LAST SEDER

Last spring, my extended family spent the first two days of Passover and the following Shabbat confined to a rundown old-school Catskill resort. Like so many Jewish families, our levels of observance run a wide


gamut, with some of us praying three times a day and others praying less than three times a year. Traditionally, our Seders have been fairly stressful ordeals, as we all seek very different experiences. I can say with full confidence that at our Seders, all four of the fabled sons attend and live up to their reputations. This is the reality of the modern Jewish experience, but, thankfully, it does not remove our affection for one another, nor does it undermine the fabric of our family.

A few years ago, at the age of 54, my Aunt Lora was diagnosed with cancer of unknown origin. Doctors worked extensively to unearth the source of her malady with no success. I am not surprised that my aunt

was afflicted by an illness whose source could not be determined. Aunt Lora, with her booming voice, large physical presence and abundance of love, only did things "big." If you did something that bothered her, you can be assured that you would clearly understand the error of your ways. She had five children and was the best cook I have ever known. Her Shabbat and Yom Tov meals were true festivals, and I have never been to a home that rivals either the quality or quantity of her foods.

In 2001, when she was clearly deteriorating, she declared that she wanted to host one last Passover so that the younger members of our family would remember it. In 2002, as her health continued to erode and she became weaker, she rallied for another set of Seders, which she held with the help of her community in Oceanside. By 2003, this once powerful woman, whom the medical community expected to expire long before, could barely move, let alone host a thirty person Seder, which required weeks of baking and preparation.

My grandmother, who was in the process of losing a daughter, was not willing to lose the family Passover. Since our traditional hostess was no longer up to the task, she requested that we all head upstate to share our Seder together as a family at a "resort." Clearly, the hotel needed some work, and my sister and I joked that some of the guests hadn't left the lobby since the 1950s. Although few of us would have chosen to spend

room, we foolishly expected each table to host their own Seder. We were thus caught off-guard when we discovered that we were sitting in the midst of a giant communal Seder punctuated by a choir. Not exactly what this family was looking for! Needless to say, conducting a dueling rival Seder in the middle of the dining room did not make us a lot of friends, nor, frankly, was it a good experience for ourselves.

On the second night, we got smart. Taking all of the Seder table elements, we set up a nomadic makeshift Seder table in the hotel lobby using couches, cocktail tables and bar stools. In this vast kitschy lobby, Aunt Lora's wheelchair no longer seemed out of place, as we all sat on different chairs. It was the

best Seder of my life. Relatives who have never stayed beyond "the festive meal" were present for Hallel, grace after meal and *Chad Gad yah*. For the first time in our family's Seder history--we all seemed to be rowing in the same direction. On the first night, the Seder we sought was unavailable; on night two we had a sense of urgency and purpose. It was typical Jewish history--once our right to have a Seder was taken away, we would not allow ourselves to miss it! It seems ironic that after so many lavish and stressful Seders in Oceanside, our best Seder performance would be on the floor of a beat-up hotel lobby.

On May 11, 2003, my aunt passed away. I had visited her in the hospital that afternoon and was saddened to see this transcendent person finally transcend. Like everyone who has been touched by someone cial, I know that Aunt Lora will always be with us. Sharing her Passover with her, as we had shared so many Seders with her in the past, was deeply meaningful. Indeed, that Passover was all the more special as it was the first time it felt as if we were all really together. That will be Aunt Lora's enduring gift and legacy. We were all there, we were all involved, all because of her.
