

# **Dvar Torah: Parshat Bereshit**

Parashat Bereishit: Creation, Humanity, and Sin October 21-22, 2022 by Judy Sokolow



Here we are shortly after the Days of Awe, when we hopefully feel that our account with our Creator is balanced in our favor; yet, we continue to pray to G-d to help us repent and to forgive our sins every time we recite Shemoneh Esrei and elsewhere in our daily prayers. "As Oscar Wilde is said to have quipped, 'G-d in creating man somewhat overestimated his ability'" (NY Times opinion columnist David Brooks, 9/8/22)."

We all know that Adam sinned in the Garden of Eden. The Talmud states that this occurred on the 6th day of creation (Sanhedrin 38b), some say to highlight that sin was part of creation. G-d created us with free will and sometimes we abuse that privilege. But sin can be constructive. Habitual sin is injurious, but righteous people atone for sin and grow from their mistakes (discussed by Rabbi Jay Kelman in his informative and uplifting weekly class on the Siddur at torahinmotion.org).

We call G-d by many names. We know that Elokim designates din (judgment, justice); whereas, yudheh-vav-heh (Hashem) indicates rachamim (compassion, grace). Interestingly, throughout the first chapter of Bereishit, G-d is known as Elokim; whereas, in Chapter 2, which also describes creation, He becomes Hashem Elokim. Midrash Rabba, Bereishit XII, 15 relates this to a king who has 2 glasses. If he fills them with either very hot water or very cold water, they will break. He therefore mixes the two to fill the glasses. Thus, G-d said: "If I create the world based on compassion alone, its sins will be great; if based on judgment alone, the world cannot exist. Hence I will create it based on judgment and on compassion, and may it then stand." David Hartman, in his book A Heart of Many Rooms, sees din as indicating the human ability to "shoulder responsibility" and to have "will and assertion." He says that the Midrash presumes that a world based solely on justice or people's merit would be too authoritarian, confining and harsh, and stunt human creativity. But a world run only by compassion would infantilize people by allowing for lower standards and lackadaisical behavior that would also hinder motivation. And so, the Torah worldview reflects both.

Creation, however, did not end with day 6; it ended with Shabbat. Arguably, arrogance and vanity lead people to sin. Again, G-d instituted balance to get the most out of humanity. We are to work and be creative most days, but we are to "rest" on Shabbat. But work per se is not restricted; rather, it is only creative activity that is denied us. (This is defined as 39 categories of activity connected to the construction of the Mishkan.) We are to be partners with G-d in keeping the world viable, but we should not get carried away with our power. Shabbat makes us surrender much of our control. Hartman sees this as particularly important in our era of "the human grandiosity of technical arrogance."

And so, Judaism encourages us to worship G-d in loving awe—and not in fear—and to be creative in working with Him in healing and improving the world. There is so much to do...
