AND YOU SHALL TEACH THEM TO YOUR CHILDREN

In Judaism, when we speak of teaching our children, we use the Hebrew word chinuch. Chinuch can be translated as

to teach and to dedicate, and so it is particularly approe to reflect upon *chinuch* during the month of Kislev, the month in which we celebrate Chanukah. What is significant about *chinuch* in Kislev? The three Hebrew letters used to spell *chinuch*, *Chet*, *Nun* and *Kaf*, also form the root of the word Chanukah, which is spelled *Chet*, *Nun*, *Kaf*, *Hay*. Chanukah, while it is a commemoration of the re-dedication of the Temple, is also considered by many Jews to be primarily, a children's holiday. Indeed, for many children Chanukah is the most anticipated of all Jewish holidays.

The mitzvah of teaching your children is so important that the commandment is pronounced twice daily during the recitation of the Shema. It is a mitzvah on par with the mitzvot of *tefillin*, *mezuzah* and *tzitzit*, which are also mentioned in the *Shema*.

From my own perspective, I can only state that it is my sincere hope that I am fulfilling this mitzvah to the best of my abilities. I am the proud father of two beautiful girls, Laurel and Audrey, and one of the highlights of my week is taking my daughters to the Beginners Service at Lincoln Square Synagogue, a pleasure we have enjoyed since January 2001. Laurel, who is five, accompanies me most Shabbat mornings. Sometimes I also take Audrey, who is almost three. For all of us, it has truly been a great learning experience.

Laurel delights in the singing and dancing that are, in my opinion, the soul of the service. Even though she is usually the youngest person in the congregation, Rabbi Buchwald makes her feel recognized and important, just like he does for all the "grown-ups." Most of the time she stays for the whole service (aided, of course, by a steady supply of kosher snacks). Laurel usually sits next to me, but she often sneaks around the mechitzah to sit with some of the women with whom she has become friendly.

Whatever my own progress, it is amazing to see how Laurel is truly developing davening (praying) skills. She knows when to bow. She has learned the words to several of the livelier songs, and joins in enthusiastically when we sing V'ha'er-ay'nay'nu, Hatov and Yismechu. In fact, Laurel recently started reciting the first few lines of Adon Olam quite distinctly.

Most of all, I think, Laurel looks forward to kiddush, where she gets to sit like a queen on a throne of chairs that have been stacked up against the wall. She has come proficient at making the *brachot* for her grape juice and the cherry pastry, th of which, no matter how hard I try, always seem to end up on her dress.

In addition to the Beginners Service, our family has enjoyed going to Shabbat lunches. I can't say that Laurel has acquired a taste for *chulent*, but she (and I) have learned many wonderful songs. We love singing *Yom Ze Mechubad*, or as she and Audrey refer to it as, the "toot-toot" song. The kids also love going to *Seuda Shlishit*



(the third Shabbat meal). Their main motivation, I believe, is to be able to have a chance of holding the *Havdallah* candle, but they are nearly as thrilled just to be able to stand on the *bimab* in the dark while we sing *Eliyahu Hanavi*.

Our home life has not gone unaffected by our involvement with the Beginners Service. We have incorporated more Jewish rituals and observances into our lives. The Shema has even become part of our nightly bedtime ritual. On Friday nights, the girls look forward to lighting and blessing their own candle alongside Marci, their mother. Our zemirot were initially "Shabbat Bear" and "I Had a Little Challah," which are fine, but now we've expanded our repertoire to include more traditional fare such as Shalom Aleichem, Ka-Ribon and Yom-zehlYisrael. We're not yet close to what anyone would call being "Shomer Shabbat," but I have tried to give the children a taste of the traditional Sabbath. We turn the TV off on Friday nights

before lighting Shabbat candles, and we take the stairs, rather than use the elevator. More recently, we've even encouraged the use of Shabbat toilet paper, which the girls find highly amusing.

In addition to the new rituals, our immersion into Jewish life has also raised some interesting and thought provoking questions. Laurel has asked questions having to do with such issues as the nature of G-d, the *mechitzah* and the role of women. She's asked for example, "Can I put on the *tefillin* too?" Astutely, she has noted and inquired about the paucity of women at services other than Shabbat morning. I try to encourage her natural curiosity and inquisitiveness, and we use her questions as learning opportunities. This can be challenging, since I'm often in the position of discussing issues that I have not yet resolved for myself.

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One of the most significant factors motivating my bringing the children to the Beginners Service and other activities has been my desire to enrich the depth and breadth of their exposure to Jewish life. My intention is to foster the development of their "Yiddishe neshama" (Jewish soul or identity). While in past generations, this may have been an organic process that required little conscious effort, our lives in 21st century America have become so thoroughly immersed in secular activity and culture that I felt the need to be pro-active. I knew that there was much that I did not know about Judaism and wouldn't be able to transmit to our children, so I came to Lincoln Square.

Foremost in mind when involving myself with the mitzvah of *chinuch* is the understanding that a strong adult Jewish identity and positive Jewish feelings evolve from positive childhood Jewish experiences. With its stories of heroism and miracles and its easy-to-follow mitzvot, Chanukah is the perfect holiday for evoking just that positive identification. Certainly there is more to Jewish education than that, but we couldn't ask for a better start.
