Dear friends:

I'm writing from my new home in Tel Aviv, sitting in my room and peering out of my window, where every Friday morning I see the streets bustling with people. Although it's similar to the hustle and bustle in the streets of New York, I know that planning on Friday morning in Israel means that the entire country is preparing for Shabbat. It's the most comforting feeling to know that all the people here are working toward the same goal.

Friday mornings aren't the only days that the comforting feeling takes hold of me. When I first arrived in Israel, I was nervous about the different holidays. "With whom will I celebrate?" I asked myself. I didn't want to impose on anyone.

To my relief, I soon began to realize that in Eretz Yisrael there are two things that are assured. I will never find myself short of a single bite to eat, nor will I ever lack a table at which to enjoy the food. I think that I am already booked for Shabbat dinners and holidays until the year 6008.

I remember being really disappointed last year because we couldn't go to Israel for Pesach. But, when I said "Next year in Jerusalem," I guess I really meant it. This Pesach was great. I spent Seder with family in Hedera and we had a wonderful time. Everyone here was more than hospitable. It felt as if I was invited to almost every Seder table in Israel!

This Pesach, as we read the Haggadah, I had visions of the previous Pesach, when I was standing at the podium of the Beginners Service (where Rabbi Buchwald thoughtfully volunteered me for that week's *D'var Torah*). I never could have imagined when I was standing before the congregation that I would have the courage to make Aliyah to Israel.

And yet, it was only a matter of days after arriving in Israel on a layover on my way to Shanghai, for a job offer (and probably to live there), that I realized that Israel was not just a pit stop. I had traveled to Israel many times before, but this was the first time that a feeling of great exuberance overcame me. I no longer desired to travel to a foreign land where the people didn't understand me, where everything would be a struggle -- finding kosher food to eat, finding a place to daven. I realized that I am the happiest and the most fulfilled in life when I am in Israel.

I can certainly attest to the fact that the Beginners Service prepared



me for my journey. When I first arrived, I received phone calls from family of friends in the states, friends of friends, distant relatives, all wondering why I hadn't come to them for a visit and a meal

This is what Aliyah is all about -- wholeness. I feel the same wholeness when I bring my flat mates together for a Shabbat dinner, in our home,

I can recall the first few Shabbat dinners I prepared. I live with all Israelis who are not religious, and I asked, "Who wants to say Kiddush?" Excitedly, one of my roommates volunteered to recite the Kaddish. I jokingly told her that we are all

humanitarians and that I'd be happy to say a mourner's prayer for the meat, but only after we say Kiddush. As we say here in Israel *l'at l'at* (step-by-step). It won't be long before I have taught my Israeli roommates everything that I know from Beginners Service.

as a family.

Life has been great for me here in Israel. It has always been my dream to live here. All of the students from my college's Hillel who come on Birthright trips call me when they arrive, and I show them around Tel Aviv. They all say that it is so inspiring to see me here when they visit, and it makes them think of how realistic a possibility Aliyah really is.

Now I have the true sense of what family, tradition, and togetherness mean. Making the decision to live in Israel was my first step toward the fulfillment of that dream.

So friends, I am writing from my new home, to tell you about my new life, with hopes that one day I will have the pleasure of hosting one of you at my Shabbat table. If I promise to let you say Kiddush, will you join me?
