I don't remember a time when I didn't know my mother was Jewish and came from a Ukrainian Jewish family. And even though my maternal aunts sprinkled their conversations with Yiddish, I was sent to Catholic schools. As they say on Facebook: It's complicated. My mother was estranged from her parents and from Judaism. I never had a childhood Passover seder meal. The Haggadah was unknown to me. We did eat matzah brei occasionally for breakfast because my Sicilian American dad liked how it tasted, especially combined with a slab or two of bacon. Have I mentioned that my childhood was a mishmash? My mother made prune butter hamantaschen in the spring and called them triangle cookies.

I FIRST LEARNED ABOUT THE

While I didn't really know exactly what it meant to be Jewish, even though I was raised as a Catholic, I did know that I was a Jew. By the sixth grade I read and identified with Primo Levi, the only Italian Jew I knew about. As a young adult I read the Hebrew Bible as literature, and found it to be a great book, full of great stories, and amazing characters, indeed, whole

families of them; seemingly written in a variety of styles and containing passages of poetry that moved me.

While I hadn't yet "come out as a Jew," I attended and even cohosted a few seder meals together with my Jewish second wife, her Conservadox family, and a few Jewish neighbors, various and sundry friends. It was as an adult that I began to learn what Passover was about. The themes of oppression, resistance, freedom, the rituals of the seder, questions, discussions, the cups of wine, all appealed to my long-standing leftist political associations, and my sense that community and solidarity were essential for anything good to be accomplished in a difficult, often hostile, world.

Then I met a charismatic rabbi; I know what you are thinking, no, not Rabbi Buchwald, he was waiting somewhere in the future, still unknown to me. The charismatic rabbi I met was Rabbi Sarah, a woman with whom I became friends because we shared a strong interest in poetry. Over the course of years and through the twists and turns of our hearts seeking completion in each other, Sarah and I became partners in life.

Through my life with a religious, Zionist woman I became immersed in Jewish holidays, her family gatherings, and the important Friday night rituals of blessing the wine, blessing male and female children, washing of hands, blessing the bread, and the Shabbat songs she sang beautifully after we had eaten. Sarah gave me a Hebrew primer which I studied just like kids in grade Aleph do (it had illustrative drawings!), and slowly and with much effort I learned

to recognize Hebrew letters and to pronounce the sounds they make.

We went to *Kabbalat Shabbat* and Shabbat morning services at a number of Upper West Side synagogues, but I found it very difficult to follow in my baby Hebrew, and the underlying structure of the service was largely lost on me. Still the singing appealed to me greatly and I learned some of the melodies well enough to hum them to myself between Saturdays.

At kiddush meals sometimes my first name attracted blank stares or questions about how an "Angelo" came to be Jewish. But

most congregants were welcoming, and it was at a birthday of a friend whom we met at kiddush that I finally met Rabbi Buchwald. I was taken by his Bronx accent, his Catskill sense of humor, and his commitment to help aspiring converts and those like myself who were underdeveloped as Jews to learn and grow. I started attending the Beginners Service at Lincoln Square Synagogue, and through the

National Jewish Outreach Program Hebrew classes began a more systematic and communal study of Hebrew.

Again it took time, but I became more comfortable with the Hebrew alphabet and could arduously sound out the Amidah, also learning when and how to bow while praying.

I became bar mitzvah on Simchat Torah 2017 when I received an *aliyah* and chanted Torah. The *bencher* I received that day with my name on it is one of my most prized possessions. Finally, I became a Jewish adult! My maternal grandfather Chaim Gerber, who I barely knew, must be kvelling. Even now, as I write this, I'm tearing up a bit. My Jewish journey, my personal exile hasn't been easy or quick.

For the last few years I have helped Sarah in bringing Passover seders and services to an assisted living facility in Albany, NY, where residents and their families can join with the entire Jewish People in our journey away from bondage to the freedom to be a nation and worship as my ancestors did. It means so much to me to be a part of this, to claim my delayed birthright and to fully own my Jewishness.
