

## **Dvar Torah:**

In this week's parsha, Hashem told Avraham that He intended to destroy the city of Sedom because of how evil the people were. Avraham tried to negotiate with Hashem and eventually they came to a compromise; if Avraham could find just ten good people in the city, Hashem would save it.

Two angels entered the city of Sodom and headed to the home of Lot, Avraham's nephew. What they found there was hospitality similar to that of Avraham himself; Lot welcomed the angels into his home with open arms. But when his neighbors in Sodom realized that Lot was acting kindly towards visiting strangers, a mob formed outside his home. The angels then told Lot who they really were and encouraged him to take his family and leave. Lot failed to convince his entire family to leave, and only his wife and two daughters joined him. The angels warned them not to look back, but Lot's wife did not listen and she immediately turned into a pillar of salt.

## **DVAR TORAH**

Parshat Vayera November 15-16 By: David Levy

# Hashgachah Pratit (Divine Providence) vs. Bechirah (Free Will)

The Akeidat Yitzchak in this weeks parsha, also layned in the synagogue on Rosh Hashanah, and a source of inspiration in Jewish art, raises ethical and halakhic questions about Hashem's hashgachah pratit (providence), omniscient foreknowledge (yediyah), and human free will (bechira). A key pasuk for addressing this question is: "For now I know that you fear G-d."

Constellations of commentaries configure within the spectrum of the providence argument and strong free will argument. There is a divine, enigmatic, almost Kafkaesque paradox, containing deep esoteric mysteries as expressed by Rabbi Akiva in Pirkei Avot, "Everything is foreseen but freedom of will is given." Yes, G-d observes everything, as Rabbi Yehudah HaNasi notes: "Know that a seeing eye and hearing ear are above," but there can be no accountability or responsibility if we do not believe that human beings have true freedom of choice, as argued by philosophers Rabbi Yosef Albo in Sefer Ha-Ikkarim and Gersonides in Sefer Milchamot HaShem. Only in rare cases does Hashem withdraw His free will, as He did in hardening Pharaoh's heart. On the Yamim Noraim, we note that Jews can change their "fate" (goral) via teshuvah, tefillah and tzedakah. This is contrary to the Dead Sea Scroll sect that believed in absolute divine providence.

Hasdai Crescas suggests that G-d already knew how Avraham would react. Thus, the test was to raise Avraham's fear in God from potential to actual love thereby perfecting it, a similar interpretation to that of Ramban. R. Isaac Arama maintains that G-d tested Avraham for the sake of instructing the patriarch (not G-d). The Degel Yehuda thinks that the test was to educate mankind regarding zekhut avot (the merit of the ancestors).

Since G-d is perfect, self-sufficient, not finite, and omniscient (not ignorant), G-d did not learn anything new from Akeidat Yitzchak. Rather, He made others know that there was one person of complete emunah, Avraham, who was willing to go to the limits for the love of G-d, even so far as to give up the one hope he had always longed foroffspring to carry on his legacy of ethical monotheism. Rambam, in the Moreh Nevukhim, points out that not only did Avraham demonstrate perfect love and fear of Hashem, but was brought to a noetic limit (gevul). In Hasidic parlance, Avraham enacted bitul hayesh or total ego annihilation in order to be one (unio mystica) with Hashem's will (ratzon).

It is at the mind's limits of reason that more mystically inclined commentators enigmatically draw on angelology the study of angels to explain the Akedat Yitzchak. Sforno comments, "Now I know. I, the angel, now know God is justified in considering you greater than His angels, as our Sages say, 'The righteous are greater than the ministering angels (Sanh. 93a). The almighty had prior knowledge of your potential as a God-fearing man, but an angel's actual knowledge can only be drawn from what is actual, not contingent." Rabbi Moshe Alshich of Safed identified the angel that averted the disaster as Michael, who is associated with mercy and water. Thus, it was Michael who proclaimed, "Do not throw your hand upon the lad" (i.e. harm him). Perplexingly, Shalom Spiegel in his book, The Last Trial, cites Efraim of Bonn, who maintained that Yitzchak was sacrificed and then his ashes were resurrected with the dews of resurrection brought to heaven, a model for some Shoah theologies.

The Ladino commentary, Me'am Loez, also evokes angelology by noting, "The angel (Michael) replied 'Do not do anything to him.' The entire reason for this was to test you, to allow you to demonstrate your faith and love. But now I know that you fear and love God. With this, I will shut the mouths of those who denounce you." Rambam explains that lyov's (Job's) test was also allowed in order to shut the mouth of Satan, and to bring Iyov, from a level of virah (fear) to ahavah (love) of Hashem. Ray Saadia Gaon, however, argued that Iyov was tested for being silent in Pharaoh's court when the Hebrew boys were legislated to be drowned.

Rav Kook, a religious Zionist, continues the mystical thread from the "lights of return" through the trope of light, by writing in an epistle, "When the divine light had to shine forth in its purity, it was revealed in the fierceness of its brightness in the trial of Avraham which showed the passion to build a house for Hashem (the Beit HaMikdash) for Him to dwell in, and to offer *korbanot* instead. That is why <u>Rashi</u> is very precise and sensitive in noting that the Hebrew language employs the term "bring him up" and not "sacrifice Yitzchak" (but rather the ram). How wonderful is the ascension of our prayer to remember the merit of the first avot who fought against emotional barbarity in the struggle towards the Divine. The impression of pure divinity was too lofty and refined to be the feeding ground for the multitude of nations. Came the father of the multitude of nations and showed the way. However low humanity would sink, through idolatry and human sacrifice, there was always room for the penetration of the pure light. The sacrifice of Isaac is recalled in mercy for the merit (zekhut) of all generations.

May the light of Hashem `rebound back' to the future, so the light (207) of Shabbat (702) is manifest 24/7 biyamei hamashiach, chadeish yameinu kikedem.
