DVAR TORAH PARSHAT VAYIGASH

The phenomenon of dysfunctional family dynamics, punctuated by parental favoritism and sibling rivalry, is a common thread that is woven through the stories of our patriarchs told in Sefer Bereishit. Jealousy, betrayals, and deceit abound, with brothers uniting not in the presence of their fathers, but to bury them (Gen. 25:9, 35:29).

At first, the story of Joseph and his brothers appears to continue this tradition of familial disharmony and distrust. However, by the time Parshat Vayigash concludes we find the tradition broken, with Jacob alive to witness his sons' reconciliation and the family, soon-to-be nation, able to move forward as a unit.

Vayigash opens with Judah's poignant plea for Benjamin to be allowed to return home, largely to spare Jacob the irreparable pain he would inevitably suffer should his youngest son be detained in Egypt. Of course, unbeknownst to Judah, in a masterful twist of irony, the Egyptian prince to whom he makes this appeal is the very brother he sold into slavery 22 years earlier, Benjamin's full brother Joseph. It is Judah's heartfelt supplication that ultimately causes Joseph to break his charade, weep and reveal his true identity. The applicable verses read:

[Gen. 45:1] And Joseph could no longer restrain himself in the presence of all who were stationed around him, and he cried out: "Have everyone leave me." So no one stood with him when Joseph made himself known to his brothers. [45:2] And he wept aloud...[45:3] Then Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?"

This was not the first time Joseph cried following an encounter with his brothers (see Gen. 42:24; 43:30), but it is the first time he did so in front of them. Since Joseph had the time and wherewithal to ask his entourage to leave before he wept, he clearly could have asked the brothers to do so as well, indicating that his emotional display before them was intentional.

Which begs the question: Why now? What had Judah said that triggered Joseph's tearful confession?

Several reasons can be found in the commentaries. One possibility is that Joseph was simply moved by the realization of the profound grief his father would suffer should Benjamin not return to him (Bekhor Shor).

Yet another proposal is that Judah's declared willingness to sacrifice his own freedom for Benjamin's sake kindled, even

intensified, Joseph's compassion for his brothers (see Shadal, with attribution to R. Avraham Chai Meinster). As many modern commentators and scholars have observed, Joseph had cleverly tested his brothers' character by devising a situation in which they again controlled the fate of another of Jacob and Rachel's sons. In so doing he invited the brothers not only to recognize their past wrongdoings but to not repeat their earlier behavior. Through his speech, Judah demonstrated his (and by extension his brothers') integrity, family loyalty, and personal growth, suggesting that Joseph had nothing more to gain from continuing his stratagem (see Nahum Sarna, the JPS Torah Commentary: Genesis, p. 308). With Joseph's trial of his brothers concluded, he could move forward towards mending their relationship. As Everett Fox states (*The Schocken Bible*, Vol. 1, p. 202): "Once the brothers pass the test, life and covenant can then continue." But first Joseph had to assure his brothers that he bore no malice towards them for their past deeds of betrayal and that G-d alone was responsible for the entire saga. Only then could mutual family trust be restored and reunification made possible. And only after the family was made whole could the story of the nation of Israelites continue.

This parsha, therefore, teaches us that it is never too late to learn from our mistakes, to atone, to forgive and ultimately make peace with others; that selective memory is sometimes a helpful tool on the journey towards reconciliation; and that family harmony is a necessary first step towards national unity.

This Dvar Torah is in memory of my beloved brother Berl Nadler, z"l, whose shloshim is observed on the 8th of Tevet. Unlike the jealous brothers of Sefer Bereishit, Berl was a devoted and loving older brother, whose enthusiastic pride in his siblings' accomplishments (and those of his four children and 14 grandchildren) was a constant in our lives. May his memory be for a blessing.
