YOUTH DVAR TORAH

In Parshat Beha'alotcha we see that Hashem commands Moshe to gather 70 קבים (elders) in the middle of Bnei Yisraels complaint about not having meat. Why does Hashem do this?

Rav Shimshon Rafael Hirsch says that when people complain about lacking physical things they're really missing something spiritual.

Rav Storch says that Hashem said, go help them with their ruchnius (spiritual), because if that's intact, they won't complain about the gashmius (physical).

Rabbi Shlomo Riskin says that we can see from this that the Jews felt lost wandering in the desert. They felt like they were losing purpose. They were looking for meaning.

This is such an important thing to recognize. This interpretation gives us something tangible that we can apply to our everyday lives. It's so important to check in with ourselves and see why we're upset and if it can be stemming from something else. When we feel that we're lacking in the material sense or that we are losing our purpose we should immediately take a look at our relationship with G-d and how we're doing spiritually. We should never stop thinking and looking for something more that we can do in our Judaism.

DVAR TORAH

Parshat Beha'alotcha June 17-18, 2022* Written by: Bina Presser

In memory of her parents, Leiser ben Aharon Yitzhak and Bracha, and Mina bat HaRav David and Bina, whose yahrzeits are this time of year.

Who is a leader? This is a familiar topic for discussion of late, so perhaps it is the right time to turn to Beha'alotkha for some guidelines, to learn about who is and who is not a leader, and about what makes Moshe unique.

Starting with the earliest stages of the Israelite people's development, Moshe finds himself the shepherd of a rebellious and unhappy flock. A frightened and bewildered people, new to the idea of being free and independent, beholden to a largely invisible God instead of to an easily recognizable though bloody tyrant, now have to trust a modest and humble man who claims to speak in His name.

The Children of Israel have just seen God's revealed might in their exodus from Egypt, yet standing at the Red Sea they already complain "...you took us (out of Egypt) to die in the wilderness." At that very place they join Moshe in singing praise of the almighty God who has just saved them, yet almost immediately at Sinai, having again witnessed His awesome power, they complain that Moshe has abandoned them. Later on, the sons of Korach complain because they feel they've been shortchanged on the leadership deal. And in this week's parasha, the people have a long list of complaints. At Taberah, they complain bitterly, no reason given. They then complain that the food is no good. Miriam complains that Moshe isn't treating his wife properly. Miriam and Aaron both complain that they deserve more of a leadership role. Moshe's closest aides complain that Eldad and Medad are usurping Moshe's authority.

Moshe, too, is frightened, feeling inadequate in his new role as leader. He, too, complains, but only to God, "I cannot carry all this by myself, for it is too much for me" (11:14). But to the people he's been chosen to lead, he reveals wisdom, and yes, love, though also anger when needed. The same fuming Moshe who says "You'll be eating meat until it comes out of your nostrils " (11:20) is the Moshe who has pity on the Israelites when God sends down a consuming fire, who pleads for Miriam's health though she has just tried to undermine him, who is happy to share his leadership role by establishing a system of Elders, and who has never been too proud to lean heavily on Aaron to help him through it all.

Professor Pinchas Hyman (Bar Ilan University, 2004) focuses on the Seventy Elders. He maintains, citing the Midrash Rabbah, that there was a system of leadership-sharing long before the Seventy Elders, that the Seventy Elders were in fact among this earlier cadre of leaders. Then at Kivrot Hata'avah (the Graves of Gluttony) "The Lord's wrath blazed forth against the people and the Lord struck the people with a very severe plague" (11:33). Among those who died were the last of the unworthy leaders of that earlier time, and also those who would have liked to be leaders but never were. They were like those of the "gluttonous riffraff" (11:4), the ones who spearheaded the gross demand for better food. Why did they deserve to die? Because as leaders their focus was on the material, not on the spiritual qualities needed for leadership. Those who remained were the deserving Seventy Elders, the cadre of leadership whose values the people could emulate, those whom Moshe could rely upon to mete out justice with wisdom.

In contrast to the unworthy leaders, writes Professor Hyman, Moshe exhibits "patience, self-abnegation, the ability to accept another's views...tolerance and love of one's fellows, toning down personal cravings and self-interest." He continues "Moshe was not looking for rubber stamps...he was looking for brave leaders who would be true to their way and uncompromising in their values, capable of being a living example to the people." Would that we keep this in mind when choosing our leaders of today.
