## "Welcoming Ruth...and Marilyn and Richard and..."

Why is it customary to study the Book of Ruth on Shavuot? Why on this holiday, when we mark the day that the Jewish people received the Torah and became a "Chosen People," do we also remember the extraordinary story of the Moabite woman Ruth? It is not as if there is a lack of other appropriate Jewish texts. Indeed, over the past 3,000 years we have amassed quite a collection of rabbinic commentaries, historical perspectives and, of course, sacred texts themselves. However, on Shavuot we specifically dedicate our time and effort to understanding the invaluable contributions and lessons to be learned from Ruth.

As a beginner, I often feel particularly connected with the Book of Ruth, and to me it is clear why it was chosen as the primary text of study for Shavuot. While Ruth eventually became the great-grandmother of King David, she was not born into a family steeped in Jewish tradition-indeed, she was not even born into a Jewish family. Ruth was the quintessential outsider. Not only was she not Jewish, but she was from the nation of Moab, with whom the Jews at that time had a not-so-

friendly border relationship. More than that, the rabbis tell us that she was the daughter of the king of Moab! As you can see, Ruth was far from the type of person one would expect to become the great-grandmother of King David.

After the death of her husband, the son of a wealthy Jewish expatriate who had fled to Moab to avoid famine, Ruth chose to remain with her widowed mother-in-law, Naomi. When Naomi decided that it was time to return to her home in Bethlehem, Ruth went with her. Even when Naomi tried to send her back, Ruth refused and declared that she would remain with Naomi, that she wished to be part of Israel and accept the laws of Israel and the G-d of Israel. Living under Naomi's roof had inspired Ruth to join the People of Israel.

It's not easy to be the stranger, and I don't just mean a convert. It is not easy to walk into a traditional synagogue, where much of the ritual is foreign, even to one born and raised Jewish. But Ruth saw beyond the fact that she would be a stranger. She was inspired by everything that she had learned in Naomi's household and she knew that this was the life to which she aspired. Unfortunately, not everyone in Bethlehem understood that Ruth felt so passionately about the Jewish people. Naomi and Ruth were ostracized-Naomi because her husband had taken his family and fled during the famine instead of helping his neighbors, and Ruth because she was a member of a foreign nation.

Having seen the true beauty of Jewish life, however, Ruth was not deterred. Since they were totally impoverished, Ruth went out to the fields of Bethlehem to glean from the leftovers of the harvest. As you can imagine, this was quite a lifestyle change for a former princess, but Ruth did not complain.

Ruth's patience and kindness of spirit did not go unnoticed. Boaz, the wealthy man who owned the field in which she went to gather food, saw beyond her foreign appearance, her past history and the suspicions of the local people. He saw in Ruth the essence of a Jewish soul, the drive to do for others and to serve G-d properly. And when, at the harvest festival, Ruth presented herself as a possible wife, Boaz did not hesitate to go against public opinion and marry her. From this union, the grandfather of King David was born.

What does this have to do with being a Beginner at Shavuot time? When the Jews came out of Egypt, the sages tell us that they were almost completely assimilated, except for their dress, their language and their names. They came forth out of Egypt as strangers to the traditions of their ancestors, Abraham and Sarah, Isaac and Rebecca, Jacob and Leah and Rachel.

Isaac and Rebecca, Jacob and Leah and Rachel. But they wanted to follow the path that G-d set before them, and they accepted the Torah.

Today, we have many people who are coming from near complete assimilation, who have come to the conclusion that they want to more fully live their lives as Jews. And each Beginner comes with his/her own "different" appearance, his/her unique history, and are faced with the suspicions of the "locals." We live in a society where, too often, many times to our own detriment, we fail to invite in the opinions, thoughts and perspectives of others. Within our small Jewish community, we somehow manage to make it even smaller by placing boxes around individuals, and choosing to rely only on those people who fit into our box.

On Shavuot we can learn much from Boaz. He took a leap of faith that what he saw in Ruth was real, that, different as she might be, her drive and passion was her true self. We too, must take a leap of faith and recognize that sometimes, in order to prosper and flourish, we can learn from the outsider, who has so much to offer.

As for my own perspective, I am so grateful that the LSS Beginners Service and an organization like NJOP exist, welcoming people with different Jewish experiences and backgrounds to learn together. At the Beginners Services at Lincoln Square, Shabbat dinners, shmoozes and benefits, no one is considered an outsider and it is this all-embracing environment that reflects the best the Jewish people can offer to the community. After all, we Jews have much more that binds us together, than separates us.
