YOUTH AND MAGEN AVRAHAM TEEN DEPARTMENT

Dvar Torah:

This week we begin the book of Shemot, which starts by stating that Yosef and the older generations died out and a new Egyptian king arose, one who did not know Yosef—meaning the new king did not acknowledge the wonderful things that Yosef had done. Pharaoh enslaved the Jewish people and told the midwives that any Jewish baby boy born must be killed. The midwives, Yocheved and Miriam, did not listen. Yocheved and her husband Amram had a baby boy, Moshe, whom they hid for three months. When they could no longer hide him, Yocheved put baby Moshe in a basket on the Nile River and Moshe's sister Miriam watched him. Pharaoh's daughter went to the Nile and found the baby, but Moshe refused to nurse so Miriam suggested a Jewish woman as nursemaid, and brought Yocheved, Moshe's own mother. Moshe grew up in the palace.

One day, Moshe saw an Egyptian beating a Jew and killed the Egyptian. The next day, he saw two Jewish people fighting, and when he tried to stop them, they told him that they'd seen what he did the day before and had informed against him to Pharaoh. Rashi says these two people were Datan and Aviram. Moshe ran away to Midian where he met the daughters of Yitro, and married Tzipporah, the eldest, with whom he had two children.

When Moshe was herding sheep, he came upon a bush on fire that was not being consumed. A holy voice told Moshe to take off his shoes; Hashem revealed Himself and told Moshe to save the Jewish people. Hashem gave Moshe three signs: He turned Moshe's staff into a snake and back again; He afflicted Moshe with tzaraat and healed it; and said that He would turn the waters of the Nile into blood. Moshe protested that he was tongue-tied, but Hashem told Moshe that He provides the power to speak. When Moshe arrived, Pharaoh reacted by telling the people they would now have to work twice as hard, making the same quota of bricks but without any straw. When the Jewish people complained, Moshe turned to Hashem. The Parsha ends with Hashem telling Moshe that Pharaoh will be forced to free the Jews.

- Who did Miriam bring to nurse baby Moshe?
- 2. How many years older were Miriam and Aaron than Moshe?
- 3. According to Rashi, who were the two Jews who were fighting?
- 4. Who was Yitro's oldst daughter and whom did she marry?
- 5. In which country did Moshe find his wife?
- How did Hashem reveal himself to Moshe?

Parshat Shemot/Shabbat Mevarchim

Understanding the Mystery at the Inn

[In the following exegesis, we discover a direct connection between the Torah, Shemot (Exodus 2), and the book of Shoftim (Judges 17), that helps us explain a most difficult story in the Torah that has confounded many throughout the ages.]

One of the most mysterious and intriguing incidents in the Bible occurs in this week's sidrah. Moshe, after reluctantly accepting the task of leading Bnei Yisrael out of their Egyptian bondage, leaves Midian with his wife and two sons. Hashem instructs him on how to address Pharaoh:

"ואמרת אל פרעה, כה אמר ה בני בכרי ישראל. ואמר אליך שלח את בני ויעבדני ותמאן לשלחו הנה אנכי הרג את בנך בכרך" (ד: כב-כג)

"And you shall say to Pharaoh, so said Hashem, my firstborn son is Israel. So I say to you, send My son that he may serve Me – but you refused to send him out; behold, I shall kill your firstborn son." (4:22-23) (Please note that the first sentence is in second person speaking to third person. The second sentence is in first person addressing second person.) Immediately after this interchange, we read the following:

ויהי בדרך במלון ויפגשהו ה ויבקש המיתו. ותקח צפרה צר ותכרת את ערלת בנה"" (ד: ותגע לרגליו ותאמר כי חתן דמים אתה לי. וירף ממנו אז אמרה חתן דמים למולת." (ד: בד-בו)

"It was on the way, in the lodging, that Hashem encountered him and sought to kill him. So Zipporah took a sharp stone and cut off the foreskin of her son and touched it to his feet; and she said, 'A bridegroom of blood you are to me.' So He withdrew from him. Then she said, 'A bridegroom of blood in regard to circumcision." (4:24-26)

There are several questions that spring out at us:

- 1. What is the connection, if any, between the incident at the inn and the preceding verses of Hashem's instructions to Moshe?
- 2. Who does Hashem want to kill?
- 3. Why does Zipporah perform the circumcision instead of Moshe, since the father has the primary obligation to circumcise his son?
- 4. In the two sentences recounting Hashem's instructions to Moshe on what to say to Pharaoh, why is there an unusual grammatical shift of the subject, from second person speaking to a third person to first person addressing a second person?

