"WE WANT LATKES"

What do you mean, No Latkes????

ust the other day, my husband and our 3 children began discussing ble ideas for Chanukah. They worked on me as a team until it was finally agreed that it was our turn to invite everyone to our home. As the discussion turned into plans, the kids (ages 11, 13 and 15) took it upon themselves to instruct me about the menu, the time, the length -- they were very thorough. In fact, they thought they had all the plans just right, until I announced that I wouldn't be making latkes (fried potato pancakes) this year. Oh, I might buy them, but, if I had my way, we

would try serving something crusty and perfect for dipping into the necessary oil. I can make a tasty olive oil dip, with favorite spices, served just so, etc.

The harangue that followed nearly made me cower! Nevertheless, I reminded them of the trans-fats. Why would I want to feed our guests (a large crew) such unhealthy food? Desperately, I recalled for them the lingering smell of oil in the house and that Chanukah is in the middle of the winter. They surely did not want me to be frozen by the open windows necessary to clear the smoke and smell from the kitchen. Besides, I didn't want to be in the kitchen while everyone else was relaxing in the next room.

"I really won't have time," I heard myself whine. "If we must have latkes, I'll get some of those frozen ones."

Oh NO! they pounced, ready with an arsenal of arguments: They aren't real latkes. How can anyone eat them? That's what the school serves. If we don't eat them there, why would we want them here?

The battle ended in a draw, but the war was not over. Even after our te of "homemade" versus "store-bought," latkes danced in my mid. for days and nights. I recalled the first Chanukah bash we had together, and the annual tradition it had become. I fried for hours. Each year my repertoire of flavors grew. I've served plain potato and sweet potato. The white potatoes had their assorted variations: black pepper, red pepper, cabbage, rosemary, dill, carrot, zucchini, and jalapeno pepper. The sweet potatoes were served plain or with carrots, raisins, apples... If I haven't tried it yet, it's only because I haven't thought of it. My latkes are not only un-plain, they are uniquely shaped. I figured early on in my latke-experimenting days that uniqueness could be multidimensional. My latkes look a lot like birds nests, and they're pretty crunchy. Undoubtedly, making them only one week each year has added to the joy of seeing and eating them. In fact, I would even go as far as to say one's mouth might water thinking of them.

But not this year, not with all the time and energy involved in latkes from shopping to preparing to cleaning up. I even smiled as I thanked my husband, Steven, for saving me the recipes from the *Times* last Sunday. Why argue about it again? After all, I'm pretty firm in my resolve. I have deliberately *not* started menu planning yet. As you may have gathered, I'm having a hard time with this. After all, making a new plan this year would be in keeping with my entertaining style. Not many have ever seen the same meal twice in my house. Maybe I'm menued out for Chanukah!

Finally it came to me. This whole argument has to do with tradition. Nearly everything we do is traditional and I've often mused over why must we always eat the same foods? The answer: Because, or at least that's part of the answer. Because we serve what people like to eat. Because we remember the last cruse of olive oil (not nearly as much as I would need). Because its not so bad to serve unhealthy food once in a while. Because my family asked me to. Because I get gratification watching people enjoy my latkes. Because we like them and they (everyone's) really are delicious. Because we don't know what else to serve on Chanukah. Because it wouldn't be a

proper Chanukah without them!

Truthfully, I guess, I really don't mind making them. If they want latkes, I shall feed them latkes (homemade, of course). Why did I even think I wouldn't make latkes? I always do, even when I say I won't. Perhaps it's laziness, or uncertainty and trepidation. What if they aren't as good as everyone remembers? What if I don't get around to it? What if there isn't enough time? And how awful is it, really, to freeze while I'm frying away in the kitchen? The latkes must be fresh! (Timing is everything.) What if I can't make enough? Its happened (no matter how many dozens of eggs and tens of pounds of potatoes). Surely, there have never been any leftovers. Who would want them anyway?

So now I must ask: has anybody got a really interesting latke recipe? Something more to accompany the applesauce, the chutney, the sour cream, the soups and the veggies as well? After all, latkes are a must while we are singing all the favorite songs about the Maccabees. All those same songs and stories, year after year, while the glow of the candles charm our home into a timeless haven of Jewishness.
