My earliest memories of a synagogue are very pleasant. When I was about five, my father was President of the shul and sat on a large, ornately carved armchair next to the ark were the Torahs were kept. It was very clear to me that he was a big shot -- probably a king or something equally stupendous -- which meant that my brother and I had the run of the joint. My mother, and everyone else's, sat upstairs in a balcony overlooking the action on the main floor.

The rabbi was a very elderly man with a long white beard (before Rabbi Buchwald, I would have said, "Isn't every rabbi?!). He

never seemed to leave the corner where he sat with his tallis covering his head. The exception was on Simchas Torah, when he would lead a procession of children up and down the aisles of the shul, all of us carrying paper flags topped with apples.

After my brother's Bar Mitzvah, we happily fled Hebrew school the environment, substituting piano lessons, Girl Scouts, and football practice to the fill the void. after-school continued to observe the major holidays -- Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Chanukah, and Passover --

but never entered a synagogue in between.

And so, while I always knew there was more to being Jewish than fasting on Yom Kippur and eating latkes on Chanukah, I never truly appreciated the many pleasures found in a life of Jewish observance. It was only when I discovered the Beginners Service and embarked on my own journey of discovery that these joys became so clear to me.

First, of course, is Shabbat. I would definitely classify it as a miraculous concept -- surpassing even fax machines and pantyhose that don't run. Taking a full day each week out of my chronically overbooked schedule seemed like an impossible request. Friday, after all, was manicure night, and my Saturday

shopping excursions were legendary. The list of prohibitions was daunting.

These days, though, I've come to anticipate Shabbat for all the things it allows me to do, rather than the things it prevents me from doing. I have time to spend with my friends and actually talk to them, face to face. I have time to read a book. I have time to rest, stroll, laugh, daydream, and watch the busy crowds. Now, I'll be the first to admit that taking one day off makes the other six proportionately more insane, but without that one day, all seven would be indistinguishable.


Also worth mention is experience of the celebrating a year's worth of holidays and seeing it begin all over again. For me, the years seem to be measured from Purim Shpiel to Purim Shpiel. Each season brings its own observances -- not all of ther happy --- but alway. underscoring the cyclical nature of life. Besides, each time a holiday is repeated, I have another chance to look less like a Beginner!

Most significant, perhaps, was the sense of connection to my heritage. As the child of

a Holocaust survivor, I've always been very aware of my Jewishness, but never more so than the first time I heard Havdalah. I stood in the darkness, mesmerized by the bright flame, listening to the congregation as it sang. The thought occurred to me that thousands of Jews around the world were saying the <u>same</u> prayer at the <u>same</u> moment. It was almost overwhelming, but at the same time I felt a strong sense of belonging to a greater whole.

I couldn't imagine any other place I'd rather be.
