Parshat Vayera Dvar Torah

This week's Parshat Vaerah teaches us two important and very practical mitzvot, Bikur Cholim, visiting the sick, and Hachnasat Orchim, inviting guests into our home. The Parsha begins when three angels visit Avraham after his surgery. The angel Michael was there to bless Sarah with a baby, the angel Gavriel was there to destroy Sedom, and the angel Rafael, was there first to help heal Avraham and then go on to save Lot from Sedom.

When the Malachim or angels came close, Avraham says "Adonei...Al Nuh Ta'avor Mei'al Avdecha," "my master, please do not pass by your servant." Rashi says there are two interpretations of Avraham's words. The first is literal, that Avraham was addressing the leader of the three angels, saying please don't pass by without coming in for me to host you and do the mitzvah of Hachnasat Orchim. Rashi says another meaning was that Avraham was in the middle of speaking to the Shechina of Hashem and Avraham paused this conversation, saying to Hashem, wait there are three guests here, I have the mitzvah of Hachnasat Orchim. From the second interpretation we can learn that the mitzvah of Hachnasat Orchim is more important than being together with the Shechina of Hashem.

After Shul Ask Your Children:

What were the names of the three angels?

What was the purpose of each angel?

How did Avraham demonstrate Hachnasat Orchim? Who was Avraham's nephew and where was he?

The Akeidah Faith and Trust

A central motif of Judaism and certainly in the liturgy of Rosh Hashanah is the binding of Isaac, which according to tradition took place on the New Year.

The successful passing of this almost superhuman ordeal by Abraham resulted in God's promise of the everlasting survival of the Jewish people, and to which event we refer when we entreat the Almighty in times of our own tribulations.

Abraham at the time of the Akeidah was 137 years old, and had gone through many tests to prove to God and the world around him that he was a most devoted and loyal servant to the Almighty. I would like to pose the following question: why was it necessary for Hashem to put his most faithful servant through such an unbelievably trying test? Was there something in Abraham that was lacking which required him to go through this ordeal in order to perfect his virtually flawless character traits? The statement by the angel of Hashem after he calls to Abraham to desist from completing his son's sacrifice, hints of a previous deficiency. "...for now I **know** (*Yadati*) that you are a God-fearing man" (22:12). Did God not know that Abraham feared and revered Him after being thrown into a burning furnace by King Nimrod and going through all the other trials?

Let us attempt to answer the questions posed about the purpose of the Akeidah by going back to last week's parsha, Lech Lecha chapter 15. Abraham tells God that he is despairing because he is childless. He is immediately taken outdoors and shown the heavens and is told that his offspring will be as numerous as the stars. The narrative then continues and says: "And he had faith in Hashem and attributed to him righteousness." (15:6). Hashem proceeds to tell Abraham that He will give him the Land of Canaan as an inheritance. To which Abraham responds with the fateful words: "How will I **know** (*Ba'meh aida*) that I will inherit it?" (15:8). What? Abraham the supreme man of faith dares to question the Almighty's promise!

The commentators struggle with this question and are divided into two camps. The first camp defends Abraham and says that he didn't doubt Hashem's word but wanted to know by what merits his descendants would receive the inheritance. Or he feared that they would sin and would lose this legacy.

But there is a second camp that roundly condemns Abraham for questioning the Lord's promise. "How will I **know**..", is answered almost immediately (15:13) by "You will assuredly **know** (**Yodoa Tayda**) that your offspring will be strangers in a strange land and will be enslaved and oppressed for 400 years." The Talmud in Nedarim 32A says that Abraham was punished for making light of Hashem's promise by his descendants going into the Egyptian exile and slavery.

I would like to offer an alternative perspective. Abraham was the consummate man of faith. *Emunah* permeated his soul. But with those fateful words, "How will I **know** (*aida*) that I will inherit it?" he displayed a lack of trust in Divine Providence, in *Bitachon*. When Hashem heard those words, he said to himself; "this wonderful man whom I have chosen to be the father of my Chosen People, needs one more test, but only after he comes to develop the *Bitachon*, the trust that he needs in Me, as well as in his own offspring who he fears will sin and cause their own disinheritance." Sixty-two years go by, and *Bitachon* is now as much part of our Father Abraham as is his *Emunah* in Hashem. The long three day journey to the Akeidah with Isaac moves along without hesitation. Abraham has total trust in God that the final outcome will be for the good. As he lifts the razor sharp knife to his beloved son's outstretched neck he never loses that trust and, of course, he is stopped at the last moment by the angel's words.

The connecting strand to this interpretation manifests itself in the verb "la'daat" to **know**. Abraham questions the Almighty "Bameh Aydah", which results in the foretelling of the Egyptian exile, "Yodoa Tayda", and he is finally absolved after the Akeidah when the angel proclaims, "Ata Yadati", "...for now I **know** (Yadati) that you are a God-fearing man." The Akeida was a manifestation of the principle of Mida K'neged Mida, a measure for measure. There were three parties who were able to demonstrate an important characteristic at the Akeidah: Abraham, who needed to develop Bitachon, trust in the Holy One, demonstrated it to an unparalleled degree. Isaac, representing Abraham's descendants who he earlier doubted would merit the inheritance of the land, was shown to be worthy of his father's trust as well as demonstrating his own trust in the Almighty, when he unflinchingly offered himself in sacrifice. And finally, Hashem Himself whose seal is Emet, Truth, and who had previously promised Abraham that only through Isaac would He fulfill His covenant, came through and fulfilled that promise.

A ram whose horns were caught in the thicket near this holy place was offered up in sacrifice in lieu of Isaac. The Midrash tells us of the destiny of its two horns. The left one became the shofar that was sounded on Mount Sinai. The right, one even greater than the left, is to be sounded at the ingathering of the exiles in Messianic times. May that come speedily and in our days.
