DVAR TORAH PARSHAT VAYISHLACH

This week's parsha contains one of the most troubling episodes in the Torah — the story of Dena and the people of Shechem. As the parsha begins, Jacob had just closed a chapter of his life successfully. Decades before, he had been forced to flee from his father's home to escape the anger and vengeance of his brother. He'd made his way to his mother's hometown, settled in with his uncle, got married (twice), became wealthy, had children (11) and was ultimately able to return to his own country, stand face-to-face with the brother that he had feared for all of those years — and walk away unscathed. The Torah states that after he parted amicably from Esau, he made his way to Shechem, where he arrived "whole" (Ch. 33, v. 18). When he reached the outskirts of the town, he purchased a plot of land and settled down. Based upon the way that Chamor and Shechem will later speak to their people about Jacob and his family, they were on very good terms with their neighbors (Ch. 34, v. 21).

Then, suddenly everything goes terribly wrong. Dena is violated by the favorite son of the ruler of the city. Jacob's reactions to Dena's having been violated is astonishing. He waits for his sons to come home from the field where they were tending the family's flocks. What was he waiting for? Did he expect to get guidance from them as to how to react to Shechem's nefarious deed? Couldn't he figure out on his own that he should be outraged? Shouldn't he have demanded that his daughter be returned to him immediately?

And yet we see that when it came time to react to Chamor, it is Jacob's sons who do the talking (and thereafter take action). The Torah makes clear that Jacob's sons spoke deceptively with the people whose prince had violated Dena. It is also clear that the people of Shechem did not seem to feel that there was anything wrong with what "Prince" Shechem had done. On the one hand, they were willing to accept Jacob and his sons into their community and to undergo excruciating pain as part of that arrangement. On the other hand, they did not seem to acknowledge that Shechem's violation of Dena merited any disapprobation.

Shimon and Levi wait until the townspeople are at their weakest and murder all the men of the city and bring Dena back to their father. Once Shimon and Levi made sure that there would be nobody left to protect the town, the other sons of Jacob looted and plundered it. Once again, Jacob's reaction is difficult to comprehend. He is only concerned about how others will react to what they have done and fears that he and his family may face annihilation at the hands of the other peoples of Canaan. His sons ask him, pointedly, whether they should have allowed their sister to be treated as a harlot. He does not respond.

I realize, of course, that looking at the story through 21 st century eyes certainly makes it more difficult to accept. The willingness to condone Shechem's behavior, the failure to respond appropriately to the violation of a woman and the murders and plundering committed by Jacobs sons are all hard to

swallow. Chamor and Shechem and their people are ready to move on as if nothing has happened. Jacob is speechless and helpless and takes no part, whatsoever, in any response to the violation of his daughter. Jacob's sons are disingenuous and almost cowardly in their excessive reaction and destruction.

At this horrific moment, it is G-d who reaches out to Jacob and gives him guidance. He tells him to return to Beit El to live there. He directs him to build an altar to the G-d who had appeared to him when he was fleeing from his brother — and had given him the spiritual strength which he had needed for his years in exile and for his return to face Esau. It appears that he had run out of that commodity. He was floundering.

Upon hearing G-d's words, Jacob suddenly realizes what has been going wrong with him and his family. He, and they, have lost their way. They had tried too hard to become a part of the society in which they were living — the same society that had condoned Shechem's behavior. After his moment of epiphany, Jacob directs his family to dispose of the false deities and idols that they had in their possession. He commands them to cleanse themselves and change their clothing. They spontaneously remove the nose rings that they had been wearing and give them to Jacob. Jacob ceremoniously buries all of the accessories and trappings of the life that they had been living and returns with them to Beit El, where he had first encountered G-d. Soon thereafter, G-d appears to him again and assures him that his offspring will inherit the land that was promised to his father and grandfather. Jacob and his family return to the ways of the Lord (in Beit El -- the House of the Lord) and Jacob is able to enjoy a brief period of respite before his travails begin again.

May we all have the spiritual strength and good health to enjoy our lives and our community for many years to come.
