YOUTH DVAR TORAH

At the beginning of this week's Parsha, we see the phrase **לִשְׁנֵי לְשׁוֹנוֹת** "לִשְׁנֵי לְשׁוֹנוֹת" (Devarim 16:20). The classic question must be asked: What is with the double language?

Many times, people are so laser-focused on completing a task that they don't stop and think about how what they are doing may be affecting others. Similarly, when it comes to fulfilling Hashem's commandments, people can become so obsessed with doing the commandments that they don't realize how their actions can have an impact on those around them. For instance, people may have good intentions when they get up early to go to Minyan, but may also set a loud alarm and go in and out of the room multiple times, disrupting the sleep of others.

Thus, the double language teaches us an important lesson: We shouldn't just be chasing "righteousness", but we should pursue righteousness through righteousness. We should constantly assess ourselves and see if we are being the best versions we can be - by being respectful of others as well.

Chazzan Yanky Lemmer fills us in on his favorite parts of the High Holidays.

1. What is your favorite part about the High Holidays?

Neilah. The combination of the 'final stretch' but also the 'last chance' makes for that unique feeling of urgency and relief, tension and release - התעוררות & שמחה

2. What makes the High Holidays at LSS so unique?

The people. Clergy & congregants alike are an enlightening, easygoing, understanding & appreciative bunch. Much of the Yamim Noraim Davening centers around ego work. I think about the Chaz very often, but from the moment the first notes of the Yomin Noraim are sung in Ashrei of Selichos, all through Neilah, I feel his humble and pious presence beside me. It gives me a strong sense of responsibility but also a comfort that he's beside me, so... we're good.

3. Did you have any traditions growing up that you still practice today? What are they?

Having the kids stick Besamim cloves into a lemon for the adults to smell throughout Yom Kippur. Aside for the refreshing jolt, reciting a ברכה מניי בשמים helps us complete our 100 Brachot that should be said daily. On fast days, we need that extra Bracha. I remember the first time I took the lemon out of my bag on Yom Kippur, the eyes I got were a mix of shock and confusion. Today, pretty much the entire Shul makes a Bracha on it.

Looking forward to another inspiring HH season and an even better year to follow.


