This weeks Parsha: Tzav

This Shabbat we read the *Parsha* of Tzav which continues the discussion of the *Korbanot*. This Shabbat is also called *Shabbat Hagadol*, "The Great Shabbat" which is always celebrated on the Shabbat before Pesach. Why is it called *Shabbat Hagadol*? Because when *Hashem* unleashed the plagues on the Egyptians, each time before the plague, Moshe gave the Egyptians a warning. Before the first plague of blood, Moshe warned the Egyptians "Let the Jewish people go or all the water in Egypt will turn into blood." Before the second plague of frogs, Moshe warned the Egyptians, "Let the Jewish people go or millions of frogs will swarm all over the land," and so on. Before the 10th and final plague, *Makat Bechorot*, the killing of the firstborn, Moshe gave the Egyptians a final warning, "On the midnight following the 14th of Nissan, all Egyptian firstborn males will be killed." The Egyptian firstborn men heard this and realized that Moshe was batting 1000% and they didn't want to die. The firstborn men went to Pharaoh and told him to let the Jewish people go. When Pharaoh stubbornly refused, the first-born Egyptians made their own army, rebelled and attacked him. Pharaoh had to send his main army to quell the rebellion. We mention this story every Shabbat in *Hodu LeHashem Ki Tov*, when we say *LeMakayh Mitzrayim Bevichorayhem*, "To Him Who smote Egypt through their firstborn."

This rebellion occurred on the 10th day of Nissan, which was a Shabbat, five days before the Jewish people left Egypt, which is why this Shabbat is called *Shabbat Hagadol*, "The Great Shabbat." But this begs another question: usually, we commemorate a date by the day of the month, not the day of the week, so why not celebrate every year on the 10th day in the month of Nissan? The answer is because Miriam died on the 10th of Nissan and we don't celebrate on a day when this holy person passed away. Therefore, we celebrate this miracle every year on the Shabbat before Pesach, *Shabbat Hagadol*.

After Shul, you can ask your children:

- 1. Why is the Shabbat before Pesach always called Shabbat Hagadol?
- 2. What did Moshe say to the Egyptian people before each plague?
- 3. Where in our Shabbat davening do we repeat the story of Shabbat Hagadol?
- 4. Other events are remembered by a date in the month, why is Shabbat Hagadol remembered by a week?

Parshat Tzav

This year marks 85 years since the Nazis came to power in Germany. Two months after their political rise, on Tuesday of the week of Parshat Tzav, my grandfather was arrested. The next day, the extended family left Germany and went to The Hague. That Saturday, when the whole town had been invited to my father's gala bar mitzvah, anyone who showed up for the event found nothing. The bar mitzvah boy and his family had vanished.

My father lained Parshat Tzav in a small shtiebel in The Hague. As a 13-year old boy he was not aware of the treachery and terror that shadowed every move of our family and every Jew in Europe but he always described the shul as "dark." During the next three years, the family traveled though Holland, France and England, barely staying ahead of the Nazi military advance, until they were able to find their way to this good and blessed land. During the 14 years after he landed here, my father became a rabbi, an accountant, a businessman and a husband.

When he met my mother, she had no Jewish education or background in religious observance; she was a baalat teshuva before there were any. She loved the Jewish life she adopted and she had a wise and honest view of it. She disliked only one thing that I remember — she hated the idea that after her passing, people would drink a Le'Chaim on the anniversary of the day she died. She told me and my sisters, "if you have to make a kiddush relating to my memory, don't do it on my yahrzeit, do it on my birthday." Her birthday in 2018 would have fallen this coming Wednesday.

Parshat Tzav that my father read is about sacrifices. As my father read the parsha on this Shabbat 85 years ago, the sacrifices that the Jews of Europe were to make were not yet known. During that week of Parshat Tzav, my family's life pivoted; the escape they made days before he read the parsha saved my life and the lives of many others before those lives even began. The fear and on-the-run life they endured to bring us here handed me, my siblings and cousins a life of security and opportunity. On my parents' tombstone, we wrote words from this week's parsha, "Torah achat lahem," one Torah for them. It refers to one law applying to multiple sacrifices but to us it spoke about my parents. They were one couple, creating one family, living one life together, with one Torah for them both.

Now Gloria and I have become grandparents. Our granddaughter, Isabella Ava Kestenbaum, is named for my mother, Gloria's father and our mechutan's father. As Parshat Tzav comes around again, it's hard not to think about what the people who came before us had to undergo for this to be possible. Today Gloria and I are commemorating past lives honestly lived, my mother's birthday, a new life begun, two people grateful for what has flowered from the sacrifices of others before them, and Parshat Tzav that connects it all.
