When I was asked to write about my experiences for this journal I agreed, wondering all the while how I could make vivid the process of my spiritual growth from empty to enriched. My experience is not unique, but it is extreme in that I was raised with virtually no religion whatsoever. As avowed secularists, my parents got "secular" Christmas trees and took the kids on "secular" Easter egg hunts, generally ignoring the "religious" holidays. Sometimes we visited Disneyland on Yom Kippur or Rosh Hashanah, when Jewish kids were out of school, and the lines were short.

According to the logic of the time, we were simply trying to make good use οf the school vacation days, since the holidays and the synagogue were not a part of our lives. The first time I remember actually visiting a synagogue was for my classmates' Bar and Bat Mitzvahs, which were not -vactly religious events. In ct, until adulthood I knew no prayers, no rituals, and little Jewish history.

Even so, for a variety of reasons, remarkably, I still managed to maintain a Jewish ethnic sensibility, as did all of my family members. Yet, I knew all along that the basis of the culture with

which I identified was the religion from which I was cut off, and this prompted me to begin trying to learn something about Judaism.

Unfortunately, my sporadic attempts to visit synagogue services during high school and college usually left me feeling frustrated and like an outsider, because I could not follow the service and didn't understand the point of much of what was happening. It was assumed, that if I was there, I knew what I was doing, because, of course, people my age, who were not religiously involved, didn't bother going. Overall, I found an institutional indifference to the Jewish novice, with the exception of ultra-Orthodox sects, who seemed geared toward ne Jewish proselyte, and Reform programs which were directed toward inter-faith couples and

conversion. Neither approach suited my needs. Finding no niche for me, when I first tried to explore Jewishly, delayed my learning for many years.

Fortuitously, I heard about L.S.S.' Beginners Minyan which had been designed specifically with people like me in mind --curious and interested, but not Jewishly knowledgeable. The first time I went, I had to stand outside with the overflow crowd in the hall, and could barely hear the service.

Still, I was impressed to see all the "normal" looking folks who had gotten up early on a Saturday morning to learn about Judaism. The warmth and enthusiasm of the rabbi were

also encouraging. Initially, I came back very sporadically, and later more consistently. I looked forward to being challenged and moved intellectually on Saturday mornings. I also started to feel that finally, I was part of a Jewish community.

The internal changes occurred gradually through reading, taking classes, and talking to others. But, what I got out of the experience was, and is, incalculably precious to me. By learning, I was able to formulate my religious ideas based on information and knowledge,

rather than on rumor or conjecture. I could no longer reject what I didn't know, just because I didn't know.

Finding myself grounded spiritually has given me a feeling of wholeness. It's a bit like getting a sense you never knew you had. Life was fine before, but now it's that much richer, and there's no turning back!

I offer my deepest thanks to Rabbi Buchwald for recognizing the spiritual needs of people like myself, and hope that he will continue to reach out and enrich the lives of many more people.
