#### YOUTH DVAR TORAH

By: Avrahum Sanger

In this week's Parsha we have the mitzvah of kisuy hadam, the commandment to cover at least part of the blood after a bird or nondomesticated animal is slaughtered.

The Gemara in Chullin (87a) says that just as the bird is slaughtered with one's hand, so too the blood is covered with one's hand. This excludes covering the blood by kicking dirt upon it with one's foot (which might be the most convenient way to accomplish the covering). The reason given is it is disrespectful to perform a mitzvah with one's foot when it can be performed with one's hand. Whenever we do a mitzvah, we should do it in the most respectful manner possible.

To go one step further, if we must cover the blood with dirt using our hands rather than our feet that we should not treat mitzvos in a callous fashion, how much more so do we need to be extremely sensitive when dealing with alive, breathing, and feeling, human beings.

## **DVAR TORAH**

Parshat Acharei Mot April 29-30, 2022 Nisan 29, 5782 By Fred Ehrman

#### The Day They Feasted on Yom Kippur

And this shall be to you a law for all time; in the seventh month, on the tenth day of the month, you shall **afflict** yourselves; and you shall not do any work, neither the citizen nor the stranger who dwells among you. (Vayikra 16:29)

What is the meaning of affliction in this context?

"And if it is your wish to say" something to challenge this reasoning, the Gemara brings an additional proof: "Surely, the verse states" with regard to one who violates Yom Kippur: "I will destroy that soul from among his people" (Leviticus 23:30). Therefore, "affliction is something that destroys a soul. And what is that? That is" refraining from "eating and drinking," since someone who does not eat and drink at all will die. The Torah is referring only to afflictions that lead to death (Yoma 74:B).

Eating and drinking on Yom Kippur is a major sin punishable with *Karet*, spiritual excision. But there is a story in the Book of Kings that has always confounded me.

King Solomon has completed the building of the *Beit Hamikdash* and gives us one of the most emotional and beautiful prayers and supplications recorded in the Scriptures. (Please read 1 Kings 8:22-61 to get the full flavor.) He then makes a great feast for all the people that lasts 14 days and ends on Shemini Atzeret.

"So, Solomon and all Israel with him—a great assemblage, [coming] from Lebo-hamath to the Wadi of Egypt observed the feast at that time before the LORD our G-d, seven days and again seven days, fourteen days in all" (1 Kings 8:65).

"King Solomon offered as sacrifices 22,000 oxen and 120,000 sheep; thus, the king and all the people dedicated the House of G-d" (II Chronicles 7:5).

"On the twenty-third day of the seventh month, he dismissed the people to their homes, rejoicing and in good spirits over the goodness that the LORD had shown to David and Solomon and His people Israel" (II Chronicles 7:9-10).

The people went home on the 23rd day of Tishrei and that meant the festivities began on the 8th of Tishrei. **What happened on Yom Kippur!** Did they disregard or forget the solemnity and the prohibitions of that day?

Radak comments on this by citing the following Gemara:

Apropos the discussion of the celebration at Solomon's dedication of the Temple, the Gemara relates that "Rabbi Parnakh said that Rabbi Yoḥanan said: That year, the Jewish people did not observe Yom Kippur" as the seven-day celebration of the dedication of the Temple coincided with Yom Kippur and all seven days were celebrated with feasting. "And the people were worried and said: Perhaps the enemies of the Jewish people," [a euphemism for the Jewish people themselves], "have become liable to be destroyed" for the transgression of eating on Yom Kippur, which is punishable by Karet. "A Divine Voice issued forth and said to them: All of you are designated for life in the World-to-Come" (Moed Katan 9A).

What could King Shlomo have been thinking in organizing this major celebration and feast on the holiest day of the year? We learn about the 39 Avot Melacha from the the building of the Mishkan. The Torah teaches us that this holy task of the Mishkan's construction does not override the Shabbat. And here Shlomo pushes aside Yom Kippur to hold a big party to celebrate the inauguration of the Temple? Could he not have paused for one day during this two-week celebration? And why would a Bas Kol, the Divine Voice, affirm this

action?

I would like to offer the following suggested explanation. And for that we have to go back to the origins of the holiday of Yom Kippur.

