## UPCOMING EVENTS

### **Thursday, July 9: From Ethiopia to Israel: Our Journey, My Story 5:00 pm**

The rescue of Ethiopian Jews after 2000 years of separation from the Jewish people is one of Israel's most proud achievements. We will hear from Zehava Tesfay, Director of the Jewish Agency Schlichut Initiative. Zehava was born and raised in Israel to a family of Ethiopian immigrants. She will tell her personal story, including how her family made aliya from Ethiopia and made a life in Israel. She will also provide insights into the Ethiopian Jewish community before they made aliya and how they are now interwoven in the Israeli mosaic.

### **Sunday, July 12: The Temple Menorah: From the Wilderness to the State of Israel: 12:00pm *Live from Israel!***

The seven-branched Temple Menorah is the most enduring and iconic Jewish symbol. It has been a source of fascination and illumination for Jews and others for over three millennia. The menorah has travelled through history accompanying the Jewish people as a symbol, not only as a liturgical object, but as a work of art and spoil of war. It is like a mirror that reflects the history of the Jewish people, their aspirations, their spirituality and even at times their agendas. In this webinar we will explore what we know about the appearance of its base and branches. The talk will be accompanied by numerous slides and will review the Biblical sources, the menorah from the Mishkan, through two Temples, the Arch of Titus and the emblem of the modern State of Israel. The speaker, Adele Wasser, is a docent at the Israel Museum. She and her family made aliyah years ago and reside in Katamon.

**Dvar Torah:**

In this week's double Parshiot Chukat-Balak, we jump ahead 38 years in Jewish history to the very end of Bnei Yisrael's time wandering the desert. When the people arrived in the desert city of Zin, Miriam passed away and the "Bear Miriam" The Water Well that miraculously followed her for 38 years prior, now disappeared.

The Jewish people complained to Moshe that they were thirsty and Hashem told Moshe that in order to get water, he had to talk to a rock and ask it to please produce water. In frustration, Moshe famously hit the rock with his staff instead of speaking to it, and water gushed out. Moshe was punished for not following Hashem's precise instructions, and was not allowed to enter the Land of Israel.

Another sad thing happened at the end of the parsha. Aharon, the Kohen Gadol, passed away and Bnei Yisrael mourned for 30 days. Prior to his passing, on the mountain of Har Hor, Moshe presented the special Kohen Gadol pieces from Aharon to Eliezer, Aharon's son, who now held the prestigious leadership position of high priest.

**Kids in the Kitchen: Muddy Buddies:**

**List of Ingredients:**

9 cups Chex™  
1 cup semisweet chocolate chips  
1/2 cup peanut butter\*  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar  
*\*Peanut free substitutions: nutella, almond butter, sun butter, techina, cashew butter, etc.*

**Instructions:**

1. Into a large bowl, measure cereal; set aside.
2. In a 1-quart microwavable bowl, microwave chocolate chips, peanut butter and butter uncovered on High 1 minute; stir. Microwave about 30 seconds longer or until mixture can be stirred smooth. Stir in vanilla. Pour mixture over cereal, stirring until evenly coated. Pour into a 2-gallon resealable food-storage plastic bag.
3. Add powdered sugar. Seal bag; shake until well coated. Spread on waxed paper to cool. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator.
