ONE KIND ACT DESERVES ANOTHER

Working at the National Jewish Outreach Program, I hear inspiring and moving stories every day. Children whose parents have taken the Hebrew Reading Crash Course are now attending weekly services; men and women in a Hebrew class in California are brought to soaring emotional heights as they master "Dayenu" in time for Passover; and a volunteer instructor, despite his busy schedule, teaches two simultaneous HRCC classes.

The real power of these stories, is not in each one's individual poignancy, but in the idea that in reaching one individual, one family, one class or one instructor, NJOP is actually touching the lives of hundreds, if not thousands of Jews. By training one volunteer to teach

a class, or to conduct a Beginners Service, NJOP is providing a Jewish education to all those who attend the program, and perhaps to many of their friends and families as well. That one individual can, through a simple act, influence the lives of many others in a meaningful way, is both a Jewish concept and a Jewish spectation.

I recently heard a story that delivers this message in a most striking manner: Many years ago, a woman went to Lincoln Square Synagogue to hear a rabbi speak at a Shabbaton. She was immediately struck by the warm atmosphere of

the synagogue and impressed by the rabbi's enthusiasm and charisma. She soon became a 'regular' at the synagogue and a part of the community.

Esther Judith Manischewitz developed a strong connection to the synagogue and to the dynamic rabbi she encountered there, Rabbi Ephraim Buchwald. Mrs. Manischewitz described him as being, "a very different kind of rabbi than any I've known. He welcomes everyone, and he has a wonderful sense of humor."

Many years after Mrs. Manischewitz's first visit to Lincoln Square, she was hospitalized. Upon returning home, she received a phone call from one of the members of the Beginners Service, Liane Wolff (then Liane White), who heard that Mrs. Manischewitz was alone at home and wondered if she would like some company.

Despite the disparity in their ages, (Liane not yet ...arried, and Mrs. Manischewitz was soon to turn 80), the two women quickly became friends. Only a few weeks later, Passover arrived and, due to complications resulting from her illness, Mrs. Manischewitz was

unable to attend her family's out-of-town Seder. Liane arranged for Mrs. Manischewitz to join her for a seder at the home of LSS member, Stuart Blaustein.

Mrs. Manischewitz was "very appreciative" of the interest Liane took in her, and during her weeks of recuperation at home, began to think about the impact these events had made on her.

Mrs. Manischewitz had grown up in Cincinnati, Ohio, a city still considered to be, "the stronghold of the Reform movement." Her parents were active Zionists and adhered to orthodox Jewish values and traditions. Yet, she recalls, "I didn't grow up in a way that was spiritual. Shabbos was a list of things you couldn't do." Throughout her adult life, Mrs.

Manischewitz remained active in Jewish organizations, always feeling a strong connection to the Jewish people.

Her experiences at Lincoln Square Synagogue, with Rabbi Buchwald, and with the generosity and compassion of LSS member, Wolff, inspired Manischewitz to become more involved. "I felt that I wanted something more," she explains. It was at that point that she contacted Rabbi Buchwald and asked to meet with

him. "If outreach programs could

attract people like Liane, I thought I should look further into it," Mrs. Manischewitz said. Aware of the alarming statistics on intermarriage and assimilation, and intrigued by Rabbi Buchwald's methods of drawing Jews back to Judaism, Mrs. Manischewitz began attending the Beginners Service herself, and offered to help support the efforts of the National Jewish Outreach Program.

Mrs. Manischewitz has since sponsored several NJOP events and advertising campaigns, simply saying, "I get a lot of satisfaction out of feeling that whatever I can do will help other people."

It all began with one act of kindness, one measure of chesed performed by one person for another. This single act of chesed has grown exponentially. Today, Esther Judith Manischewitz's involvement with the National Jewish Outreach program enables thousands to attend Hebrew Reading Crash Courses, Basic Judaism classes, Beginners Services and TURN FRIDAY NIGHT INTO SHABBOS programs.