Moshe ascended Har Sinai for 40 days after the Torah was given. The people expected his return on the 16th of Tammuz. When he did not show up, the people panicked and produced the Golden Calf, the *Eigel Hazahav*, an idol which would substitute for their missing leader. When Moshe came down on the next day, the 17th of Tammuz, he witnessed the horrible scene of an orgy replete with eating and drinking in the worship of the Golden Calf. After breaking the *Luchot* (tablets), and chastising all the participants, he again ascended Sinai for another 80 days and prayed that the people be forgiven with a new set of Luchot. He finally came down again on the 10th of Tishrei, which from that day forward has been called Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.

With that as background, we can begin to understand Shlomo's thinking. Remembering the grievous sin of the Eigel Hazahav ,he felt that the Temple and its predecessor Mishkan, which some say was necessitated because of the sin of the Eigel, should make up for that action. There the people gave their gold to build an idol. Here the people contributed their gold to build a place for the Shechina. There the people ate and drank in celebrating the idol. Here they ate and drank in dedication of the Temple. There the people were involved in lascivious activities and Arayot, forbidden relationships. Here they were celebrating marital purity.

Here is how the Gemara in Moed Katan describes and contrasts this:

יָצְתָה בַּת קוֹל וְאָמָרָה לָהָם: כּוּלְכֶם מְזוּמָנִין לְחַיֵּי הָעוֹלְם הַבְּא. וּמְנָלוַ דְאָחֵיל לְהוּ? דְּתָנֵי תַּחְלִיפְא: ״בִּיוֹם הִשְּׁמִינִי שַׁלַּח אֶת הָעָם וַיִּבָרְכוּ אֶת הַמָּלֶךְּ וַיִּלְכוּ לְאָהֱלֵיהֶם שְׁמֵחִים וְטוֹבֵי לֵב עַל כָּל הַטוֹבָה אֵשֶׁר עָשָׂה ה׳ לְדִוִד עַבְדּוֹ וּלְיִשְּׂרָאֵל עַמוֹ״

"A Divine Voice issued forth and said to them: All of you are designated for life in the World-to-Come." The Gemara asks: "And from where do we derive that God pardoned them" for this sin? The Gemara answers: The Sage "Tahlifa taught" in a Baraita\* that the verse states: "On the eighth day he sent the people away, and they blessed the king, and went to their tents joyful and glad of heart for all the goodness that the Lord had done for David His servant and for Israel His people" (I Kings 8:66).

אָפָל (נְמִי — שֶׁהָלְכוּ וּמָצְאוּ נְשֵׁיהֶם בְּּטְהָרָה, ״שְׁמָחִים״ — שֶׁבֶּהֶנוּ מִזִּיו הַשְּׁבִינָה, ״וְטוֹבֵי לֵב״ — שְׁבָּל יִשְׁרִיהָם״ בּוּלְּבָם מְזוּמְנִין לְחַיַּי בְּאָרָה אָשְׁתוֹ בְּבֵן זָבָר, ״עֵל כָּל הַטוֹבָה״ — שֶׁיִצְתָה בַּת קוֹל וְאָמְרָה לְהָם: בּוּלְכֶם מְזוּמְנִין לְחַיַּי הָבָּא. הַתְּעבְּרָה אִשְׁתוֹ בְּבֵן זָבָר, ״עֵל כָּל הַטוֹבָה״ — שֶׁיִצְתָה בַּת קוֹל וְאָמְרָה לְהָם: בּוּלְכֶם מְזוּמְנִין לְחַיֵּי הַבָּא. הַעוֹלָם הַבָּא.

This verse may be expounded as follows: The words "To their tents" indicate "that they went and found their wives in" a state of "purity," as the terms tent and house often denote one's wife. The term "joyful" is referring to the fact "they had enjoyed the splendor of the Divine Presence," as there was a revelation of the Divine Presence when the offerings were sacrificed in the Temple. The phrase "and glad of heart" refers to the fact that "each of their wives conceived a male child." The words "for all the goodness" indicate "that a Divine Voice issued forth and said to them: All of you are designated for life in the World-to-Come," which is the ultimate good (Moed Katan 9A). It is as if the Bas Kol now said: "You have consoled Me, My children, You have consoled Me, My children."

In other words, this 14-day celebration was a *Tikkun* (repair) for the one day of calamity which introduced idolatry just weeks after the historic event of Matan Torah. The Mishkan/Temple which was necessitated because of the sin of the Eigel, and Yom Kippur which had its roots in that sin, all come together in this great feast.

May we all be witness again to the building of the Third Beit Hamikdash, which if inaugurated on Yom Kippur, will lead us to feasting and not fasting on that day. May that day come soon and in our time.
