YOUTH DVAR TORAH By: Avrahum Sanger

Subsequent to the prohibitions of owning measuring utensils that enable dishonest business practices the Torah writes "For it is abominable to Hashem your G-d, anyone who does any-kol- of these actions, anykol- one who perpetrates false actions" Sefer Devarim 25:16). Why does the Torah write "kol"- any- twice?

The Ohr HaChaim explains as follows. The first "kol" refers to the specific items mentioned in the Torah- maintaining separate stones for weighing produce on scales and utensils to measure flour (=purchasing with a large measure, selling with a small one). Cheating suppliers and customers with a rigged measurement system is abominable. A person may claim that only the specific actions are forbidden- a unique decree-Gezarat HaKatuv. Perhaps dishonest forms of commerce not mentioned in the Torah are permitted, or at the very least are not classified as an abomination? To negate this claim the Torah writes that ANY similar act of dishonesty is abominable as well.

Amalek 74 mitzvot





DVAR TORAH

Ki Teitzei

"Remember what Amalek did to you on the way when you were leaving Egypt. that he happened upon you on the way, and he struck those of you who were hindmost, all the weaklings, at your rear, when you were faint and exhausted, and he did not fear Elokim."

It is interesting that G-d uses the euphemism "that he happened upon you," rather than describing what actually happened – a premeditated, cowardly attack upon B'nai Yisrael, from the rear.

The Rabbis describe this attack on B'nai Yisrael as sticking one's foot in scalding hot water. Even though Amalek lost the war, they cooled the water, so to speak, for future Antisemitism.

Hashem uses His name of Justice in describing the Amalekites not fearing him. Could Hashem have protected us differently. Could he have thwarted their attack as he did when Balaam tried to curse us?

When it comes to spiritual attacks on us, Hashem is there to stop the curse even if we don't know it is being done. But when it comes to physical attacks, Hashem does not seem to stop our enemies.

I will give several examples: When we left Egypt, Hashem took us on a safe route because if we'd been threatened with a war, we were not prepared to fight and would have gone back to Egypt on our own. And although Balaam could not curse us, he gave Balak the secret to turn B'nai Yisrael against Hashem. Hashem did not take any steps to stop this. It took Pinchas to end the plague with a physical action.

Let's us move to my father's generation. When the Nazis (their names should be erased) came to power, Hashem did not step in and stop the Holocaust. It took a war. Many people who went through the Holocaust and survived asked, where was Hashem? Why didn't He stop the genocide?

In explaining why there had to be a Holocaust, people give many reasons. One is that it led to our receiving the land of Israel. Another is that it happened because too many of us were not observant. These are not good reasons, but we don't know the reason. Maybe we'll find the answer later, but for now we don't understand any of it.

In both the Six-Day War and in the Yom Kippur war, a war had to be fought. Even if we had received intelligence about the attack, these wars still had to happen. Maybe other wars were thwarted by Hashem. but again, we don't know. Many soldiers have claimed that there were miracles that they witnessed in these wars. One claim was that as the Israeli tank brigade was running to chase the Egyptians, they saw the battle in heaven playing out. If this is true, then certainly Hashem is there to fight our battles, but still, a battle must be waged.

So, when Amalek attacks us, and a battle must be waged, Hashem will be there. When Moses' hands are raised, we are winning. When his arms grow weary, we are not winning.

Hashem commands us: "you shall wipe out the memory of Amalek from under the heaven – you shall never forget!" As we enter the Yomim Noraim, may Hashem Elokim grant us good health and the protection that we need from our enemies.


