preferred leadership style?

The crisis described in Parashat Miketz—as is strangely often the case in Genesis in the land flowing with milk and honey—is famine. Having already been to Egypt once to buy food and been accused there of spying, the brothers knew they could return a second time only if they brought Benjamin, thereby proving they were members of a simple family just trying to survive and not a cabal intent on gathering intelligence and overthrowing Egypt's Pharaoh. Jacob would not agree to this at first, but they needed to eat. Initially, Reuben tries try to convince Jacob to send Benjamin, and he says (Genesis 42:37): "You may slay my two sons (et shnei banai tamit) if I fail to bring him back to you. Put him in my care (tnah oto al yadi) and I will return him to you." What to make of this? As Shai Held (in The Heart of Torah) sees it, this is an impetuous and unthinking leadership style. After all, are not Reuben's sons also Jacob's (grand) children? The approach of Reuben also reminds us of Lot's offer of his two daughters to the people of Sodom to demonstrate his commitment to his guests, something which seems morally off to us there and here, and fittingly, in our parasha, Jacob ignores Reuben's offer. He responds not to Reuben but to the brothers collectively and says (42:38): "My son shall not go down with you (lo yeireid bni emachem)." Jacob fears that he will lose Benjamin as he lost Joseph and be aggrieved to death. A few verses later the family again discusses the crisis as they are still running out of food. This time Judah steps up and says (43:8-9): "Send the lad with me, and let us arise and go, so we will live and not die, we as well as you and our children. I will personally guarantee it (anochi e'erveinu)....and if I do not bring him back to you and stand him before you, then I will have sinned against

As told previously (in Parashat Ve'yeshev), Joseph was looking for his brothers in the fields. As they saw him approach, the brothers discuss how fed up they were with Joesph's favored status and dreams and consider killing him. Reuben speaks up (37:21-22): "Let us not take his life (lo nakenu nefesh)" and then adds: "Shed no Blood. Cast him into this pit in the wilderness, but do not touch him yourselves (v'yad al tishlichu vo)." The narrator tells us Reuben intends to come back and save Joseph later, but two things are interesting. First, he offers his

I think the issue here is leadership effectiveness and not motivation or goal, for both Reuben and Judah are focused on trying to preserve the

A few verses later however, after the passion of the moment has cooled, Judah speaks with what Jonathan Sacks calls 'quiet authority' and advises against the possibility of murdering Joseph (suggesting that this is still a possibility). Judah uses language that is inclusive and not authoritarian and in so doing he wins the brothers' trust (37:26-27): "What do we gain by killing our brother (ki na'harog et acheenu) and covering up his blood? Come, let us sell him to the Ishmaelites, but let us not do away with him ourselves, after all, he is our brother (ki acheenu bsareinu hu)." The end of the verse makes it clear that his brothers agreed (va'yishm'u acheev)."

In yet other instances in Genesis, Reuben intends to do good but does so in a manner that is not quite right. To assuage his mother's loneliness and yearning for love, he brings her an aphrodisiac plant (dudaim), so that Jacob might spend more nights with Leah. To defend Leah's honor, Reuben defiles Bilhah (or moves the marital bed out of her tent). Again, it's not the purpose that's off, what child doesn't sense a mother's heartbreak and wish to assuage it? It's the execution. Noble goals don't justify unsavory or morally problematic actions. And Jacob gets this. In Vayechi (49:4) he 'blesses' Reuben: "Turbulent as water, you shall not have preeminence (pachaz ka'mayim al totar)." Reuben is, in this metaphor, reckless and 'unstable of character' (per Jonathan Sacks), and