To answer these questions, let us fast-forward some years to the Book of Judges, chapters 17 and 18, to the story of the eponymous Micah's Idol. Micah, who lived in the mountain of Ephraim in the period soon after Joshua's death, had a sanctuary dedicated to idolatry which was centered on a graven image. A young Levite from Bethlehem comes to Micah looking for a place to live. Micah asks him to become the priest for his sanctuary and offers to support him. The anonymous Levite accepts the offer.

" (שופטים יז:יא)"...." (שופטים יז:יא) And the Levite vowed to dwell" with the man" (17:11).

This exact phrase is found in Tanach only one other time, (with a different subject), and we will soon come to it. But it is important to remember that the vow concerned avodah zarah, idolatrous worship. Subsequently, some men from the tribe of Dan come to Micah's house, take the idol, and make an offer to the Levite that he cannot refuse. Instead of being a priest in the house of one man, the Levite would be a priest to the same idol, but he would minister to the whole tribe of Dan. We finally learn the identity of this priest:

ויהונתן בן גרשם בן מנשה הוא ובניו היו כהנים לשבט הדני עד יום גלות הארץ"" הח:ל). (יח:ל). "And Jonathan the son of Gershom the son of Menashe, (the nun in Menashe is raised to indicate the real name is Moshe) both he and his sons were the priests to the tribe of Danites until the day of the exile of the land." (18:30)

We see that Moshe's grandson became a priest to idolatry. Let us return now to today's sidrah. Moshe escapes from Egypt to Midian after killing an Egyptian. He comes to Yisro's house and asks for permission to marry his daughter. We now have the same phrase we had earlier in the Micha story, the only other time it occurs in Tanach. (Is it coincidental that this phrase only occurs with Moshe and his grandson as the subjects?) ייתן את צפרה בתו למשה" (ב:בא) "ויואל משה לשבת את האיש "And Moshe vowed to dwell with the man, and he gave his daughter Zipporah to Moshe." (2:21)

We know the nature of the vow that the Levite gave to Micah. What vow did Moshe give to Yisro? There is an amazing Mechilta in the sidrah of Yisro (פרשה א, ואת שני בניה) that tells us the following. When Moshe asked Yisro for permission to marry his daughter, Yisro agreed but with one condition. Moshe had to vow that his firstborn, his bechor, would be dedicated to , חיואל משה". "And Moshe vowed...." (The Mechilta may have come to this radical conclusion because of the unique phrase.) In the very next verse, Moshe's first child is born and he gives him the name of "Gershom." And it seems that the name appears to explain the vow he made:

" גר הייתי בארץ נבריה" l have been a stranger in a foreign (Gentile) land." Now we can begin to answer the questions with which we began by reexamining the verses in question.

"And you (Moshe) shall say to Pharaoh, so said Hashem, My firstborn is Israel."

We now reinterpret the next verse.

"So I (Hashem) say to you (Moshe), send out My son that he may serve Me, but you have refused to send him out; behold I shall kill your firstborn (Gershom)."

There immediately follows the story in the inn and Hashem's intending to kill "him" (Gershom) and Zipporah's circumcision of her son. Moshe cannot be the leader to take the Bnei Yisrael out of Egypt from the depths of impurity, while his son is uncircumcised and dedicated to idolatry. These verses logically follow each other and are connected. Zipporah had to perform the circumcision because Moshe was constrained by his vow to Yisro. And the cryptic phrase ;"יותאמר בי חתן דמים אתה לי "And she said, 'a bridegroom of blood you are to me'" can be explained. You, Moshe, became my bridegroom by "Damim" which also means money or payment, the payment of the vow regarding their firstborn, whose blood had almost been shed. But the blood of his circumcision that I now performed saved his life. "אז אמרה חתן דמים למולת". "Then she said, 'A bridegroom of blood in regard to circumcision.""

Unfortunately for Moshe, however, the die had been cast, and his grandson Jonathan fulfilled the vow. Perhaps if Moshe had not made that fateful vow, the , הובהונה priesthood, would have gone to his descendants instead of to Aaron and his descendants. But his own children are hardly ever mentioned in the Torah.

Postscript: We have seen the relationship between Micah and Jonathan, Moshe's grandson. But could there have been a connection between Moshe and Micah the idolater directly?

There is a fascinating midrash that tells the following story. When the enslaved Israelites did not fulfill the quota of making bricks, the Egyptians immured the Hebrew babies in place of the missing bricks. When Moshe complained to Hashem, He answered him by saying that the Egyptians were merely ridding the nation of thorns, i.e. of future sinners. Moshe tested G-d's word by removing one of the babies out of the wall. That child grew up to be the idolater Micah who turned Moshe's grandson towards Avodah Zarah. (Rashi,Sanhedrin 101B and Tanchuma Ki Sissa 19).
