YOUTH DVAR TORAH

This week's Parsha opens with the eighth day of the inauguration of the Mishkan. This was a tremendous day of celebration for the Jewish people as it served as an atonement for the sin of the golden calf. Moshe commands Aharon, "approach the altar and offer your Chatat and Olah and atone for you and your nation" (9:7).

Rashi picks up on the somewhat curious language of "approach the altar." Why was this necessary to state? Did Aharon keep a distance until this point? Rashi explains that Aharon felt unworthy of approaching the altar to offer the sacrifices and therefore Moshe had to urge him to do so, saying "it was for this you were chosen."

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks expounds on this Rashi with a beautiful message. Rabbi Sacks suggests that Aharon was not just being humble but rather felt that he was unworthy because he played a central role in the sin of the golden calf. Bnei Yisrael had brought him their gold and he was the one who threw it into the fire, only to produce the golden calf. Given that he aided in this debacle, he felt unworthy to now represent Bnei Yisrael in this service to God.

Yet, Moshe responds in kind. "It was for this you were chosen." It is specifically because of your role in the sin that God chose you to be the one to lead Bnei Yisrael in atoning for it. Because Aharon understands what it is to sin and to feel the guilt over it that he can ask forgiveness for the Jewish people. It was his faults and weakness that ultimately became his strength and led him to this position.

DVAR TORAH

Parshat Parah Shmini March 26, 2022 By Fred Ehrman

> **Under Whose Authority?** דברי הרב ודברי תלמיד דברי מי שומעים Kiddushin 42B

The two first Parshiot in Leviticus, Vayikra and Tzav, are totally instructive; they outline each of the Korbanot that are to be taught to Aharon and his sons and how they are to conduct the Avodah, the service of the sacrifices brought on the altar. The Rebbe/teacher is Hashem and the talmid/student is Moshe, who is the acting Kohen Gadol. No fewer than ten times do we see the new procedures introduced by these or similar words "וידבר ה אל־משה לאמר:." "Hashem spoke to Moshe saying:" Nothing is left to discretion; all are laid out explicitly by Hashem for this momentous day of the inauguration of the Mishkan.

However, Parsha Shemini begins with the following: וַיִהִי בַּיִּוֹם הַשָּׁמִילִּי קָרָא מֹשֶׁה לְאַהַרָן וּלְבַנַיו וּלְזִקְנֵי יִשִּׂרָאֵל״ ״

"And on the eighth day Moshe called Aharon and his sons and the elders of Israel," (Exodus 9:1) and is followed by the Korbanot brought on this special day.

Vayikra and Tzav are the dress rehearsals, the seven days of Miluim, leading up to the inauguration for the big day. The eighth day, Rosh Chodesh Nissan is the first and special day the Mishkan and the newly inaugurated Kohanim finally begin their everlasting roles.

Questions:

- Why does Parshat Shemini not begin with the same or similar words on the day everyone has been preparing for?
- "Hashem spoke to Moshe saying:"
- יַיַדַבֵּר ה אֶל־מֹשֶׁה לֵאמִר:"(על אחת כמה וכמה)? "
- Where do we find Hashem instructing Moshe to bring the particular Korbanot which follow?

Spoiler alert — all that follows here are my own suggestions to deal with these questions, and all are based on hints in the text itself.

For the very first time when the Mizbeach, the Altar is being inaugurated, Moshe tells Aharon, his sons and the elders to bring an eigel, a calf, for a Chatas, and a ram for an Olah; and for the people, a sa'ir, a he-goat, for a Chatas, and an eigel and a sheep for Olot. But nowhere do we read that Moshe was instructed by Hashem to do this! We also never find the word eigel used in connection with any other bovine Korban; it is always a ben bakar, a shor or a par, a bull. (An eigel is the youngest, a ben bakar is a young bull, and a par or shor are fully grown [See Mishna Parah 1:1 and 2]). The only two places we find an eigel as an object of worship in the last four books of the Torah are here and with the Eigel Hazahav, the Golden Calf. This is a significant clue.

With the flow of the previous Parshiot as explained above, the Torah should have explicitly written that "Hashem spoke to Moshe saying:" but it doesn't. Nothing in the Torah happens by chance or inadvertently. Each letter and tag (the "crown" or decoration over some of the Hebrew letters in the Torah) is intentional. What could be the reason?

I could not find anyone asking the question why the Parsha doesn't begin as it apparently should have. The Ramban does point out that we do not find where Moshe was explicitly given his instructions.

I would therefore suggest that Moshe gave these instructions on his own initiative! However, that presents another problem. There is a Gemara in Shabbat 87A that there were only three instances where Moshe took actions without instruction and Hashem was agreeable to

the actions (one being the breaking of the *Luchot*). Since our case was not listed, it follows that if we are correct that Moshe did this on his own initiative that Hashem did not approve of Moshe's action. Hints of this are the first words in the Parsha, "ויהי ביום," And it was on the (eighth) day..." which we see in TB Megilla 10B are ominous words which portend a day of grief and sadness on a day that should have been totally joyful. In our case, the death of Aharon's two eldest sons, Naday and Avihu follows. How do we explain Moshe's action?

I would like to suggest the following. The incident of the Eigel Hazahav took place 10 months before this day. Moshe wanted to give Aharon an opportunity for atonement, so the inaugural Korban was appropriately an eigel for a Chatas, or so he thought.

I am suggesting that Moshe initiated his instructions to Aharon and his sons to bring an eigel for a Chatas, as Chazal tell us, for Chait HaEigel, the sin of the Golden Calf. The goat for the people, also a Chatas, was for the sin of selling Yosef and using a goat's blood to deceive their father. The eigel they brought was for their part in the Chait HaEigel. Moshe, having been taught the laws of the inadvertent sinner and the Korban Chatas, felt that in initiating the Altar, it would be most appropriate for Aharon and the people to bring the animal that reflected their own sins.

Moshe then says, "This is the thing Hashem has commanded you to do" (9:6). Moshe assumed, as he had been taught earlier, that the Korban Chatas would cover a past sin even if it was not given explicitly! Moshe thought that the first Korban to initiate the Mishkan should be Aharon's eigel, and that of the people, a goat and a calf, and that Hashem would certainly approve on this great day of joy of the Chanukat HaMishkan, and that it was included under the Chatas offering that he was taught in the previous period. That seems not to be the case.

In addition, the Torah tells us that Nadav and Avihu died because of bringing an "an alien fire He had not commanded them" — אש זרה אשר לא צוה אותם. The word אל has a Mayrcha Kefula, a pausal cantillation found only five times in the Torah, signifying the severity of brothers' action. Nadav and Avihu saw Moshe instructing on which Korbanot to bring without explicit instructions and they followed suit. I think this tells us the importance of not improvising when you are doing Avodat Hashem, the ritualistic service in the Sanctuary.

The absence of the key phrase — "וַיִדבַּר ה אֱל־מֹשֶה לֹאמֵר:" Hashem spoke to Moshe saying:" at the beginning of Parshat Shemini, is the TID the hidden meaning that brings on all that follows. May we all continue in the paths laid out for us in the Torah and our traditions when that is what is required, but also not lose spontaneity when those special moments allow for them (e.g., saying Hallel on Yom Haatzamaut). The historically momentous occasion of the inauguration of the Mishkan was not one of those moments. That special day needed to follow the words of the Master and not those of the student:

דברי הרב ולא דברי התלמיד.

Not doing so resulted in tragic consequences.
