Parsha Theme - Rising to the Occasion, Written by Ariella Lazaros

When Bnei Yisrael left Egypt, the trip to Eretz Yisrael should have taken days. How did they end up wandering in the desert for forty years? The answer is found in this week's Parshat *Sh'lach*. Moshe sent representatives from each of the twelve tribes into Israel to scout out the land. When the scouts returned, they came back with conflicting stories. Yehoshua and Caleb gave positive reports of lush fruits and ease of entry, but the other ten representatives terrified *Bnei Yisrael* with stories of terrifying giants who inhabited enormous fortresses. The people panicked and re-evaluated their faith, asking Moshe why he brought them to the desert to be wiped out by giants. For their lack of faith in Hashem, *Beni Yisrael* consequently wandered the desert for forty years. Had the scouts encouraged *Bnei Yisrael* and reinforced their emunah (faith), they would have easily entered straight to Israel.

What can we learn from this story? The twelve scouts who went to Israel were men of great influence and leaders in their tribes. Sometimes in life, we are in a position of influence presented with the chance to lead through example. We should take every opportunity to rise to the occasion and exceed the expectations.

After Shul ask your children:

Where did Moshe send the twelve scouts? What happened when they returned? Why were *Bnei Yisrael* made to wander for forty years? Which scouts had a positive report?

Challah and The Spies

Challah is such a serious mitzvah that the Talmud says that it's one of the "sins" for which women die in childbirth if they neglect it. The gravity of the commandment teaches us that challah is not a flaky mitzvah.

The mitzvah of taking challah appears in Parshat Shelach Lecha immediately following the episode of the spies. I believe that this juxtaposition teaches us something significant.

The 15th century Spanish commentator, Seforno, believes that God gives us the mitzvah of challah after the spies because it is a mitzvah that needs to be performed while the Israelites are in the Promised Land. In other words, after the Children of Israel are told that they will not enter the Land of Israel, God reassures them that their children, the next generation, will. When their children enter the Promised Land, there will be special mitzvot to be performed there. Challah symbolizes the hope of continuation for our ancestors and for us today, by association.

The blessing over the bread also unlocks its ritual importance within our tradition. Based on Psalm 104:14, this blessing praises God as the one "who brings forth bread from the earth" hamotzi lechem min ha'aretz. If you consider the blessing, Hamotzi Lechem MinHa'Aretz, for a moment, it does not make sense. God does not bread come from the ground. God gives us wheat, and we make the bread from the wheat! The blessing bespeaks the partnership between God and humanity.

I would like to offer an alternative understanding of this well known bracha that further explains the connection between the challah we enjoy on Shabbat and the episode of the spies.

Hebrew is a rich language because words share roots. Lechem – bread - can also be read as lochem – fighter. If we read the bracha using the latter – "Hamotzi Lochem," then it would be "God removes the rebel from the land." In other words, bread in general and challah in particular subtly remind us at every sitting of what's at stake. If we rebel like our ancestors did against God, God has the ability to bring us out of the Land.

In rabbinic literature, the Shabbat table is compared to the altar in the Beit Hamikdash. In light of this, we might expect that the challah on our Shabbat table would be comparable to the showbreads that were in the Temple. How many loaves of showbreads were there? Twelve. Yet we have two challot on Shabbat.

I submit to you today that the 2 loaves that are on our table every Shabbat subtly remind us of the episode of the 12 spies, and especially the two brave ones who saw what God wanted them to see and spoke up to the rest of the people.

Adelle Davis, the mid-20th century pioneer in nutrition, said "We are indeed much more than what we eat, but what we eat can nevertheless help us to be much more than what we are."

By associating challah with the spies, we are inspired to be more than we are. Even a kazayit, a small portion, of bread and challah not only signifies a meal, but also underscores God's aspirations for us, the partnership we can share in repairing the world, and the countless opportunities for creating community by breaking bread together. This is certainly a recipe for a delicious future for us and our children.
