DVAR TORAH

Parshat Vaera/Shabbat Mevarchim January 24-25

Redemption

Our sidrah begins with God's assurance that he will take the Israelites out of Egypt, in an event commonly known as the Exodus. But is the sole purpose of the verses before us simply to describe what happened back then? True, we are no longer slaves in Egypt, but might we ourselves or others whom we care about be "enslaved" to a bad habit, an overly stressful work situation, or an unhappy personal relationship? Or might our community and even our nation be imperiled?

The Passover Haggadah states that had God not taken our ancestors out of Egypt, we would still be enslaved there along with our children and our children's children. Reason dictates against taking this statement literally. We could chalk it up to hyperbole, but perhaps, what the authors had in mind is that we view the Exodus story not merely as a singular event in history but as a paradigm for dealing with affliction as it enters our lives.

Our text offers advice about redemption. Is it our job to save the world? The text states (6:6) that God came to save the Jewish people because of the promise He had made to their ancestors. No, we cannot save the world, but, following in God's footsteps, we do have the responsibility to help those close to us when misfortune strikes.

Can anyone become a redeemer? We know that when God turned to Moses to lead the Jewish people out of Egypt, Moses demurred, claiming that a speech impediment rendered him unfit (v. 12). Exegetes disagree over whether his challenge was physical or that he lacked self-esteem.* God gave him encouragement by standing by him and also by designating Aaron as his associate (v. 14). The takeaway might be that when we find ourselves or someone else in trouble, to strive to rise to the occasion and join forces with others as needed.

ve-ga'alti, ve-lakachti (and ve-heiveiti) (vs. 6-8). Although different translations nuance them differently, God's plan entailed ending the slavery; ending Egypt's rule over the Israelites; showing His strength, perhaps an allusion to crushing the Egyptians at the Red Sea so that the Jews would no longer live in fear of their vengeance; taking the Jews to

Is there a particular process to follow? Our text describes God as taking

four actions with the promise of a fifth, which have come to be known as the four (or five) expressions of redemption: ve-hotzeiti, ve-hitzalti,

promise to bring them to the land of Israel. In general terms, the process required ending the abuse in conjunction with destroying the power of the abuser and removing the victim from the negative environment, demonstrating the power of the savior, creating a strong

bond between the victim and the savior, introducing the victim to more

Him as a nation, presumably by giving them the Torah; and fulfilling his

beneficial behaviors, and relocating the victim to a more hospitable setting. Back to the Bible, as prolonged negotiations did not lead the abuser to back down, God employed increasingly strong "sanctions," including warfare as a last resort. Are there not lessons to ponder in all

this about handling personal, communal, and national distress?

In biblical times, God's actions were overt as He was nation-building and establishing Himself as the savior of the Jewish people. In our day, when God rarely makes the headlines, our redemption lies not only in relying on our leaders and on ourselves but in garnering strength from our relationship with Him to help us remain optimistic and confident as we face our challenges.

Dvar Torah:

At the start of this week's Parsha we find ourselves back in Egypt, ready to learn the Pesach story. HaShem tells Moshe and Aharon to repeatedly go to Pharaoh and demand he let the Jewish people go free. Aharon first demonstrates HaShem's power to the Egyptians by turning his staff into a snake. Aharon's snake then eats the staffs of the other Egyptian sorcerers.

As the story and miracles progress, HaShem brings the first seven (of ten total) plagues on Pharaoh and Egypt. He turns the water to blood, covers the land with frogs, infests the people first with lice, and then with wild animals, kills all the farm animals and livestock, sends painful boils, and rains a fiery, icy hail down all over Egypt. Still, the stubborn Pharaoh refuses to let the Jewish people go.


