HOUSE COMMITTEE UPDATE AND EXCITING ANNOUNCEMENT:

The Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA), a branch of the Department of Homeland Security, announced the recipients of funding under the FY 2022 Nonprofit Security Grant Program, which include dozens of shuls, yeshivos, schools, and organizations across the United States.

FEMA said the Nonprofit Security Grant Program "provides funding support for facility hardening and other physical security enhancements and activities to nonprofit organizations that are at a high risk of a terrorist attack. The intent of the FY 2022 NSGP is to award grant funding to assist nonprofit organizations in obtaining the resources required to support and integrate the preparedness activities of nonprofit organizations that are at high risk of a terrorist attack with broader state and local preparedness efforts. They are also designed to promote coordination and collaboration in emergency preparedness activities among public and private community representatives, as well as state and local government agencies," the federal agency said.

We are thrilled to report that Lincoln Square Synagogue has been approved and awarded \$150,000 in funding for the 2022 Homeland Security Grant. In the coming months we will share with you project details but look forward to making our shul an even safer and more secure place to be.

YOUTH DVAR TORAH

In this week's Parsha, Moshe is reaching his final words of Sefer Devarim. His message is one of encouragement to make the right choices in life, choices that will lead us to the ultimate joy in the Beit Hamikdash.

Moshe says: "Re'ei a'nochi no'sein lif'nei'chem ha'yom bracha u'klalla" which means "See. I present before you today a blessing and a curse ... ". The Sfias Emes notes that implicit in this pasuk is a key fact of life: that HaShem has endowed us with "bechira chofshis" — free will — to choose between good and evil.

The Sfias Emes continues by citing an insight from his Grandfather, the Chid-dushei HaRim: every morning, we say a bracha whose inner message may initially be hard to understand. In that bracha, we thank HaShem for giving roosters the ability to distinguish between day and night (and accordingly, to crow at daybreak). A bracha on this theme seems bizarre. Why did Chazal introduce it into our daily davening? The Chiddushei HaRim explained that this bracha is a daily reminder that, just as HaShem gives the rooster the ability to distinguish between day and night, so, too, has He given us the free will necessary to choose between right and wrong.

HIGH HOLIDAY Q&A



Assistant Rabbi Yoni Zolty fills us in on his favorite parts of the High Holidays.

1. What is your favorite part about the High Holidays?

I've always really enjoyed the Torah reading portions of the High Holidays, particularly the first day of Rosh Hashanah where we read of Yishmael and Hagar's expulsion from Avraham's home and their travails in the desert. It's a theologically difficult and at times troubling Torah portion, but there's a moment at the end of the narrative which always affects me strongly.

Throughout the story Yishmael is never referred to by name, never an independent actor in the story, but someone who is acted upon. However, after he appears to be dying and his mother Hagar leaves him to cry off in the distance—at that moment, we are told וישמע "—God hears the voice of the child". In that moment of desperation, with his life hanging in the balance, God hears the child and saves him, not for Avraham's sake, not for his mother's sake, but for his own sake, because he was just a child. If you look carefully, you can find the name of Yishmael written within those first two words that God heard. The message that God directly hears the cries of the innocent, of the pure, and the blameless, is poignant and chilling and is one I always think about every Rosh Hashanah.

2. What makes the High Holidays at LSS so unique?

The community. The strong overwhelming feeling that when you pray at LSS you are not praying as an individual but as a community. The feeling that you pray not only for yourself and your family but for your neighbor and your friends and that they in turn are praying for you and your family.

3. What is your favorite memory from LSS High Holiday services?

Last year it rained heavily on Yom Kippur. Typically, that is not something I'd remember but I was on the terrace for most of Yom Kippur and the rain was very perceptible. Because of the proximity to Sukkot the tent had to be taken down and instead a few tarps had been placed over our heads. Unfortunately, because it rained so heavily, every once in a while a huge gush of rain would fall through the gaps between the tarp and drench some 15 seats. It had the potential of being very distracting, and particularly disruptive. And yet, what I remember most from last year is not the rain falling but how we reacted to it. Because instead of panicking and complaining, everyone pitched in to help rearrange the seats so that no one had to get wet. It was unspoken and yet so obvious to us all. We were going to get through this together as a community—through thick and thin. I can't remember ever feeling so connected to the entire minyan on Yamim Noraim.
