DVAR TORAH PARSHAT Ki Tisa

The ideas in this Dvar Torah are derived from Rabbi Norman Lamm's book, *Derashot Ledorot (A Commentary for the Ages)*, edited by my nephew Stuart W. Halpern. This particular drashah was given by Rabbi Lamm on February 28, 1959, and is still timely.

We read in this week's *parashah* that the people of Israel became restive when Moshe did not come down from the mountain with the tablets in a timely manner. They then asked Aaron to create gods for them. Aaron formed a golden calf from the jewelry donated by the people. The Israelites then offered burnt offerings to this idol and worshiped it. G-d observed that the people He redeemed from Egypt had strayed from the path and condemned them by calling them *am keshei oref*. "I have seen the people, and behold, it is a stiff-necked people" (Shemot 32:9).

Does this mean that stubbornness is more deserving of anger than idolatry? G-d did not complain directly about the idol worship; he complained about the people's intransigence. Ignorance and a closed mind are characteristics of obstinacy. In this case the Israelites' sin was due more to bad character than to lack of belief in G-d.

A person who is stubborn has a rigid will and a closed mind. If the Jewish nation is stubborn, it will persist in sinning and will not follow G-d's Torah. But the *parashah* does not give such a clear-cut conclusion about the Israelites' sin because subsequently Moshe asked G-d to forgive the Jewish people and said, "If I have found favor in your eyes, let my Lord go among us, for it is a stiff-necked people and You should forgive our iniquity and error, and make us Your heritage" (Shemot 34:9). In this case, Moshe presented the people's stubbornness as a virtue as well as a vice.

To stubbornly serve G-d is a good thing. Later in the Chumash, in the story of the spies, Calev, despite seeing the strength of the people living in the land of Canaan, stubbornly insisted that the Israelites would prevail in capturing the land. The same characteristic that causes us to be insensitive to G-d also makes us a powerful people when we are devoted to G-d.

This is also illustrated in this week's *haftarah*, which is from Sefer

Melachim Alef. The prophet Elijah challenged the people to choose between Baal, a Canaanite idol, and G-d. Elijah was fed up with the Israelites worshipping G-d and also worshipping Baal. "How long will you dance between two opinions?" If Hashem is the G-d, go after him!" (Kings 1 18:21). Elijah condemned the tentative and irresolute beliefs of the people of Israel and urged them to be stubborn in worshipping G-d alone.

This teaching is as important today as it was in 1959 when Rabbi Lamm spoke about it. We have many of the same problems we had then, such as assimilation and a struggle with moral and ethical behavior. On the positive side of stubbornness, we are a strong willed, well-organized community that takes care of our own. Starting in the 1970s, many Jews were dogged in supporting the Jews behind the iron Curtain. Over time, our hard work paid off, and in subsequent years, a massive number of Jews left the Soviet Union to live freely in Israel and America. An example of this devotion is the work of "our own" Glenn Richter and others in the struggle for Soviet Jewry.

Since October 7th, Jews in Israel and abroad have been steadfast in their support of the State of Israel. This support has been manifested in the raising of a great deal of money and many acts of volunteerism and *other forms of chesed to help Israel in a tragic and difficult war*.

If we want to be authentic heirs of the Jewish tradition, we sometimes need to have "stiff-necks." Then we will be worthy of Moshe's prayer that G-d will go amongst us because we have the characteristic of being stubborn.
