לעברך בברית "Crossing Over" to the Covenant

This week's sidrah addresses the entire Jewish nation on the threshold of the Land of Israel in order to establish a new covenant between them and God. (The initial covenant, made at the time of the exodus from Egypt, was nullified when they declared—Exodus 32:4,8—that the golden calf would be, "Your deity, Israel, who took you out of Egypt.")

The language the Torah uses here (Dt. 29:11) is: l'ovr'kha bib'rit, translated by J.P.S. as "To enter into the covenant [of the Lord]." However, the Hebrew verb "to enter" is either B-U-' or K-N-S while עב" usually means "to cross [over] or pass [by]." From what/where to what/where were they about to cross? Rashi's explanation is the conventional one:

The way of "passing" was as follows: those who made a covenant used to make a partition [i.e. used to place objects in a straight line] on one side and a partition on the other and passed between them.

As prooftext, Rashi cited Jeremiah 34:18:

I will make the men who violated My covenant, who did not fulfill the terms of the covenant which they made before Me, [like] the calf which they cut in two to pass between the halves.

Although unremarked by Rashi, his explanation draws upon the imagery of the covenant made by God with Abraham of which it explicitly states: "He brought Him all these and cut them in two, placing each half opposite the other" (Genesis 15:10). A Midrash explains that Abraham was called an `lvri ("Hebrew") because "the whole world stood on one side (`eiver) while he stood on the opposite side" (B'reishit Rabba 41). Taking "sides" requires commitment; so does transitioning from one side to another. As the Israelites stood poised to cross over the Jordan, God invited them to take stock and to renew their commitment to Him and to Torah.

However, Rabbi S.R. Hirsch saw this as a spiritual crossing over, commenting:

If you wish to enter a covenant with God, you must leave the position you previously occupied. You must abandon, detach yourself from all previously held positions in order to connect exclusively with God. That is why it does not state "to come into" but "to cross into." Once you enter God's covenant, you will be stationed in an entirely different position from the one you have taken thus far.

As we stand on the threshold of the Yamim HaNora'im, we, too, must take stock and renew our commitments, that we may merit the ultimate covenant that God described to Jeremiah:

And I will make an everlasting covenant with them that I will not turn away from them and that I will treat them graciously; and I will put into their hearts reverence for Me, so that they do not turn away from Me. I will delight in treating them graciously, and I will plant them in this land faithfully, with all My heart and soul. (Jeremiah 32:40-41)
