Parshat Emor



"When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not remove completely the corners of your field as you reap and you shall not gather the gleanings of your harvest; for the poor and the proselyte you shall leave them" (Leviticus 23:22). This sentence describes the *mitzvot* of *Pe'ah* and *Leket*.*

The sentence, seemingly simple, raises a few questions.

The *mitzvot* of *Pe'ah* and *Leket* were brought up just four chapters ago last week in Kedoshim, Chapter 19:9-10. Why are they repeated here?

Their placement here in chapter 23 seems unusual as the rest of the chapter talks about Shabbat and the Jewish holidays. The chapter begins with Shabbat, Passover, and Shavuot. Then we have this outlier of a sentence, after which the chapter continues to talk about Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur and Sukkot.

In addition, what are we to make of the verse's choice of words? Nowhere does it say we should "give" the poor part of our harvest, but rather just leave it for them. That doesn't sound very hospitable.

Rashi comments that the fact that these *mitzvot* appear twice shows their importance; if disregarded, the transgressor is accountable for two negative commands. He also says that it is inserted here where we talk about the holidays and their sacrifices to reflect that a person who fulfills this *mitzvah* of *Pe'ah* and *Leket* is on the same level as building the *Beit Hamikdash* and offering up sacrifices.

Let's also explore some other possibilities. The first time these *mitzvot* are mentioned in Chapter 19 they are right at home as a lead-in for how we treat our fellow man and our communal responsibility, such as not stealing, cheating, or taking revenge. Here they are bookended with the **personal** fulfillment of *mitzvot* having to do with the holidays. Perhaps they are inserted here to remind us that even if we are meticulous with our personal fulfillment of *mitzvot*, if we don't give equal weight to fulfilling *mitzvot bein adam le chavero*, between one human to another, it's like a one-handed clap; we are not fulfilling our Torah mission.

In addition, their juxtaposition right after Shavuot in the chapter aligns nicely with the story of Ruth who went collecting in Boaz's field, which we read on Shavuot.

The Torah is very careful in its selection of words to highlight key aspects of these *mitzvot*. First, YOU don't decide what to give them. It's not like you go through your field and say," OK, I'm going to give the poor some of this produce, a little bit of that produce. It's not my best produce but it's adequate. Hey, they're poor, anything should be better than what they've got." No, the Torah says, leave a corner of the same field that you are getting produce from for yourself. The same quality. Also, don't **give** it to the poor. Hashem gave you this produce. Hashem blessed you with the right climate, earth, rain, etc. This section of the field Hashem wants you to cordon off is not yours. It **belongs** to the poor. You can't give them something that's not yours. Let them come and take it on their terms. If they want to come in the nighttime to avoid embarrassment, that is their decision. It is theirs to take.

The Torah emphasizes the importance of giving *tzedakah*. But it also highlights that attitude and the respectful way we give *tzedakah* is important as well.

Today when people planting fields are a minority of our population, we still understand that each of us has communal responsibility of sharing what we have been blessed to receive with those less fortunate. Most obvious is the monetary mitzvah of *tzedakah*. But there are many other ways to extend this concept of sharing our blessings. I would like to suggest a few.

Share your Shabbat and Yom Tov table with those who might be eating alone, or who don't have a Shabbat or Yom Tov table. They don't expect gourmet meals or perfection. Most of the time it's not even the food that attracts them. It's being part of a community, knowing someone cares, experiencing the spirit of a Shabbat meal which they can't do on their own.

In addition, if you have been blessed from Hashem with a knowledge of Torah, share it! Let someone who knows less Torah than you, come to your field and glean from your knowledge. There are many programs set up that will let you do just that.

We ask Hashem to continue to bless us. Hashem might be asking of us, what have you done with my blessings?

I dedicate this Dvar Torah to my mother Rosalyn Gerber from whom I learned *hachnosat orchim*, taking in guests, *tzedakah*, and how to respect people regardless of their religious background, race or position in life. May 13 was her birthday.

I also dedicate it to all of those involved in the Bat Mitzvah Project, which is happening this Shabbat—those that gave of themselves to help others learn Torah, and those who grabbed the chance to learn Torah. May we all merit to grow in our Torah learning and increase our connection to the blessings of Hashem.

* Pe'ah: the 'corner' portion of the crop that must be left standing for the poor; Leket: 'gleanings' that fell from the reaper's hand or sickle while the grain is being gathered during the harvest.
