly): I called the rabbi to ask if he would mind coming to Los Angeles to marry us? He was only too happy to, but he sternly warned us, "When I marry people, they stay married."

Again he was right. Twenty-one years later, we're still married. He was also right: in long relationships love grows, evolves, burnishes and flourishes. It's a leap of faith. Amy and I now have two almost-grown daughters, 16 and 19, who are funny, sassy and brilliant. We are blessed beyond measure.

The rabbi, of course, is Ephraim Z. Buchwald. His beautiful wife is Aidel. They now have more grandchildren than I (or they?) can keep track of. The moral of this story is: If you walk into the Beginners Service, be prepared to stay. And if you're fortunate enough to have Rabbi Buchwald marry you, be prepared for it to last. And while I will always be a Beginner, even after 30 years, I am fortunate to have found a wonderful, vibrant Jewish community, in the wilds of LA, at Ikar. Come visit for Shabbat sometime.
