

#### Parshat Nasso - A Nazir's tale

Parshat Nasso is a continuation of last week's Bamidbar in that it discusses the different families of Levi and their responsibilities carrying components of the Mishkan. Kehas carried the Ark, table and menorah, Gershon carried the curtains, and Merari carried the boards and bars. The parsha then discusses a *Nazir, one who takes special vows not to drink wine, alcohol, or anything made from grapes and can't cut his hair or come into a contact with the deceased. The Haftorah of Nasso describes the birth of the most famous Nazir, Shimshon, the mighty Samson. An angel appeared to his mother and told her not to drink wine or alcohol because she would have a son, who would be a Nazir and save the Jewish people from the Philistines. At the end of the Haftorah, she gives birth to a son, and names him Shimshon.* 

Shimshon had immense strength. He fought the Philistines, who could not defeat him, no matter how many soldiers they sent. Finally, they set a honey trap. They sent a beautiful woman named Delila, who became friendly with Shimshon in order to discover the source of his strength. First Shimshon told her that if he were tied with seven ropes, he would be helpless. Delila tied him in seven ropes and when the Philistines came in, Shimshon tore off the ropes and defeated them. When Delila asked again, Shimshon told her that wrapping him in chains would make him lose his strength. Delila wrapped him in chains and again he broke them. Finally, he told her the truth, that his strength existed because he never cut his hair. When Delila cut his hair, the Philistines took him as prisoner in their temple. One day, they brought Shimshon out of the dungeon to be their entertainment. Shimshon prayed to Hashem for his strength to come back one last time. Hashem answered his prayers and Shimshon pushed down the walls of the temple, crushing himself and the Philistine army.



# When should the priests bless the people?

In the mid-18<sup>th</sup> century, the esteemed Vilna Gaon sought to overturn established *minhag*. It was his great dream to restore the daily ritual of *birkat kohanim*, the priestly blessing. Among Ashkenazi Jews, it was then the practice – as it is today in the Diaspora – for the priests to bless the people only on the festivals.

According to Rav Chayyim of Volozhin, at first the Gaon did not dare to act. Then, passion overtook him. He declared that at the next morning's *shacharit* prayer, this daily recitation would begin. It would be the new *minhag* of his Beit Midrash. Within hours, however, he was falsely accused and arrested – effectively foiling his plans.

Why was *birkat kohanim* so important to the Gaon? Partly, it was the belief that the *mitzvot* had to be restored to their pristine beauty. This *mitzvah* had been corrupted over time and it required correction. Maimonides clearly affirms that *birkat kohanim* is to be said daily (*Sefer Hamitzvot* 336).

On a deeper level, it is said, the Gaon sought to rush the Days of Redemption. As *birkat kohanim* had been said each day in the Temple, the return of this daily rite would bring the time of the messiah one step closer. After several aborted tries, however, the Gaon came to believe that Heaven, itself, did not wish it.

The priestly blessing reflects the profound connection between the Almighty and the Jewish people. In his commentary on *birkat kohanim*, Abravanel tells us that the word *bracha* has several distinct meanings. When God blesses us, the word *bracha* describes an abundance streaming from Him to us. When we bless one another, as a parent blesses his child, the word *bracha* means supplication; we are asking God to shower goodness on the recipient. Yet, when we make our *brachot* over food or in prayer, when we say our blessings, we are not transferring bounty; in this context, *bracha* means praise.

In ascending to the *bima*, the priests have a complex role. It is true that God requires the *kohanim* to bless the people: "Speak unto Aaron and his sons saying, thus you shall bless the children of Israel (6:22-23)." The priests are the necessary channel through which the blessing flows. In this light, we might understand *birkat kohanim* to mean supplication, a request for overflowing goodness.

Yet, it is also clear that this blessing comes from God. *Birkat kohanim* ends with the verse, "And they shall put My name upon the children of Israel and I will bless them (6:27)." In this context, the *bracha* emanates directly from Him, "down" to us. The priests, then, would have no function at all.

Nechama Leibowitz suggests a third possibility. She tells us that God requires human collaboration in His work, "just as the ground is prepared for the farmer for rain (Leibowitz, Bamidbar p.65)." The *kohanim* prepare the people for God's blessing.

This may be why the Gaon of Vilna felt so strongly about saying *birkat kohanim* every day. As the priests prepare the people for God's blessing, the Gaon was getting ready for the End of Days. He was the farmer preparing the ground for rain.

The Redemption is not yet upon us, but the Gaon did achieve a partial, posthumous victory. Between 1808 and 1812, some 500 of his students and their families made aliyah to Israel. They brought the custom of the daily priestly blessing with them and instituted this practice in their congregations. In almost every Israeli synagogue, *birkat kohanim* is said during daily prayers. We are all the richer for it.

This Dvar Torah is dedicated to the kohanim in my family. They bring blessings into our lives.
