YOUTH DVAR TORAH

This week's Parsha opens with the commandment to build a Mikdash so that Hashem can dwell among us. "ועשו לי מקדש ושכנתי בתוכם"

However this commandment raises a question that many mefarshim ask: why does Hashem need a dwelling place on earth? If we take a look at Melachiim (א, ח, כז) at Shlomo Hamelech's tefilla after building the Beit Mikdash, we can sharpen up the question a bit:

- 1. How is it even possible for Hashem to dwell on the earth?
- 2. Even if Hashem is able to dwell on the earth, why restrict himself to a certain place?

In order to deal with the first question, first we must acknowledge that despite Hashem's greatness, he cares about us human beings, his shchinah is in the heavens and the earth. Just as R' Yochanan says in the Gemara of Megilla: 'In every place that you can find Hashem's greatness, you can find his humbleness'. However, after understanding this point in our minds, that Hashem cares about us humans, one still may have a hard time experiencing it, and may wonder whether Hashem really is interested in hearing about his troubles? At this time, he should think about the Neshama that he has inside him, that was given to him by Hashem, and he should realize that Hashem put part of himself inside us. That is how Hashem dwells in the earth, by dwelling inside us.

As to the second question, we first need to realize that man is made up of a Neshama and a body, which inevitably means that we are subject to time and place. The Mikdash is the meeting point, the place where we can feel and absorb Hashem's presence, (the time being the Chagim). This is very much needed for us because as humans, we see our lives as if they are split into two: Kodesh and Chol. It is our need to have a special holy time and place and this way, the meeting becomes a special event which requires a lot of Avodat Hamidot in order for us to be fully prepared for it. This experience couldn't have happened if we thought that Hashem is close to us at every time and place without us having to make any effort.

Shlomo Hamelech finishes his tefilla by asking Hashem to open his eyes towards the Beit Mikdash. At the Beit Mikdash we look towards Hashem, therefore in a tefilla for the Geula, the Navi Yeshaya prays "עין בעין יראו בשוב" that once again we will able to look Hashem in the eye. B"h may we look at Hashem eye to eye at the Beit Hamikdash.

- 2. What items were kept in the Kodesh Hakedoshim?
- 3. When Bnei Yisrael would finally settle, where would the Mishkan go?
- 4. Who built the Beit Hamikdash?

DVAR TORAH

Parshat Terumah February 4-5, 2022 By Judy Sokolow

Although *parshanim* (biblical exegetes)—and we—generally focus on the commentary itself, understanding the methods that they used to construct their comments adds insight into the variety of philosophical approaches to the study of Jewish texts. From time to time, however, an exegete overtly explained his methodology, such as Rabbi Avraham Ibn Ezra (Spain, 1092-1167) in his comment on *atzei shitim* (acacia trees) (Shemot 25:5) in our parashah.

The text begins with a list of items that the Israelites were asked to donate for the construction of the Tabernacle, which included acacia wood. Amongst the many items that they were told to construct from those raw materials, were several from acacia wood including the walls, as we read: "You shall make the planks for the Tabernacle of acacia wood, upright (atzei shitim omdim*). The length of each plank shall be ten cubits and the width of each plank a cubit and a half (26:15-16). (A cubit is approximately 18 inches).

Rashi asked: "Where would they find acacia trees in the desert?" In answer, he cited the Midrash Tanchuma: "Our Father Jacob foresaw by means of *ruach hakodesh* (the Holy Spirit) that Israel was destined to build the Tabernacle in the wilderness; so, he brought cedars to Egypt, and he planted them and commanded his children to take them with them when they will go out of Egypt." (Cedars and acacia are related.)

Ibn Ezra was skeptical. Among his arguments, we read the following:
"It is clear that the Egyptians thought that the Israelites were going to offer sacrifices and then return to Egypt. That is why the Egyptians lent the Israelites [gold and silver jewels plus raiment]. How could the Israelites take out many boards, each one of which was ten cubits? The boards were also accompanied by crossbars [that were even longer]. In Egypt they passed by the seat of the king [a main thoroughfare]. What was their answer to those who asked them why they were carrying acacia wood when they were going on a three-day journey to offer sacrifices?"

Next comes Ibn Ezra's statement about his methodology: "Now we do not know whether our ancestors had a tradition (*kabbalah*) that the Israelites took the acacia wood out of Egypt. If they did, then we will accept their tradition. However, if their statement is based on reasoning alone, then we must seek another explanation. We suggest that there was a forest of acacia trees next to Mount Sinai."

It would appear then that Ibn Ezra accepted *midrashic agadah* as factual if its provenance could be traced way back in time. If, however, a midrash agadah reflects speculation, as is the case here, it need not be taken literally. (Midrash halacha has tighter standards).

So if you are reading midrash agadah to learn history, you have the right to be skeptical. But, if you love the moral messages it conveys, harken and enjoy the wisdom of the rabbis as you understand it, as that is its ultimate purpose.


