YOUTH DVAR TORAH

In our parsha, the Torah presents the Torat haMetzora, the laws of the person with Tzaraat, in value-free terms, without any ethical background, reference to sin causing the onset of tzaraat, or instruction that the metzora pray or repent. The cure, similarly, does not hinge on the patient's conduct.

Elsewhere in Tanach, though, tzaraat does clearly serve as a divine punishment for wrongdoing. Miriam is stricken with tzara'at for speaking against Moshe (Bemidbar 12); Geichazi is punished for his greed and false oath to Elisha (Melakhim II 5); and Uziyahu is punished with tzara'at for offering incense in the Temple in defiance of the kohanim (Divrei Ha-yamim II 26:16-21).

Chazal focus on this element of sin. Rabbi Yossi teaches us that lashon hara causes tzaraat, Reish Lakish associates the word itself with the words motzi shem ra, and Rav Shmuel bar Nachmeni lists seven sins that cause tzaraat: lashon hara, murder, false oaths, immorality, arrogance, theft, and stinginess (TB Arachin 15).

Ramban goes a bit further in suggesting that the function of tzaraat is less punishment that awakening-in his reading the Torah is presenting an incrementally more and more severe call to rehabilitation. Hashem sends tzaraat as a wondrous sign to the sons of Israel to warn them against evil speech. In the first stage, after a Jew engages in frivolous and evil speech, the walls of his home become discolored. If he repents, good and he returns to purity. But if he continues his wrongdoing, the linens of his home then show the signs of it. And if even after they are burned he continues to sin, his skin itself becomes discolored. He contracts tzaraat and he must be separated and publicly isolated to demonstrate the severity of his son. At the point that we get the message from Hashem and repent, we are able to end the cycle and return to purity!

DVAR TORAH

Parshat Metzorah April 8-9, 2022 by Judy Sokolow

Tzara'at, Trees, and Community

I assume that we all know by now that the skin affliction *tzara'at*, although it is often translated as leprosy, was not a medical condition; rather, it was a signal from G-d that the victim was being called out for *lashon hara* or defaming someone's character. This was discerned from the episode in Shemot 4:1-8 when Moshe slandered the Jewish people by claiming that they would doubt that G-d had really sent him to rescue them, and again, when Miriam, joined by Aharon, instigated a verbal assault against Moshe about his new Cushite wife as reported in Numbers 12 and Devarim 24: 8-9. People who like word plays connect the sound of *metzora* with the phrase *motzi shem ra* or besmirching someone's reputation.

Victims of tzara'at were, among other things, required to leave the camp for seven days. This led some to infer that the condition was contagious, a highly tenuous conclusion, considering that the priests whose job it was to check for the condition and administer the atonement ritual, ceased their inspections for bridegrooms during the week of their wedding and for the people at large who came in crowds to Jerusalem to mark the three pilgrimage festivals (Nega'im 3:2). (For more on this subject see *Studies in the Weekly Parashah Based on the Lessons of Nehama Leibowitz* by Moshe Sokolow.)

Why then was a person afflicted with tzara'at made to undergo the rehabilitation process not only outside the inhabited area but "sitting alone" (last week's parashah 13:46), away from even other impure people? Arguably this is to signify how divisive lashon hara can be and how damaging to communal well-being. Indeed, Rashi, citing a midrash, wrote: "Since he caused separation through evil talk between husband and wife or between a man and a friend, therefore he also should be separated."

The lengthy purification ritual for tzara'at is spelled out in our parashah in Chapter 14. My interest here is to focus in particular on the flora used in this process: a branch from the mighty cedar tree (etz erez) bound together with some lowly hyssop shrub (eizov). These, working in tandem, symbolized the metzora's need to subdue his arrogance. As Rashi explained (14:4): "For plagues result from haughtiness. What is his remedy that he should be healed? He should lower himself from his pride... like hyssop."

This is not the only interaction between man and trees in the Torah. Perhaps the most famous appears in a discussion of rules of engagement during war where we are told not to destroy trees because, according to some translations, "man is the tree of the field" (Devarim 20:19). Back in January, Jesse Cogan, in a devar Torah in these pages to mark Tu Bishvat, cited several explanations of this verse and appropriately urged us to consider proper use of our natural resources. But, out of context, the phrase has been used in many homilies, to which I would like to add another.

The December 6, 2020 New York Times Magazine included an article by Ferris Jabr entitled, "The Social Life of Forests," that focuses on the "groundbreaking research" of forest ecologist Professor Suzanne Simard. As Jabr put it: In a forest, trees, even those of different species, "routinely exchange water, food and chemical messages through vast underground networks of roots and fungi, openly helping one another survive" (p. 6). In fact, when trees of just one species are planted to restore a deforested area, they do less well than when differing species are planted near each other. This begs the question: According to Darwinian theory, species are in competition with each other, and it is the fittest that survive. But, when it comes to forests, it appears that cooperation wins the day.

So, are humans like the trees in the field? The war in Ukraine reminds us with horror how evil some people can be. But the war is also motivating so many others to forge pathways to be supportive, generous, and even life-saving, not only locally but globally. May this ever-growing forest of collaboration and kindness flourish and thrive and come to universally define what it means to be human to the point when there will be no war anymore.

Yael called me today and told me that she had come to a gemach sale to find clothing for a friend. This friend and her husband both lost their jobs during COVID and have accumulated HUGE debt. Thank G-d, they are both now finally working and slowly paying back their debts. The constant financial stress and need to work very long hours is totally overwhelming, clouding their ability to think about anything else except for money.

Knowing that they did not have the resources nor time to think about purchasing clothing, Yael surprised her and bought her clothing for her four girls for Pesach, complete with dresses, stockings, headbands, and shoes!! Yael then shared with me the reactions of her friend, and of the daughters who without Yad Leah would have gone without proper clothing for Pesach.

It was a big stress reliever, to feel like a "regular" family and have beautiful clothing for the holiday. And the JOY that the clothes gave that family. Oh the joy that you gave them: relief from their economic stress, from thinking about debts and loans all day, and how to buy enough food to feed the family. Yad Leah gave them the ability to have quality fashionable clothing to wear. You literally brought so much happiness into their lives. The girls were giggling, laughing, smiling, hugging each other, jumping up and down and then crying that someone cares and they are not alone.

Somehow when one feels beautiful, it gives hope that these hard times will pass.

So I am passing on tears of joy, with lots of hugs from this family to Yad Leah. May God bless you to always be on the giving side of life, With much admiration and appreciation for all you do for us, Mayrav, Yad Leah Gemach Coordinator
